

Dorris, Maloney Feature Irish Romp Before 3,000

Impressive performances by Bill Dorris and Ed Maloney featured last night as defending champion Ursuline bounced back into the 1965 title picture by overwhelming North High, 38-8, before about 3,000 fans at Rayen Stadium.

Both Maloney and Dorris scored twice—Maloney once on a magnificent 68-yard punt return—as the Irish recovered from last week's 12-0 setback at the hands of Chaney to record their second win in three starts. The loss was North's second after an opening win at Columbian.

Dorris, passing 18 yards to Maloney for one score, romped across from the two and three, and also ran for three conversions.

It was, as expected, an overmatch. North, unable to cope with Ursuline's power and depth, crossed midfield only once, and its fourth quarter touchdown was the result of an Irish hobbie which was recovered by the Bulldogs' Morgan Jones on the Ursuline eight.

The winners subsequently were penalized to the four on a delay-of-game as there was a mix-up in substitutions. Art Cornwell, North's hard-working fullback, slanted through tackle for the six-pointer. A penalty on

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the unsuccessful conversion attempt also gave North a second chance, Cornwell hitting guard to get across in the re-run.

Coach John Martinko's Bulldogs gave it a full effort, however, and actually ran three more offensive plays than Ursuline in the course of the contest. But mistakes were costly, and the Bulldogs were unable to mount an attack or capitalize on several other breaks.

A lame punt by Ibn Shakoor early in the opening stanza rolled barely three yards and set the stage for Ursuline's first TD. It came three plays later when Dorris rifled one down the middle to Maloney from the 18.

That was it for the first period, but the Irish came right back following the second of 10 punts Shakoor made during the game. Frank Prologo ran it back 14 yards to the Bulldog 28. Dorris was dumped on the 39 in a pass attempt, but made the key play on a 35-yard sweep around right end to plant the ball on the four as the second quarter got under way. Two plays later he got across from the two and ran his second successful conversion to make it 16-0.

Moments later, Maloney hauled in a Shakoor boot on his own 32, dashed laterally across

the field and down the left sideline untouched. Dorris again converting on a run to boost the tally to 24-0 by halftime.

Tom Carey began shuttling reserves into the Irish lineup midway of the third session after a Dorris-Maloney pass covered 16 yards to North's three, from where Dorris rammed across early in the second half. Five minutes later, sub fullback Vince Julian blasted through the middle and into the clear on a 33-yard sprint that completed the Irish scoring.

Carey cleared the bench thereafter, using every one of the 47 players who dressed for the game.

Getting strong performances by such stalwarts as Tim Franken and Rich Rovnak, Ursuline's front line defense, which held Canton Central and Chaney to a combined total of 50 yards rushing, once again was air tight. North managed 63 yards on the ground, but got 20 of it against reserves in the closing stages. The Irish piled up 164 on the ground, and had a 34-12 edge through the air as Dorris clicked on two of four pass attempts. Ursuline also had a 9-4 bulge in first downs.

Three Steel Valley Tilts Co-Featured on Schedule

Four teams which took it on the chin last week come head-to-head tonight in City Series action which spearheads scholastic football's drive through its third week of the 1965 campaign.

Ursuline battles North at Rayen Stadium while Cardinal Mooney tangles with neighborhood rival Wilson at South. All are 1-1 thus far with the exception of Wilson's Redmen, still hunting their first success under new coach Joe Nudo.

It will be Rayen-Chanery at Rayen and South-East at South on Saturday night. Rayen's game launches centennial observances of the school and it will be "Alumni Night," with all grads sitting in a special section.

Powerful Boardman is host to Brookfield, rugged Struthers to Girard in features of the Steel Valley Conference schedule this evening. Both home clubs are unbeaten in three starts, the Spartans numbering two knuckleheads among their victims, while Struthers opened its league campaign with a rout of Brookfield last week. Catopwell's defending champs are at Hubbard in the third loop post on the card, while Fitch travels to Farrell, Pa., for a nonleague skirmish.

The Tri-County finds Columbiana at Minerva, East Palestine at Lectoria, with two other games in the circuit called on Saturday. Poland celebrates its homecoming with Lisbon furnishing the opposition, and Louisville, going after its 22nd in a row, plays at Sebring.

