

HEAD COACH, BASEBALL AND WRESTLING


An outstanding athlete growing up in nearby New Milford, Joe earned varsity letters in soccer, wrestling, and baseball at New Milford High School and was captain of both the wrestling and baseball teams. He received his bachelor's degree in 1971 from Springfield College and later earned a master's degree from Montclair State University. At Springfield, Joe was a varsity wrestler for two years. As a senior baseball player and team captain, he led the nation in stolen bases and was a first team All-

New England selection at second base. After graduation he played professional baseball in the St. Louis Cardinals organization.

Joe began his career in Paramus in 1971 as a physical education teacher at East Brook Junior High School, where he coached freshman football, wrestling, and baseball. His 1973 baseball team won the first Bergen County Freshman Tournament. In 1981 Joe moved to PHS, where he continued to teach physical education. He was named head wrestling coach that same year and head baseball coach for the 1982 season. As head wrestling coach Joe compiled a record of 311 wins and 74 losses in dual meet competition over a 27 year career. His teams won ten N.N.J.I.L. titles, fourteen District championships, three State sectional championships, and was voted the #1 team in Bergen County three times. This remarkable coach's individual awards include four-time Bergen County and Region Wrestling Coach of the Year and State Coach of the Year in 2003. During his coaching career at PHS Joe had the pleasure of coaching his own two sons, Joey and Danny, in both wrestling and baseball.

Coach Cervino's outstanding career as head baseball coach spanned thirty years during which his teams won 537 games, including nine League championships and three State sectional championships. Joe was named Bergen County Coach of the Year in 1987 and 2011. He has been inducted into the New Milford High School, Met League, and New Jersey Coaches Halls of Fame and chosen for the Springfield College All-Decade Team.

Joe retired in 2011 and lives in Paramus with his wife Pat. Their three children, Joey, Kristen, and Dan were multi-sport varsity letter winners at PHS.



JEFFREY PERRY CLASS OF 1964

Jeff's three letters in soccer, two in basketball, and two in baseball are testimony to his outstanding athletic career at PHS. As goalie on the soccer team and co-captain in his senior year, he received All-N.N.J.I.L. and All-County second team honors. His play making and floor leadership as a point guard in basketball were keys to the success of the 1963 and 1964 teams. The

1963 team (Hall of Fame) is the only basketball team in school history to win the N.N.J.I.L., Bergen County Jamboree, and State Sectional championships and to reach the State finals



in Atlantic City. Jeff was named to the All-N.N.J.I.L. second team as a junior and to the first team as a senior. He was selected to the All-County third team as a junior and to

the second team as a senior (at the time when only 5 players were chosen for each squad.) He was co-captain of his team as a senior. Jeff was named to the Bergen County Basketball Jamboree All-Decade team for the 1960's. Jeff's baseball career was also noteworthy. The 1964 team is the only one in school history to win the League, County, and State championships in the same year. His outstanding play at second base earned him first team All-N.N.J.I.L. and second team All-County honors. At PHS Jeff was a member of the George W. Hodgins Chapter of the National Honor Society.

Jeff studied at Princeton University, earning a B.A. degree in 1968. He also played basketball and baseball at Princeton. He has done graduate work at Harvard, Rutgers, and Columbia universities and holds a Ph.D. from Columbia. Active for many

years in various ways in the labor movement, he has written a number of journal articles: his books have been

published by the Columbia and Weslyan University presses.

Jeff and his wife Becky Hom live in Westwood. Their daughter Perri Hom is a recent graduate of Smith College.

RICHARD CIRNER CLASS OF 1965

Rich earned three varsity letters in track and field and one in football. He was a wide receiver on the 1964 football team and helped lead them to a winning season. It was in track

and field, however, where Rich's outstanding and record-setting performances gained him county, state, and national recognition. As a sprinter, hurdler, and long jumper, he played an important part in the success of the 1963,

1964, and 1965 track teams, which earned many championships. The 1965 season was the highlight of his PHS career. He was the N.N.J.I.L. champion in the low hurdles and long jump. Rich went on to take second place in both events in the State Group 4 competition. His long jump of 24'1½" was a County record. Rich still holds the track and field records at PHS in four individual and

four relay events.

Rich was named to the All-County first team for the 180 yd. hurdles and the long jump and was selected for the All-Decade team of the 1960's in the long jump. He was invited to compete in the prestigious Golden West Tournament

in California in 1965, a competition to which only the top eight seniors in the country in each event are invited. He was a medal-winner, finishing third in the long jump


and fourth in the triple jump.

After graduation Rich attended the University of Maryland on an athletic scholarship. He won the Atlantic Coast Conference long jump championship while competing for the university. He was employed by the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company and Bergen Pines County Hospital in the financial area. The father of two adult sons, he is now retired and lives in Toms River.

John was one of the best offensive guards and linebackers in PHS football history. In fact, Hall of Fame coach John DeGasperis called him the best he ever coached at linebacker. He was a two-year



letter winner in football. In 1964 after his junior football season, John received honorable mention All-N.N.J.I.L. and All-County. (At this time The Record chose only 11 players for each team, including honorable mention.) As senior co-captain of the Spartans, he led the team in tackles and to a second place finish in the league with a 7-2 record. His performance earned him several honors, including first team All-N.N.J.I.L. and All-Metropolitan, second team All-County, and second team Group 4 All-State. John also lettered in baseball as a senior.

