I did not grow up in a household that favored, much less worshipped, any college team. Most of my extended family commuted to a local state college. However, all that changed for me when in late winter of 1979, my high school basketball team played its way into the state finals. Those championship games were fought out in the WVU coliseum, and I am still not certain how I talked my parents into driving me and several friends from Winfield WV to Morgantown to watch our game. What I vividly remember, though, was my first glimpse of the Coliseum from I-79, and the feeling that came with it. From that moment forward, I was a Mountaineer. In the Spring I applied to WVU, was accepted into the Class of 1983 and never looked back.

My husband Jim likes to joke that, when we married, I made him promise to become a Mountaineer fan as part of our vows. Recently I asked him about his favorite Mountaineer memory of our past 18+ years together. He said it was watching the orange-clad Clemson fans steadily emptying out of the stadium during the second half of the 2012 Orange Bowl like so much orange juice from a

fractured glass. His comment was, "Since the team decided not to show up for the second half, their fans left too." That's my man! What I remember is the breath-taking, voice-losing game itself: Geno Smith breaking Tom Brady's Orange Bowl passing record, and tying all-time bowl game records with 407 passing yards along with 6 touchdown passes; Darwin Cook's 99-yard touchdown run, the 2nd longest play in Orange Bowl history; the Mounties' record-breaking 589 yards of total offense and 31 first downs; Tavon Austin catching 4 touchdown passes, matching the record for any previous bowl game; and the West Virginia Mountaineers putting 70 beautiful, bowl game record-breaking points on the board. Greater Cincinnati/Dayton WVU Alumni Chapter Scholarship

For the past 13 years the Cincinnati/Dayton WVU Alumni Chapter has provided a \$1000 per year scholarship to a local student who attends WVU. The scholarship is one of the ways our chapter gives back to our alma mater and to the local community. To date our chapter has given out \$13,000 to help support local students. In 2010 we began the process of endowing our scholarship. Once our scholarship is fully endowed it will provide approximately \$1000 scholarship each year in perpetuity for a deserving student in our area to attend WVU. Through our major functions, as well as contributions from our members, we have raised \$22,000 for our endowment. Our goal is to have our chapter scholarship fully endowed by 2015. To achieve this goal we need to raise \$3000 over the next year.

With WVU's move to the Big12 our primary fundraising source, the pregame events when we play at UC, will no longer occur. Because of this we ask for your help. By making tax deductible contributions directly to the WVU Foundation you can help make the goal of our scholarship being fully endowed by 2015 a reality. 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What the song "Country Roads" means to me

Editors Note: This essay was submitted as part of the 2014 Chapter scholarship application. The scholarship judges were so impressed they thought it should be shared with the rest of the chapter.

When I was young my mom brought me up in a southern household. I may have lived in Ohio, but she instilled in me the meaning of the southern ways. She was raised in Oklahoma and Texas. She shared stories of what it meant for her to live in the country. The biggest thing I remember is what she told me about the people who lived out in the country where she grew up. I always knew that I didn't belong in the city. With each story she shared with me I knew I was a country boy at heart.

It came time to pick a college and I knew that it had to be someplace special and someplace that felt like home. I looked at many schools in Ohio and none of them seem to be the right fit. Then one day, I received a postcard from WVU. On the front was a picture of the mountains and I found myself smiling while looking at that post card. I asked my parents if I could at least see what WVU was about. My step-father who has been my rock for many years said that he wanted to show me something. He pulled a children's book off of his reading shelf and showed it to me. It was the children's picture book called "Take Me Home Country Roads." You see my step-father loved John Denver and my mom gave him the book as a gift. He told me that he had always wanted to go to West Virginia and that he loved this song. I asked him if I could borrow the book for the night and he said yes. I went to my room and looked at the pages. The illustrations reminded me of a quilt. I curled under my own quilt that my grandmother had made me many years ago. I didn't know the song that the book was about, but I found the lyrics to be comforting. The story was about a family just being together, going the through the country. I could not help but think that this family in the book was so similar to mine. My family is everything to me. The book showed pictures of West Virginia. It showed farm houses, country roads, and rolling hills. Then I read the words, "Country roads, take me home. To the place I belong.....West Virginia. I must have read those words ten times. I felt this was a good sign and maybe the answer to my question of where I needed to go to college.

I did visit WVU and within 15 minutes, I knew that I would be a Mountaineer. I felt at home. I felt that the country roads I had traveled had brought me to a place that I could call home. Although I am almost 5 hours from my family, I have met so many wonderful people at WVU. When I drive up to Coopers Rock to look out over the ridge, I often wonder if there could ever be a place that brings you as much peace as this place does. I feel so calm and so full of joy when I see the beauty that has been untouched.

"Country Roads" is a song that describes how we all feel at WVU. My first home football game was exciting, but a very moving experience. I watched the team come in and felt the excitement from the crowd. Then without any warning the entire stadium started to sing "Take Me Home Country Roads." My heart filled with pride,