This evening's big battles include Alliance at Massillon, Canton Lincoln vs Canton McKinley, West Branch at Salem, Ravenna at Newton Falls, Sharon at New Castle.

Irish Will Employ 2 Backfield Units

Ursuline, impressive on defense but still lacking an offensive wallop coach Tom Carey would like, will see some shifting of backfield personnel against North.

"We'll try alternating players at several positions, since our top boys in many cases play both ways and may be tiring too rapidly because of it," Carey said. He will use both Bill Dorris and Frank Prologo at quarterback this week. Vince Julian will alternate with Mike Tomaskovich at fullback, Mike Kirkland with Ed Maloney and Jack Edwards with Bob Dolwick at the halves.

Defensively, Ursuline has contained ground attacks to 50 yards in two games, and given only 105 through the air. That's comparable to anything achieved by Carey's 1964 squad, which stressed defense in bringing the school its second straight city crown.

North has had to make some backfield changes because of injuries, but coach John Martinho is optimistic to the extent he thinks his club can give Ursuline a good game if "we do things the way we did at Columbiana and at points last week against North. That score wasn't indicative completely of our showing."

Tom Shaker will start at left halfback, where both Ray McElroy and Lloyd Watkins are shelved with injuries. McElroy has a bad hip, Watkins a

twisted knee. Both should be ready again next week. Art Cornwell may see limited service at fullback, nursing a thigh injury. Morgan Jones will alternate.

Mooney's Coleman May Play Halfback

There will be some changes made in the Cardinal Mooney array for tonight's tilt with Woodrow Wilson. Because of an ear infection this week, end and punter Bob Kovey will probably be missing. This will necessitate a change in sending in plays, a job usually handled by the wingmen. So now the assignment falls to the halfbacks. Frank Coleman, who is averaging 5.1 yards per carry, will alternate at running back. This group will handle the "messenger boy" duties on every other play. Don Carlson, Bob Barry and Ken Franklin. Barry has a five-yards-per-carry mark.

The rapid rise of Marty Murphy could bring him the fullback job, with Coleman's speed utilized at fullback. Quarterback Andy Schuda, who displayed two fingers on his left hand in the South game, definitely will not start. That job goes to junior Dan Welsh.

Chaney High has a high-powered offense, but coach "Red" Angelo credits his defense with much of the success. The Cowboys may need it to checkmate the speed of Rayen's diminutive but fleet backs—Donner Taylor and Lorenzo Wilson Saturday.

Angelo's defensive mainstays include Dave Brungard, Mike Roman, Mike DeSiro, Bruce Herdman and Gary Ferrando. Chaney's attack didn't get much chance to break loose last week against the stubborn Ursuline defenders. But Tom Ross and Dave Brungard will be ready to break out.

Although defensive back Warren Seyers is definitely out with a knee injury, coach Ralph Robinson says Rayen isn't planning too many changes. He will, however, have Tom Loman, 5-10, 160-pounder, to play fullback over for Frank Maschke, 165, senior, who will miss his second week with a bruised shoulder. Roger Lattanzi will be at the other guard.

Inspired Warriors Ready for Bears

South will employ the same lineup that throttled Cardinal Mooney last week to cross the Warriors' season mark at 1-1.

"We have some good players, but many lack experience," said Sonny Friend. "Still, they showed lots of improvements over the Boardman game, eliminating many fundamental shortcomings."

South hadn't beaten Mooney since 1960, so the triumph was a real morale booster.

East lost to Struthers, 14-0, yielding one TD when a kickoff was left uncovered in the end zone, but beat Wilson last week with a tremendous offensive show. The Bears have been working to get the offense equal, however, to an even more impressive defensive game. Boardman High, at full strength, figures to make it No. 4 at the expense of winless Brookfield. Steve Bonaga has a real powerhouse generated by the passing wizardry of Larry Tracy, acclaimed one of the premier quarterbacks in the area. Jim Martin makes his starting debut at halfback as a running mate for Doug McKay with Joe Salpietra at fullback. Gary Vendemia, Dave Martin and James Kagarine are added starters in the Boardman backfield.

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
