


Today's Host

Wayne Schwartz

After graduation from Washington in 1949, Wayne Schwartz earned his degree from the University of Wisconsin in agricultural engineering, then served our country as a First Lieutenant in the US Army Corps of Engineers. Wayne was a certified quality management engineer and system auditor, working at Allis Chalmers, Gehl Company and Broan Manufacturing. Wayne is active in the community, volunteering on the WHS Alumni Scholarship Foundation Board and with the Boy Scouts of America.




Carl "Chuck" Gobel

A 1956 WHS grad, Carl (Chuck) Gobel was a professional educator. He taught English in Grayslake, Illinois and at Waukesha Central and was vice principal at Waukesha South and the first principal of the newly opened Waukesha North High School. Later he became the executive director of ASC (Administrators and Supervisors Council of Milwaukee Public Schools). Chuck served as president of the Washington High School Alumni Scholarship Foundation, and his lifelong passions included travel, camping, music and golf.



Sanford Horwitt

Graduating in 1961, Sanford Horwitt was an author, book critic and policy advisor to foundations and non-profit organizations concerned with promoting civic engagement and strengthening democratic institutions. His book reviews and essays have appeared in *The New York Times, The* Washington Post, San Francisco Chronicle, Chicago Tribune, and other publications. In Washington, Sandy was a speechwriter for Judge Abner Mikva, the subject of his latest book, Conversations with Abner Mikva. He received his bachelor's and doctoral degrees at Northwestern University.



Dessie Grays Levy

Graduating in 1979, Dessie Grays Levy had no idea she would make history in Wisconsin. "I did not set out to be Dr. Levy. I wanted to be a nurse," she said. Levy became a registered nurse, went on to earn her Ph.D., and in 2005, was hired as the first Black dean of nursing in Wisconsin at Milwaukee Area Technical College (MATC). She is currently an assistant professor for the Clinical Translational Science Institute at the Medical College of Wisconsin.



Catrina Crane

A 1993 WHS graduate, Catrina has a deep passion for the community she serves. She's led workforce planning and business services as the Director of Workforce and Business Solutions for Milwaukee's Menomonee Valley for 16 years. In addition, she has served on the Governance Board, PTO or parent volunteer for several Milwaukee Public Schools, several academies and MPS Apprenticeship Team. Catrina is also the current Chairperson of the WHSASF Scholarship Committee overseeing the selection and allocation of annual scholarships.




Donta Holmes

He hopes to use his store to build relationships and promote inspiring conversations that lead to brighter futures.



Nikiya Harris Dodd

A 1994 WHS graduate, Nikiya Harris Dodd, was elected to the Milwaukee Common Council in 2018. She served in the Wisconsin State Legislature and the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors. Alderwoman Dodd led the push for mental health professionals to assist police officers with persons suffering from mental health issues while in custody. She earned her master's degree Administrative Leadership Educational Policy from UWM and holds a certificate in Nonprofit Management.



Ranell Washington

A 2000 graduate, Ranell Washington serves as Chair of the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority (WHEDA) Board. He was recognized as a Business Journal Top 100 Influential Finance Executive and Milwaukee Business Journal's '40 under 40.' Ranell received his Bachelor's in Finance and a Certificate of Real Estate from the UWM. He is also one of several co-founders of Social X MKE, a young professionals' group in Greater Milwaukee area.



Joel Cencius

A 2002 WHS graduate, Joel Cencius is a fundraising professional with more than 15 years of nonprofit experience. currently serves as the Chief Development Officer for St. Joan Antida High School where he was recruited to lead the school's development and alumnae relations efforts. Prior to that, he served as the Vice President of Development for Big Brothers Big Sisters of Metro Milwaukee. George Hinton






Today's Guest Speaker






