## Labor Statistics

Ever changing is the statue of the unemployment rate of American men and women.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the unemployment rate of persons 14 to 19 years of age in 1962 was much higher than persons 20 years of age and over, 13.4% as against 4.9%. Women had an unemployment rate slightly higher than that for males, 6.2% compared with 5.3% in 1962. The average length of unemployment in 1962 was about 14.7 weeks, less than 15.5 weeks in 1961, but greater than the 12.8 weeks in 1960.

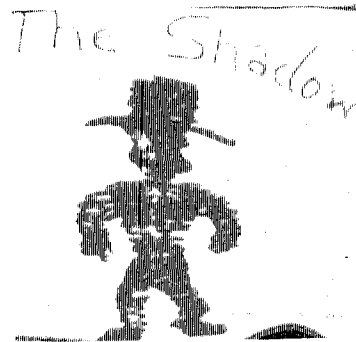

## CHEATING: IS EVERYBODY DOING IT?

The information for the following article was made available through the Ingenue Student Press Service.

We believe that the pressure on students in Lowrey High is not as great as that mentioned in this publication, however, we feel the author's observation of the risks and damage that results from cheating are worth repeating.

"One bright young high school junior has the answer to an inquiry about who's cheating. "About 90 per cent". What about the other 10 percent? she was asked. "They are the ones we copy from," was her reply.

A survey conducted in 1962 bore out this student's estimate and showed that 87 percent of the teenagers polled openly admitted to cheating in school.

Why has cheating become a major problem to today's high school and college students? One girl replied to the interviewer, "In your day . . . knowledge came first marks were secondary. But now it's marks, marks, marks! Who cares about an E for effort . . . it's A's or nothing."

Some of the questioned students indicated great concern about the prevalence of cheating in school. "It's just not right" . . . "It's wrong and it's not fair. You work to get an 88.6 average honestly and then you may not make the honor roll. But many kids who cheat make it." Another said, "Cheating's not worth it. It's just too expensive—in the long run."

One expert in the psychology of young people, Dr. Edgar A. Levenson, is interested in what makes teen-agers cheat. He feels cheating is actually a symptom of other problems. Some cheaters actually want to get caught, says Dr. Levenson. It's a way of signalling adults that they are upset about something. Others cheat because they enjoy "putting one over on the teachers;" some because they simply are not prepared in class.

Teachers who give the same test to more than one class often find that the class taking the test first disclosed the answers to other classes, resulting in higher grades for the students taking the test later in the day.

Who does the most cheating? Teachers say the students headed for college are most often guilty.

They blame pressure from parents and college admissions offices to get good grades. But as the New Jersey teacher put it, the student who cheats his way into college, doesn't stay there long.

What can be done about cheating? Only the students can take steps to stop it. You must realize that it's damaging to you personally and really does little to improve your academic standing."



## Lowrey Student Top Ranked

First division rating at Michigan's State Solo and Ensemble Festival was achieved by a Lowrey student, Mark McFarlane, 10A-6, clarinet player in the Lowrey High School Band. The Festival took place in Kalamazoo, Michigan, on March 23. Mark was one of the 22 of the 56 clarinet competitors who received first division rating, and the first student from Lowrey ever to achieve first rating in the Festival.

In order to be eligible for the state competition, Mark had to win rating in the district competition, which took place in Ypsilanti in February. Approximately 3400 persons participated in the district competition compared to the 1400 in the state competition.

A form was sent to Lowrey for any student who wished to sign up to participate in the district competition. In the state competition, Mark was required to play a solo from memory. He was accompanied by Diane Houle, 12A-4, on the piano. This comment was made by Mark. "I think Diane is a great piano player and I couldn't have done it without her." Mark was awarded a medal from the Festival.

Mark is on a college preparatory course here at Lowrey and he has been a member of the band for three semesters. Mark has played the clarinet for 7 years. He hopes to either go on to college and join the college band or enter the Air Force Academy. Another comment from Mark was, "The Festival is a great idea! It gives the kids a chance to express themselves, and show what they can do. The Festival is an opportunity to show what you are capable of doing. I am going to enter the district competition again next year, and if I am fortunate, I will go on to the state competition."

Cheerleaders for '63-'64 were chosen on April 2 by the present cheerleaders and a few faculty members. Raymonde Egli, Jean Sawicki and Sharon Char were chosen regulars, and Pat Moore and Colleen Mack were chosen alternates. Congratulations to these girls and all those who tried out.

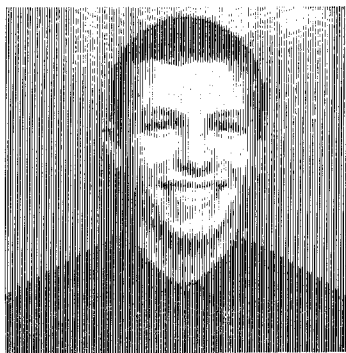

## Annual Completed

The annual has been completed! Mr. Falvo, sponsor of the "Futorian" said that this year the annual has been much improved: There are 76 pages divided, activities and sports divisions; this year the juniors have individual pictures by homerooms; the tenth grade homeroom group pictures are larger; the book has a custom cover, and there is a senior index, telling what activities the seniors have participated in throughout their years at Lowrey.

As for next year's annual, Mr. Falvo said, "Tentatively, the goal for pre-sales next year will be 600 copies, and every attempt will be made to raise the number of pages anywhere from 84 to 96 pages." The number of pages will be in proportion to the number of pre-sales.

Before the end of the semester next year's editor will be announced.
