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Alumni Profile - Don Tomasik '62

"As the Army keeps rolling along" - that's the line from the Army song of the same title and for 26 ½ years, Colonel Donald Tomasik continued to lead the Army Corps of Engineers to ensure that the US Army kept rolling along.

A 1962 Dieruff graduate, Don Tomasik tells a bit about growing up in Allentown. "We lived on Union Street, between 7th and 8th Streets," Don begins. "My dad was big into sports and he was a professional boxer. He became the director of the Boy's Club in Allentown. Our family owned a newspaper and magazine stand on Sixth and Tilghman. I spent a lot of time working there. I used to be there at 6 o'clock in the morning and after football practice I would come back and work until 9 o'clock."

Don was part of the 1962 class which was the first class to attend three years at Dieruff. "I thought it was pretty neat to be in that first class that made it through all the way." Don continues, "I had a lot of good memories at Dieruff and when people would say about getting ready to graduate, I thought – gee, I wish I could be here one more year. The friends I made in school are still my friends today.

An athlete himself, Don was a three year letterman and played center on the football team (two as a starter), as well as a wrestler. "Wrestling was new to me, I decided to do that because I wasn't good at basketball," remembers Don with a laugh. Don was a good student in the College Prep courses, though he regrets the way he treated his Latin teacher, Mrs. Lucille Johnson. "I gave her a hard time in class...and I thought about it when I got older. She must have thought I was a real jerk," Don says honestly, "and I felt so sorry for her because I gave her a hard time, because she was so sweet. If I could go back, I would tell her

that I was sorry for the way I acted in class."

After graduation, Don attended college at Rutgers University and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Architecture, but one class that had given him trouble was English. "I flunked it three times until I finally passed. The funny thing was years later when I was Vice-President at the Citadel, the President of the Citadel would commend me on how well I wrote and finally I said, "You know General, I flunked English three times in college!"

After college, Don went to New York for his first job and ironically, his roommate was an old Dieruff classmate and teammate - Jerry Transue, who was the starting quarterback for two years. "Jerry and I moved into an apartment on Ocean Avenue in Brooklyn in 1967, but three months later I was drafted, so I decided to go to OCS (Officer Candidate School) and then I went into the Army."

"OCS was tough...almost like Ranger School. They only graduated 33% of the class. It was a real experience and you have to say to yourself – hey, I'm not going to quit. I'm going to make it; you'll have to throw me out." To show Don's determination, he is both Ranger and Airborne qualified and is a Master Parachutist. He also is a member of the Engineer Officer Candidate School Hall of Fame.

"I was in three wars and commanded two task forces that went into Honduras during the Contra. I spent a lot of time in the Middle East and Central America." During his tenure in the Army, Colonel Tomasik commanded engineer troops in Vietnam, during the Grenada rescue mission and served in the Middle East as a senior Staff Engineer. His decorations include the Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster, the Bronze Star Medal with three oak leaf clusters, the National Defense Service Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal with three leaf oak clusters. the Army Commendation Medal and the Army Achievement Medal. He is also a recipient of the Corps of Engineers Silvery DeFlurry Medal for service achievements.

In 1994, Don retired from the Army after 26½ years of active duty and then served as the Vice-President for Facilities and Engineering at The Citadel, before retiring in 2008. During that time he focused on a lot of construction projects that updated many facilities on campus. "I was the city manager of The Citadel. I was responsible



for all construction and maintenance, operations, public safety, the police force and even the environmental folks. I built and renovated barracks that held 500 people each and even built half a stadium."

Don and his wife Sue have an interesting story of their meeting. "We met the day before I left for the Army. They were having a farewell party for me at the Ale House on Hamilton Street and Sue walked in with her girlfriend - it was her 21st birthday. I went over and talked to her and we started writing to each other when I went into the Army. We dated for two years and then before I left for Vietnam, we got married." Don and Sue are still married and have two children and six grandchildren.


Give thanks to those who took to the air and the crews on the ground who helped get them up. Give thanks to the leaders and to those with the trust to follow.

Hall of Fame Autographed Football Winner

The winning raffle ticket for the Autographed Football was drawn at the conclusion of the Dieruff vs. Allen Football Game on October 29th. Talk about Dieruff's "Six Degrees of Separation"!

For months, people have been purchasing \$10 raffle tickets for a chance to win the valuable commemorative football signed by 38 Pro Football Hall of Fame recipients who attended the 2014 enshrinement ceremonies that honored Dieruff High School Alum Andre Reed.

The football had been donated to our Alumni Association by Joyce Hemerly Reed-Ebling (Dieruff Class of 1962). She had received the ball as a keepsake from David Baker, President of the Pro Football Hall of Fame, during the enshrinement of her son, Andre. Joyce generously presented the gift to the Alumni Association to raise funds for the "School Spirit Scholarship Fund".

Following the game played on Andre Reed Field at J. Birney Crum Stadium, Joyce was invited to draw the winning ticket. She reached into the opaque tub and selected the winning stub. Athletic Director Mel Riddick communicated the winner's name to the announcer in the broadcast booth. Powerful speakers broadcast the name throughout the stadium. No one responded.

Joyce then used her cell phone to contact the lucky winner. His name is David Balliet, Dieruff Class of 1984, with ticket number 0080. David had purchased his ticket at a neighborhood yard sale held in Midway Manor in September. Ruth O'Connell, Class of 1961 had sold him that ticket from the display table the Alumni Association had set up to market

the raffle tickets. Coincidentally, at one time, David had lived in Midway Manor and had been a student of Ruth O'Connell when she taught at Ritter School.

When Joyce connected with David on the phone, he was genuinely excited to hear that he had won the autographed football. She explored how we could get the prize in his hands, and discover that he is currently a neighbor of hers. Joyce was able to hand deliver the coveted football that evening.

Congratulations to David Balliet, and a big shout out to Joyce for her wonderful generosity. The campaign has put several thousand dollars into our scholarship treasury.






