In December, our band, under the direction of Mr. Keranan, and the chorus, led by Mr. Coedy, present the annual Christmas Concert.

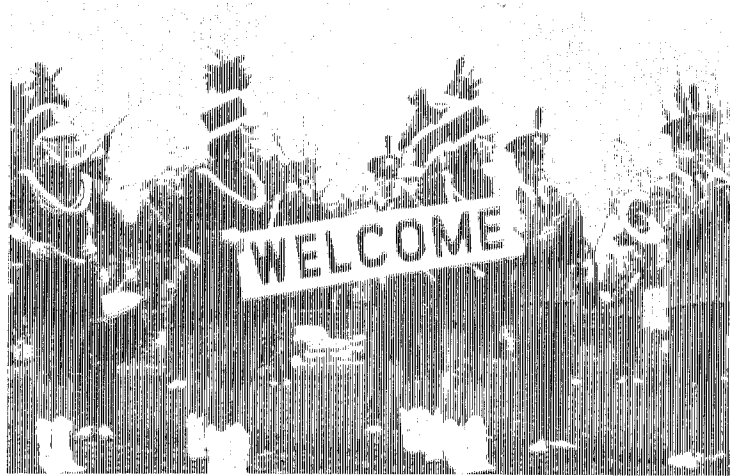
Once each semester our drama club, composed entirely of students, presents a school play.

Welcome New Students

We would like to welcome the new 10B's to Lowrey. This is the beginning of your high school days, and we would like to acquaint you with several things of which you are not now familiar.

At first the size of this school may seem huge, but as you become more familiar with it, you will eventually discover a route that will get you to your classes on time.

Days at Lowrey can be fun, but there are a few rules to follow too, such as the time schedule, boundaries at lunch time, who can drive a car to school, and so on. We would like to explain some of them now so that when you get caught you can't say you didn't hear about them.

The busses pick the students up at 3:45. But for those who stay for clubs, sports, or help in their studies, there are special activity busses at 4:45 and 6:00 p. m.

Lunch hours are fourth and fifth hours. Students can leave the school on their lunch hour, but they have to keep within the boundaries, which are: Warren Avenue — on the north, Oakman Blvd. — on the east, Hemlock Street — on the South, and Nessel Street — on the West (both sides of the street).

Students can drive to school if they are on co-op or have special permission. The student's car has to be registered; it has to be parked by the athletic field; students can not enter or move it during school; the car has to have a special sticker on it obtained from the office.

But aside from rules and regulations to follow, there are many extra curricular activities at Lowrey. There are all kinds of sports for boys — football, basketball, swimming, baseball, track and tennis. For girls there are cheerleading and majorettes. And for both boys and girls there are clubs to interest just about anyone and raise school spirit — Booster Club, Future Nurses, Bowling, Fizz-Chem, Future Teachers, Thespians, G. A. A. (for girls only), Varsity Club (for boys only), and our student ruling body, the Student Council.

Lowrey has the facilities to make your days here, if you so choose, profitable and memorable. But what you make of your high school years depends on YOU!

Student Activity Books On Sale

Lowrey High School is selling student activity books which are used for athletic events, dances, plays, and the school yearbook. School Mascot

The polar bear was adopted as the official mascot for the high school in 1946: It was formerly the mascot of the junior high.

The polar bear statue, which stands in the second floor main hall, was a project of the W.P.A. (Works Project Administration) during the depression. It was a part of the government's effort to create jobs for artists who were out of work. When it was completed, it was donated to the school by the government.

For quite a few years, the statue stood in the study hall, but was then moved to a corner of the main hall by the stairs. In April of 1961, it was moved to the middle of the main hall so that every Lowrey student could see it easily. You can show your respect for the polar bear by not leaning or writing on it.

It is also the duty of these people to help you make out your class schedules each year and to help you make wise choices, those that will benefit your future career. They are there to talk to you whenever you need to and about anything with which you want to discuss, so feel free to do so.

Here are a few simple instructions you should follow in obtaining a re-admit or a pre-excused. When a student is absent one parent must call the school the morning of the student's absence. The parent should call the school between 8:15 and 8:45 at Tel. 6-6518. The parent then explains to the student's counselor the reason for the absence. If there is no call and a student is absent it is an unexcused absence.

The day after the student's absence a re-admit slip must be obtained. The student can get a re-admit slip from his counselor in the morning before homeroom. This re-admit is to be taken to each teacher and signed by them before the hour is over.

If for any reason a student plans to be absent he should obtain a pre-excused absence slip from Mr. Dzovigian the day before the absence. This pre-excused slip must be signed by each teacher and turned in to the office that night before going home.

Lowrey Offers Many Sports

Lowrey High School offers many sports for its students. Our fall sport is football and the varsity coach is Mr. Bach, and the reserve coaches are Mr. Rice and Mr. Gretzner. Tryouts This Spring

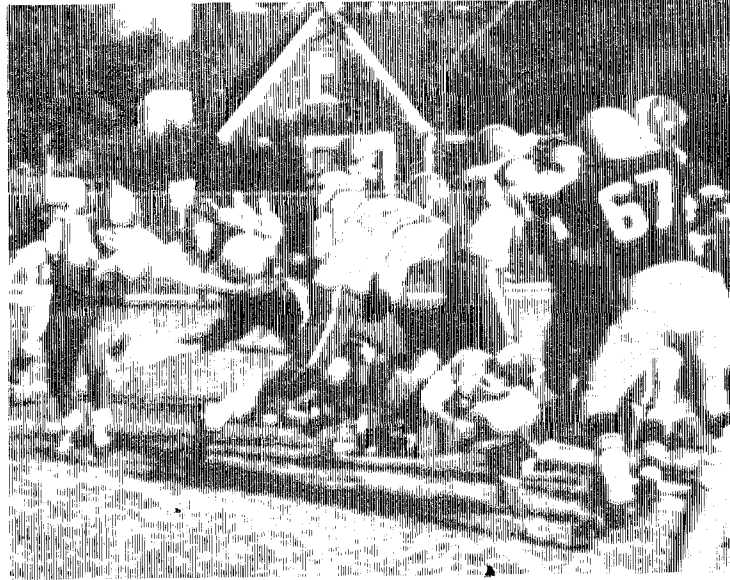
