Lanny plans to attend K. U. next fall, although he is still undecided as to what his vocation will be.



"Rock Chalk, Jayhawks, K. Uuuuuu'." This is one of the Kansas University cheers that one may hear rolling out of the horseshoeshaped Memorial Stadium. From a hill overlooking the stadium one may see the 120-foot World War II Memorial Campanile and hear the pealing of its 53-bell carillon. All this and more is located on the 650-acre campus of Kansas University atop Mount Ornead at Lawrence, Kansas.

Housing accommodations at the University of Kansas consist of scholarship halls, fraternities and sororities, cooperative houses, rooming houses and private homes, residence halls and apartments aspects of English instruction. for married students.

Fraser Hall with its twin towers is KU's oldest building and still one of the busiest. Danforth Chapel, partially hidden among trees near a busy corner, is open 24 hours a day for prayer and meditation. Without additional cost you can enroll in the affiliated Kansas School of Religion and earn full credit toward graduation.

The Kansas Union, throughout its 51/2 floor level, is a social and recreational center for Jayhawkers. It is the club to which every student belongs. Facilities include bowling alleys, lounges, music room and library, craft shop, cafeteria, fountain and grill, ballroom and meeting rooms.

The students of KU stay in shape by joining in "sports for fun" in intramurals. Basketball is just one of the dozen team and individual sports for men and women.

Why Should You Write a Theme?

Theme! How many times have you groaned at the sound of that word? But then how many themes have you written? One a semester or one each six weeks? According to Dr. Arthur Conant, quoted in the National Association of Secondary School Principals Spotlight, "The time devoted to English composition should occupy about half the total time devoted to the study of English. Each student should be required to write an average of one theme a week student, a schoolwide composition test should be given in every grade."

Emphasis on writing would leave less time for the study of literature for its own sake. It is believed that students appreciate literature more through writing it than by taking it apart to find out why it was written. The additional time devoted to writing will and ought to be related to other

This is upheld by Mrs. Doris bake sale, and car wash. Morton, NHS English teacher. who commented, "Writing can be co-ordinated with literature. If teachers can teach a student to write a good sentence and paragraph, then the student should be able to write a longer composition."

Students will have to do most of this writing in class so that teachers will be able to give advice and supervision readily. Themes will probably have to be rewritten before they are perfect but this can be done as home

The reason for more emphasis on writing is not to make students professionals and certainly not to give them more work to do but rather to stress the discipline of communicating ideas through writ


