Honor Students Are Announced

The Valedictorian and Salutatorian of the Class of '66 are Linda Chafin and Cindy Cochran respectively. The two honor students are Beverley Whiting and Linda Gardner. These four students were chosen by their rank in their class.

Linda Chafin is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Chafin of Berryville. In addition to her excellent grades, she is business manager of the "Eyrrie," president of the French Club, secretary of the Beta Club, and chairman of the New York trip committee. After graduation she plans to attend the College of William and Mary to major in art.

Cindy is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Allen E. Cochran of Berryville. She is president of the senior class, president of the Tri-Hi-Y, member of the Beta Club and Latin Club, assistant editor of THE TALON, reporter for the "Eyrrie," and chairman of the senior gift committee. She plans to attend Shepherd College upon graduation from high school.

Beverley is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Whiting of Walnut Street, Berryville. She is editor of THE TALON, a varsity football cheerleader, and a member of the Beta Club. She was secretary of the SCA and vice-president of the junior class.

She will attend Bridgewater College after graduation.

Linda, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Horace Gardner of Berryville, is a member of THE TALON staff, treasurer of the senior class, and chaplain of the Tri-Hi-Y. She is currently employed at the Bank of Clarke County, and plans to continue working there after graduation.

In view of the fact that a high school senior's rank in class is requested by college admissions officers and prospective employers, it is desirable that a uniform plan for determining class rank be established. The procedure by which these students were chosen is used by many of the area schools and is approved by the Joint Committee of the National Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers. All students are included in determining class rank. A mark is recorded for all subjects, whether passed or failed. An "A" counts four points per unit, "B" counts three, "C" counts two, and "D" counts one. The average is then computed. Exact class rank is determined at the end of the first semester of the senior year in high school.
