

10,000 Expected for Preview at South Tonight;

Four Abbreviated Tilts Set; Opener Slated for 7:30 p.m.

What figures to be an interesting City Series football campaign kicks off this evening with the 18th annual preview at South High Stadium.

All eight city schools see action in four abbreviated frays with the lid-lifter set for 7:30. Rayen meets Woodrow Wilson in the first fray with Cardinal Mooney opposing East High in the second contest. Ursuline High's defending champions take on South and Chaney winds up the program opposing North.

Each game will consist of two 15-minute halves, reports St. Paul, North High athletic director, who is in charge of the preview.

Over 10,000 fans are expected to get a look at their favorite and perhaps prognosticate a bit on what the future holds.

Following three weeks of "circumference" trail have accorded Ursuline, Chaney and Cardinal Mooney the best chance of capturing the championship. All three clubs have impressed in the early drills. South High, Rayen and East bear watching and a young Woodrow Wilson team could cause trouble under
