Claudia recalled: "Yes, the Palace is the big one...on S. Pearl and Clinton Avenue. My happiest memory of the Palace is when I was five years old and lived on Elsmere Ave. "The Greatest Show on Earth" was playing there--Charlton Heston, Betty Hutton, Dorothy Lamour, Jimmy Stewart. I was thrilled that my parents were going to take me in to see it. I carried a little basket purse and wore little white gloves, black patent Mary Jane shoes, a straw hat and some little suit. Following the show we ate at Peter's soda shop. It was a magical movie all about the circus, and I never forgot it.

Then, also in downtown, we had the Strand, which was located near all

those great Pearl Street stores like Honigsbaum's, David's, Mulfelder's, Sherry's, Ormond, Flah's, Whitney's, Myers, New York Corset Shop, some fancy perfumery up near State Street, Peter's soda fountain, Grant's, Kresge's, Woolworth's, Newberry's, Lodge's, etc. Then, as you headed down S. Pearl Street further, you had the Leland Theatre and the Ritz, which were the kind of wild places you went on a dare. Other shops included M. Solomon, the Busy Bee Thrift Shop, and the New York Bakery.

I remember loving the Planter's Peanut Shop on State and Pearl! Mr. Peanut would walk along the street tipping his big top hat to passers-by. There was a statue of the RCA Victor dog up the hill. I also remember Snappy Men's shop, some other fancy men's shop on State, Walsh's on State, the Waldorf cafeteria on State and Pearl, the Three Sisters soda fountain, Waldman's shoes on State, Mr. Charles shoes...SO many great stores, all gone now. Albany downtown, as well as the uptown Avenue, is rather pathetic. But what great memories!"
