The principle symptom of mumps is an inflammation and swelling of the lower part of the ears. The time of exposure to the appearance of symptoms is from 18 to 21 days.

As the nurse, Mrs. Edwards, pointed out, there is always some "bug" traveling around the school; therefore, these cases are nothing to get excited about. If you have never had mumps, however, do not carelessly expose yourself.

All this means is that seventeen years of education can be had by any child that wants it, without even leaving the city!

Juniors Hold Meeting

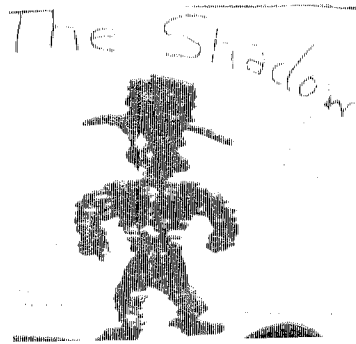
The Junior Class held a class meeting in the Little Theater on May 10. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the Junior Prom.

The Lowrey players who got hits were: Gary Enos 12A-3, and Steve Seaton, 11A-7, who got 2 hits in 3 times at bat. Goldsmith, George Stanulis 12A-8, Richard Cervie 11A-2, and Ed Powojski 12A-6 also got hits.

Ecorse got their runs in the 4th and 6th innings. Lowrey got one run in the 5th and 2 runs in the 7th inning.

This victory places Lowrey with a 1 win and 1 loss average in the league.

Jr. High Track

Lowrey Junior High track team participated in a triangular meet with Maples and Salina, on May 7. Lowrey placed first with 47 points, Salina second with 35 points, and Maples placed third with 34 points.

The team's confidence was raised by Tom Stanek who ran the 100 yard dash in 11 seconds which is better than most high school timings. Other first place events were taken by Bill Pierce in the shot put, and Larry Kenniburg in the high hurdles.

Second place ratings were in the 400 yard shuttle relay, hop, step and jump, and 75 yard dash.

Third place ratings for Lowrey were in the broad jump, 100 yard dash, 75 yard dash, shot put, and 100 yard low hurdles.

Lowrey also placed fourth in the high jump, 100 yard dash, and shot put.

Mr. Hannah, coach of the team, said, "The meet was close, very close until the end when Lowrey scored 8 points in the last two events. "Not more than 5 or 6 points separated the three teams. He thought the team did very well and said that we didn't lose a meet against the east side schools.

Reserves Lose

The Lowrey reserve baseball team was beaten by Ecorse at Geer Field by a score of 9 to 4 on Friday, May 4.

Ecorse got 9 runs on just 4 hits, while Lowrey got 4 runs on 5 hits.

Ed Anton, 10A-1, started for Lowrey but was replaced by Verne Viger, 10A-10, because he was wild and didn't have much control over the ball.

Coach Lowrey said, "The boys gave up too many runs on walks, errors, and mental lapses in the infield. It was just one of those days when the boys couldn't do anything right."

After their defeat the reserves had a 1 win, 2 loss record.

The score was close until after the sixth inning. In the bottom of the 5th the score was, Lowrey 2 and Willow Run 3.

However, in the bottom of the 6th Willow Run picked up 2 more runs making the score Willow Run 5, Lowrey 2. In the 7th the Flyers clinched the game by batting in 5 more runs. The final score was 10 to 2.