After graduation John attended the University of Delaware, receiving a B.A. degree in 1970. His success on the gridiron continued as he earned three varsity letters

and other honors. After the 1968 and 1969 seasons he was

and other nonors named to the All-Mid-America Conference and All-East teams. He was also a member of the 1969 Kodak All-America team. In 1970 he was invited to the training camp of the Philadelphia Eagles, where his




Eagles, where his impressive showing carried him all the way to the final cut.

John's first twelve years after college were spent teaching and coaching football. He coached at Middletown, Delaware, High School for 4 seasons. He moved on to Bassett High School in Virginia in 1974 and compiled a 53-24-2 record over 8 seasons. In 1978 he was named Piedmont District Coach of the Year and led his team to the district championship. In 1982 he entered the insurance business and is currently market alliance consultant with the Horace Mann Insurance Company.

John and his wife Bonnie have four children and live in Collinsville, VA.





GLEN MORSCHAUSER CLASS OF 1967

Glen earned his place in PHS sports history as a standout in both football and track, earning three letters in each sport. He became the starting left half back on the football team midway through the 1964 season and for the next two seasons was the leading rusher as his team compiled a 13-5 record. He was also a starter at defensive half back, a punter, and a place kicker. At

the end of his senior season, he held the record for career rushing yards. Many honors came his way, including 1965 All-N.N.J.I.L. second team; 1966

All-N.N.J.I.L. first team and All-County honorable mention (at a time when only 11 players were named to each of the All-County teams); and first team All-Suburban, cocaptain in 1966. Under Hall of Fame Coach Lou Lanzalotto, Glen had an outstanding career in track as well. In 1966 he finished fourth as a low hurdler and in 1967 he finished


second in the long jump at the Bergen County Meet of Champions. He led the team in points scored during the 1967 season as the team won its fifth straight N.N.J.I.L. championship.

Glen attended Arizona State University on a football scholarship.

After one season he transferred to Montclair State University, where he earned his B.S. degree in education. He was once again an outstanding running back, concluding his career at Montclair as holder of the records for most touchdowns for a season and career as well as career total offense. Glen was named a Division III All-American and Most Valuable Player in 1970. He is a member of the Montclair State University Athletic Hall of Fame.


Glen comes from a family of

DOUGLAS CINNELLA CLASS OF 1982

A three sport athlete at PHS, Doug earned three varsity letters in football, two in wrestling, and three in baseball. An offensive halfback, defensive back, punter, and place kicker, Doug led the team in rushing and scoring. He was co-captain of the 1981 team that finished with a 5-4 record and earned second team All-N.N.J.I.L. and second team All-Suburban honors. Doug competed at the 152 pound weight class in wrestling. As a starting pitcher on the varsity baseball team for three years,

Doug played for two Hall of Fame coaches, Bob Kingsley (1980-1) and Joe Cervino (1982). With a 9-4 record and a 1.94 E.R.A as a senior, Doug was selected for the first team All-N.N.J.I.L. and the second team All-County. At the end of his career he held the PHS records for innings pitched (207) and strikeouts (173).

Doug graduated from Seton Hall University in 1986, where he played varsity baseball for four years. At the conclusion of his pitching career there, he held the Seton Hall records for wins, innings pitched, and strikeouts for both his entire career and for a single game (17). He was named team M.V.P. in 1984. The Baltimore Orioles professional baseball

organization drafted Doug in 1986. During his first season with them, he pitched back-to-



Team captain in 1990, he led the team in scoring (21.6 p.p.g.) and rebounds (8 p.g.). He set

a school single game record for field goals (17) against rival St. Joseph's. Named first team All-N.N.J.I.L., second team



All-County, and first team All-Suburban, he was invited to play in the Bergen-Passaic All-Star Classic. Kevin was also an outstanding golfer. He was selected to the first team N.N.J.I.L. and third team All-County. At PHS he was a member of the George W.Hodgins Chapter of the National Honor Society and the German Honor

Society, and was elected president of the Student Government.




Kevin graduated from Drew University in 1994 with a B.A. degree in political science and religion. A four-year varsity letter winner in basketball at Drew, he was captain in 1993 and 1994. His career statistics indicate his success: fifth

Kevin and his wife Beth Bowman live in Lawrenceville with their young son Sawyer.






JOSEPH CERVINO CLASS OF 1996


Competing in football, wrestling, and baseball at PHS, Joey earned ten varsity letters. He teamed up with his father


Joey attended Southern Connecticut State University, where he played varsity baseball for two seasons.

Michelle graduated magna cum laude from Sacred Heart University in 2003. As the starting varsity pitcher for four years, she was team captain in 2002 and 2003.



will earn her Ph.D. next year. She and her husband David live in Connecticut.






RUSSELL "ROCCO" RINALDI **CLASS OF 1999**


State Tournament Group 3 Sectional final. He was named to the All-N.N.J.I.L. second team that year.

Rocco was also a three-year starter in the outfield first team All-N.N.J.I.L. and honorable mention Allhits, runs scored, and stolen bases.



After a career in business. Rocco returned to his real interest and is now owner of Rocz Club Baseball, He and his wife Lauren live in Maywood with their three sons.








SCOTT BARCHETTO CLASS OF 2001




