

Pearl Harbor Day Recalled

On this day, 21 years ago, our country was plunged into World War II by the tragic event of Pearl Harbor. The following is a brief history which may help many of us to understand what actually happened on that day.

During the night of December 6, 1941, the United States destroyer *Ward* detected a submarine in the defensive area outside of Pearl Harbor. The submarine was attacked with depth charges and subsequently sunk. The incident failed to alarm the army and navy commands. On December 7, 1941, at about 7:55 a. m., Japanese aircraft, consisting of an estimated 150 to 200 fighting, bombing and torpedo planes were launched from three or four carriers, and made a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor. Among the 86 naval vessels moored there at the time and consisting of the entire Pacific Fleet were eight battleships, seven cruisers, 28 destroyers, and five submarines. Of the 19 vessels sunk or severely damaged by Japanese bombs and torpedoes, the 26-year old battleship *Arizona* was the only one totally and permanently lost, the others being salvaged and most of them restored to active service.

The enemy raiders also destroyed 80 naval aircraft of all types and 97 army planes on Hickam and Wheeler fields. Navy and Marine Corps casualties numbered 2,117 officers and men killed, 960 missing, and 876 wounded. Army casualties were 226 officers and enlisted men killed or died of wounds, and 396 wounded. Civilian casualties numbered 49 dead and 83 wounded. The attack of Pearl Harbor was the immediate cause of United States entrance into World War II.

Chorus Joins In Ford Xmas Tree Lighting

All school choirs originally scheduled to appear at the Ford Rotunda "Christmas Fantasy," participated in combined chorus in the Christmas tree lighting program which took place Sunday at 5 p.m. December 2, 1962 at the front of the Ford Central Office Building (Michigan and Southfield) out of doors.

The following Christmas numbers were sung by all the combined school groups:

Three special numbers were sung separately. The combined Fordson Chorus sang "Glory to God In the Highest;" the St. Francis Home for Boy's sang "Angels We Have Heard on High"; and the Ford Chorus sang "Christ is Coming to Earth This Night."

Mr. Coedy, director of the Ford Choir, directed all the choirs during the program.

Warm, unseasonable weather combined with strong interest in the program to produce a crowd estimated at 40,000 at the program.

All choirs were originally scheduled to sing in the Ford Rotunda. Fire caused cancellation of this program so Ford officials decided to conduct a program which combined a tree lighting ceremony with the singing of the choirs.

In addition to High School choirs, the Lowrey Elementary music class also took part with four other elementary schools. All together there were twenty-five choirs consisting of approximately 2,000 people who took part in the program.

The tree which was lit on Sunday evening at 5:30 is 75 feet high and had about 70,000 lights. It was lit by Santa who arrived in a helicopter which landed on the roof of the building.

Lowrey Choir members agreed that the program was beautiful, impressive, and a great success.

On behalf of the student body and faculty the Lowrey Light would like to extend its deepest sympathy to all the friends and relatives of Mr. Wonders. We were saddened and shocked by his untimely death.

Come on kids! Join these classes and show your artistic talents.



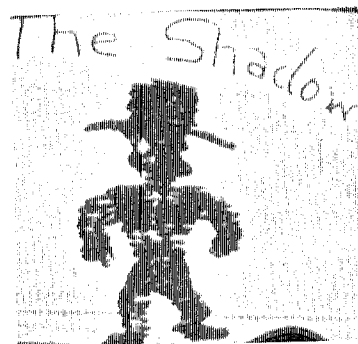
Junior Spotlight

Math Students

The sixth annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition will be given during the morning of December 13.

The purpose of this test is to foster a wider interest in mathematics and focus attention on the importance of mathematics.

The examination is given in two parts. The first part is designed to test the general mathematical background of the student. The second part is designed to measure the mathematical maturity of the student.

The results will be announced at the end of January. Approximately \$2,000 in scholarship awards will be given. In addition the state colleges award numerous scholarships to students who are among the top 300 participants. The first-place winner receives a gold medal and six others receive silver medals.

Although all high school students are eligible to enter the competition. This is an annual examination which costs a fee of 50 cents to cover costs of printing, mailing, and grading. The list of contestants was mailed into the committee on November 14.

Lowrey's swimming team lost its season's first meet to Willow Run by the close score of 54-51. The meet was held at Willow Run High School on Tuesday, December 4. The following is a recap of the meet in the order that the events appeared:

200 yard medley relay — Lowrey had Gendron, Sawicki, Bohner, and Hughes turning in a winning time of 2:16.

200 yard free style—Ghetia and McElmurry took 3rd and 4th with the best time being 2:47 by Ghetia.

50 yard free style—Davis placed first with a time of 25.4 seconds, with Gregory taking third.

200 yard individual medley—Graham took second with 3:05 and Viger took third place.

Diving—Wollas took second place with 36.3 points, with Lukaschewski, a 10th grader, placed last.

100 yard butterfly—Lowrey's Graham took first with a time of 1:23.

100 yard free style—Davis took his second first with a time of 57.7 seconds.

100 yard back stroke—Gendron took a strong first by beating his nearest contender by 10 seconds. His time was 1:10. Zwarka placed a close third.

400 yard free style—Ghetia and Lukaschewski placed second and third.

100 yard brest stroke—Sawicki won a close race with a time of 1:19. Davidge placed third.

200 yard free style relay—With the meet hanging on this last event, Lowrey's Gregory, Hughes, Bohner and Saxon couldn't pull it out. They lost by 5 seconds.

Swimming is scored by each event being totaled at the end of the meet. Each school is allowed two entries, with 1st—5 points, 2nd—3 points, 3rd—1 point, and 4th—0. In the two relays, each school has one relay with first place scoring 8 points and second place 4 points.
