In a joint venture which should inspire more club activity, two Lowrey clubs, Future Nurses and Thespians, are planning a novel Christmas gift for the Elementary Braille students. The plan, which is already under way, is to make tape recordings of several stories which are written specifically for this age group.

With advice from Mrs. Zudick, Mrs. Edwards and Future Nurses selected appropriate books. Then volunteer readers from both Thespians and Future Nurses meet each day at noon to make the recordings. Each story is dramatized by a narrator plus one reader for each character. As they read, Mr. Meredith or one of Thespians' Sound technicians engineers the recording. They will then "dub" a musical prologue and epilogue for each story, and the tapes will be ready for use.

Present plans are to record at least twelve stories.

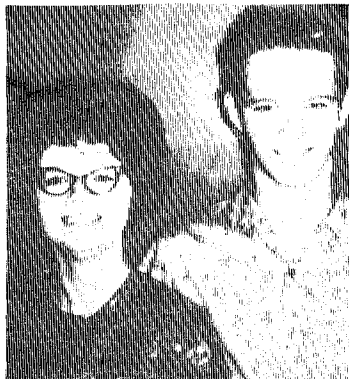
Open House Held

The art department produced the cover and division pages while Miss LaMarca sponsored the book. She sponsored thirteen publications of the Futorian, from 1949 to 1961.

Futorian Sales Results

Lowrey's 1963 Futorian sale is now over. The goal was to sell 500 annuals and 503 were sold. How does this compare to previous sales? While talking to Mr. Falvo, the sponsor of the annual this year and last, and Miss LaMarca, the sponsor previous to that, many facts were learned. The Meaning Of Thanksgiving

Leaders among the pilgrim fathers had been members of a letter congregation of Separatists. They had gathered to worship in secret at William Brewster's Manor House in the village of Scrooby in Nottinghamshire. Spied upon, found out, and persecuted they determined to seek a home where they could worship as they chose. They escaped to Holland in 1608. In Leyden these English farming folk founded a church and a religious community. Even with their religious freedom they did not feel at home in the Dutch industrial and commercial city. Many had a hard struggle to earn a living in unfamiliar work. Parents worried for fear their children would grow up as Dutchmen. After long discussion they decided to go into the wilds of the New World where they might keep their native language and customs. Three years were spent making necessary arrangement. They obtained a patent from the Virginia compound of London to settle in the territory then called Virginia. Lacking money to buy supplies and pay expenses, they contracted with a group of merchants to finance them. In return they had to promise to work seven years and share everything they produced with the merchants.

The Pilgrims left England because King James I did not permit freedom of religion. Everyone was expected to belong to the official state church, the church of England. Some groups of people objected to certain of its practices. The Puritans set out to "purify" the state church. The Separatists wanted to have a separate denomination.

Is Smoking Worth It ?

Lung cancer death rates have increased 950 % in recent years even though the overall death rate in the United States has decreased, according to John F. King, M.D., a guest speaker at a high school press conference concerning cigarettes and lung cancer, sponsored by the American Cancer Society. Guest speakers included Arthur J. Vorwald, M.D., Doctor Oscar Auerbach, Walter G. James, and Doctor John F. King. The conference was held at Wayne State University on November 7, and attended by Diane Peirce 12B6, and Mr. Lowry, Journalism Advisor.

It was pointed out by Doctor King that the causes of lung cancer have been directly related to the pollution of the air we breathe from smoking. The greater the amount of smoke the less oxygen our lungs receive.

Another frightening statistic was related by Doctor King, who quoted a statement made by the College of Physicians in England, "One out of every eight persons who smoke will have lung cancer." It was also pointed out that 95% of the victims of lung cancer of the bronchial tubes do NOT recover.

Many people start to smoke when they are in their teens. Walter James pointed out that "The greatest increase in smokers has been shown to occur at 14 years old."

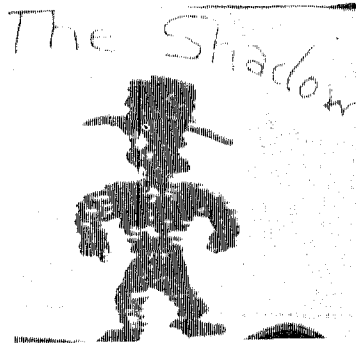
The statistics presented concerning cigarettes and lung cancer are impressive and shouldn't be ignored. Every individual must decide for himself if he wants to smoke; however, it is something that should be seriously thought about.
