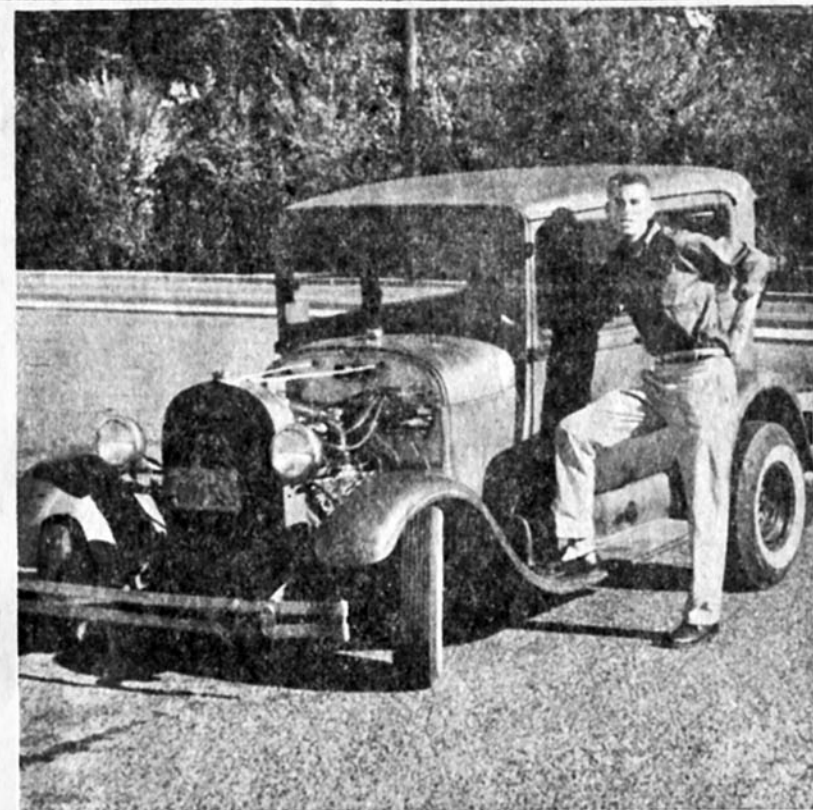

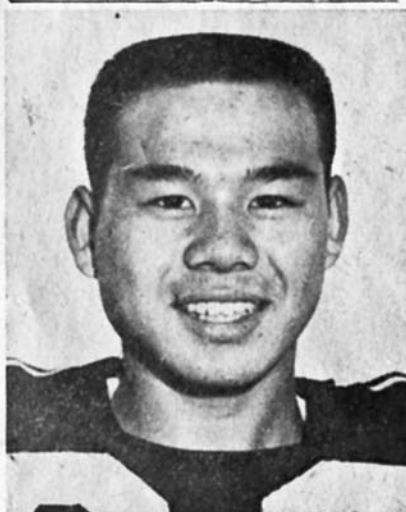

The Lions have won 2 games



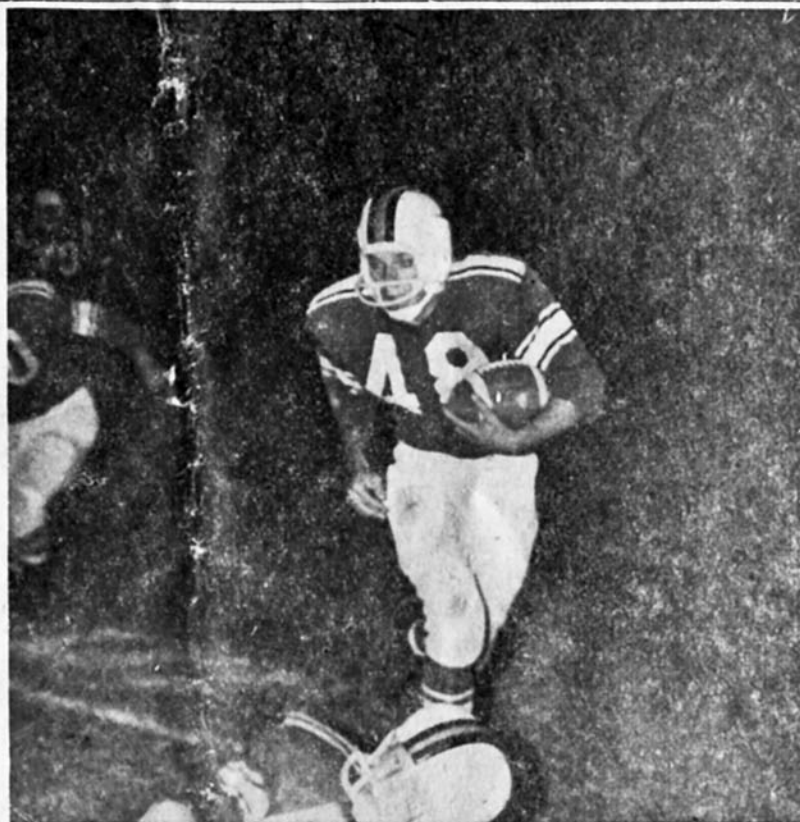
Roger Fong
