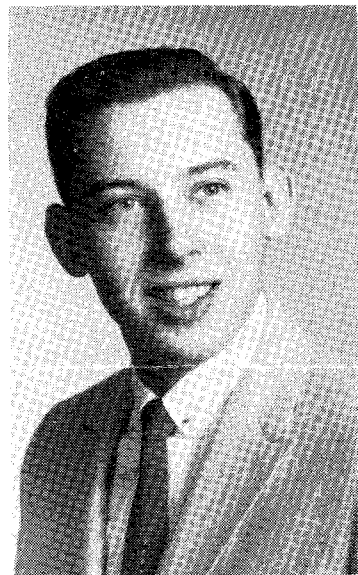


Lowrey Students Attend Plays

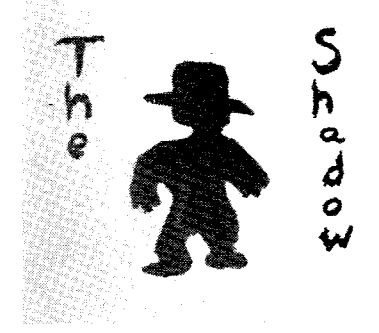

Walking Zebras

While taking a walk down the main hall of Lowrey one will notice that there are quite a number of students with the Lowrey "L" and a large number of students with pins, stripes, and an occasional star. It is probably puzzling as to what these symbols mean.

A person who has enough credit in a varsity sport receives a letter from the coach of that sport. That person may also buy a pin which designates the sport in which the letter was earned.

The Varsity Club Constitution says that a senior can wear a white knit coat or pullover sweater.

BEAT Cherry Hill

The senior wears a white stripe on his left sleeve to show the number of years he has been in competition. Underclassmen can wear a grey knit coat or pullover sweater. An underclassman wears a red stripe.

The number above the stripe tells what year the individual will graduate. An athlete with a star on his right sleeve is a captain of one of the teams.
