

Students Propose Draft Change

Students: The following is an excerpt from a letter sent to Senator Kuchel by a student committee in Mr. Archer's 5th period class. The organizers of this action were elected by the class. They are: Glenda Moses, Jim Bryden, Joe Pruitt, Robert Johnson, Pat Flagg, Sandy Soltis, and Marilyn Ramge. Petitions will be circulated around school soon. Therefore, you should read the following so you will be familiar with the contents when you are asked to sign a petition.

Honorable Senator Kuckel,

We, the Young People's Committee for Revisions of the Selective Service Laws, have been chosen to represent the members of the Associated Student Body of Napa Senior High School to draw up proposed revision to the present Selective Service Laws.

The following ideas have been expressed by the majority of the members of the students at Napa Senior High School:

- 1) The draft age be 18 years with the provision that if a person is not drafted between the age of 18 and 20, he cannot be drafted unless a national emergency is declared by Congress.
- 2) If a person is for any reason deffered from the draft while between the age of 18 and 20, he may then be drafted until the age of 25, but thereafter only if a national emergency occurs.

The young people of Napa, California be-2nd period classes 12:50 - 2:50 P.M. M. D. lieve that these revisions should be incorporated into the Selective Service Laws because:

- substantial job unless one has first completed his military obligation
- 2) It emotionally disturbs young married couples because the chances of the family being denied its male members are very great. It develops a feeling of uncertainty.
- 3) Fear of being drafted puts a haze of indecision on draft age youths.
- 4) It steers many young men from the advantages of higher education.

With these reasons in mind, we request that the changes we proposed as amendments to the Selective Service Laws be incorporated by you and introduced into the U.S. Senate.

In a short time this letter will be followed by a petition signed by the students of Napa Sr. High School concerning this issue . . .

"Did you know that it only takes 0.00879 foot pounds of energy to drag a 0.2 gram candy wrapper 100 feet to a trash can?"


"Yet many students would rather throw it on the ground. Actually it probably takes as much energy to do that as it does to throw it in one of the many convenient trash cans."


