This makes us the second oldest school in KZN and the oldest public school in Durban.

150th Old Boys Special Assembly

On Friday we welcomed over 250 DHS Old Boys to a Special Old Boys Assembly. The Assembly has become an integral part of the Founders Day Celebrations. This year, on our 150th Anniversary, it was bigger and better than ever.

The ceremony, attended by Trustees of the Foundation, special guests, DHS staff and our boys, began with readings and prayers by the Head Prefects and included musical interludes by the Deo Fretus and the Mambazo Singers. Certificates and leather bound copies of the DHS 150th Heritage Book were awarded by Mr Erasmus to Trustees of the DHS Foundation who are Old Boys that have made significant contributions to School over the years and have played an active role in the upgrading and development of the School's infrastructure -Mr Chris Seabrooke, Mr Howard Buttery and Mr Stephen Saad. Mr Erasmus also recognised the contribution of Mr Mike Fennell and Mr Rob Mutch of the Foundation.

A new Mathematics prize, the

Wadley Memorial Prize was introduced by Mr Keith Barnett and Party. Mr Winston Owen, Chairman of the Governing Body addressed the school. Mr Owen, an Old Boy (Class of '89), highlighted the importance of the brotherhood at DHS that has been the pulse of School for 150 years. He voiced his pride in the boys that currently form the DHS body and thanked the Old Boys who continuously support DHS. He said, "the current voung men at DHS look up to you, the Old Boys, and have enormous pride as they have seen and heard stories about your success and hope to emulate you."

One of the highlights of the ceremony was a special 150th gift which was unveiled and presented to Mr Erasmus by Mr Hank Pike, the Durban **Preparatory High School** Headmaster. The gift of an exquisite mosaic of the DHS School badge was in recognition of the close relationship between the two schools which is so important to honour and remember. It was Mr A S Langley, the 4th Head Master of DHS, who founded DPHS in 1910. Four boys from Prep were in the audience and it was wonderful to have them join us.

Scott Mathie, Old Boy (Class of 2000) and current DHS Head of

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Rugby, addressed the players, the DHS boys and Old Boys in a rousing and heartfelt talk about the small things, building blocks, wolves, and DHS boys being men of character. He received a standing ovation following his speech.

The class of 1966 gathered at AJ's at DHS on Thursday 2 June to celebrate the 50th reunion of their Matric class. Below is an account of the reunion from Cedric Parker.

Around 100 delegates (including a number of Teachers and a past Headmaster from their era) attended. There was a wonderful spirit of unity and goodwill as Classmates and Teachers alike shared their memories and reconnected again after half a century.

Mike Mun-Gavin welcomed everyone and introduced the current Headmaster, Leon Erasmus, who inspired everyone with his passion and commitment to excellence in the address that he gave. Denzil Andrews then thanked Leon and introduced the current learner leadership team ("Stash" Mathenjwa the Head Prefect - and his two deputies, Libo Mngomezulu and Josh Spooner).

We held a simple ceremony to remember our deceased Classmates - by lighting a candle for each one. This was followed by projecting video greetings from Classmates around the world who had not been able to make the reunion.

There were 51 Classmates from South Africa; 6 from Australia;

3 from Canada; 2 from France; and 1 from Zimbabwe. We gave each delegate a "goodie" bag containing a magnum of 'Wrinkles' McIver Wine of Maturity Merlot; a special bookmark with the names of deceased Classmates, a discount voucher from La Bella Restaurant, an engraved stylus key ring/torch and the commemorative embroidered golf shirts that had been ordered by them. These gifts were made possible by a number of very generous donations that we received from Classmates.

The following morning some of the Classmates attended the special Founders Day assembly at the school. This was a deeply moving experience for us, as it became so clear that our school has built on the wonderful traditions of the past and evolved into a superb, inclusive institution. A recurring theme which struck a positive chord with us - was that the boys have a sense of entering a noble brotherhood when they join DHS. I felt so proud to be an Old Boy as I witnessed the DHS of 2016 in all its glory. There is an infectious enthusiasm amongst the teachers and learners that pervades everything they do. The boys showed tremendous respect and courtesy in the way that they interacted with us.

On the Friday evening some of us attended the formal banquet at the Greyville Convention Centre where over 800 Old Boys and teachers gathered to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the School. This too was an inspiring event. Lee Irvine was the MC, and the speakers included Chris Seabrooke, Stephen Saad and Joe Parker - who was the after-dinner entertainer.

On the Saturday morning we were privileged to go on an interesting tour of the school conducted by Jeremy Oddy. This culminated in a fascinating slide presentation in the Seabrooke Theatre - which mapped out the history of the

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school. In the afternoon we watched two thrilling rugby encounters with Maritzburg College - winning against their 2nd team with only 14 men - and then losing narrowly to their first team - in a match that could have gone either way. We were left with no doubt that we are developing as a top rugby school under the astute leadership of Scott Mathie (ex Sharks).

The prevailing sentiment was that the weekend had been profoundly significant - in that it had cemented our brotherhood tradition. It was resolved that we should remain in touch through our website and connect again more regularly in future.

Why all the effort - good question, I guess the pride and impact that Durban High School had on me and many a fellow old boys lives, it is the driving force and to possibly link connections in Australia, the country we now call home. I do feel very passionate about our School, being an Old Boy of Durban High School is most certainly the glue that binds all us needed to be constructive and Old Boys.

Ouite a bit has changed at 255 St Thomas Road with the DHSOB club being sold, the upgrade of Blackmores House, which was well over due. Rugby is now being taken more seriously with significant resources and support being allocated by securing services of Scott Mathie as Head Coach. Good coaching, conditioning and instilling some pride back into the jersey is starting to pay dividends and its only early days. Nowadays the school war cry is sung with the gusto of a Lion King Broadway production! Arguably the best Head of Blackmore's in the history of the school. Many of us Old Boys in attendance in Brisbane on the 14th of May 2016 will testify to that.

As we all know DHS a few years ago procured the services of Leon Erasmus from Rondebosch High School. He is the 14th Headmaster of the Durban High School; I haven't personally met the man,

but look forward to doing so in June. With the new changing times, he has been steering the ship in the right direction and by all accounts I believe he has been doing an excellent job.

DHS continues to pride itself in being a pillar of the Durban society producing young aspiring men who hopefully develop and nurture the essential qualities productive members of society, corporate, community and family life.
