New Head Master Outlines His Views On BLA

Christopher Lane came to Boston Latin Academy as Head Master last August. A man of wide experience, he has taught mathematics and chemistry, and has served as Assistant Head Master and Acting Head Master at English High School, where he was also Director of the Flexible Campus Program. Mr. Lane holds a Master's Degree from Boston College and is a doctoral candidate in educational administration at the University of



Massachusetts Amherst. He was assigned to the Occupational Research Center of the Boston Public Schools before his appointment to Boston Latin Academy.

After five months at the Academy, Mr. Lane offered to share his thoughts on subjects of interest to parents and other members of the Boston Latin Academy community.

What are the goals and objectives of Boston Latin Academy?

"Our mission is to provide the highest quality of traditional, classical education to students who select our school. Being a

magnet school which students can choose to attend and also being an exam school potentially generates a student body both capable and willing to do the work necessary to achieve the time tested and proven standards and education offered by BLA. It is the mission of the faculty to recognize the particular strengths and weaknesses of each pupil and to provide the opportunity

for each student to attain a traditional classical education, thus preparing him/her for the highest of achievement in post secondary education."

What is being done to provide for the needs of entering students?

"The teachers and administrators of BLA recognize the degree of difficulty being experienced by our Class VI and Class IVB (grade 7 and new grade 9) students. Their difficulty can be attributed to many Are there discipline problems at Boston Latin Academy?

"Our school has the best students in the city. Occasionally there are some minor problems, but many fewer than one might expect when 1,200 persons get together in a single space. The fact that we have so few discipline problems is a tribute to our students, their parents, and to our staff. Discipline at BLA is fairly and promptly delivered and based upon the

reasons not limited to previous preparation and/or the support mechanisms provided by their schools, their families, and the community.

"The school recognizes that the pressures and demands generated by the curriculum and the standards of the school can be very difficult, not only for our new students, but for all students at some time in their academic career.

"In order to reduce the difficulty experienced by our new students the Regis-BLA partnership has offered a summer orientation program. This program focuses on study skills with some time on remediation.

"At this time the BLA staff is in the process of reviewing our curriculum. Many aspects are being considered; among them are the total amount of material to be covered; the distribution of this material both over a six (four)-year enrollment and also within a given year; the skills necessary to begin study in a particular subject; and the methods of improving student body and learning skills such as tutoring, etc."

(The Regis-BLA partnership provides both college and peer tutors.)

What is the condition of the Boston Latin Academy facility?

"Our building, as with our curriculum, has survived the tests of time. All of the BLA community


Regis Campus Program Draws 50 From BLA; Lectures, Trips Highlight Partnership


