Armistice Day History

World War I was a full-scale war which involved 23 countries. It was fought from July 28, 1914, to November 11, 1918. On one side were the central powers, including Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria. On the other side were the Allies, including Britain, France, the U.S., Russia and Italy. The causes for the war stemmed from a struggle for power and territory. Great Britain and France had seized parts of Africa so Germany tried to take Morocco. France and Britain stopped Germany, but she continued to build up her military and naval power. Both Russia and Austria were attempting to control the Balkans and most of the countries in Europe had some interest in this area. Each country wanted something it didn't have.

World War I began one month after the heir to the Austrian throne, Archduke Ferdinand, was shot by a Serbian. Within six months nearly all the major powers were in the war.

Germany could not get Belgium's permission to pass through Belgium in order to reach France so she attacked Belgium with 200,000 men. This brought Britain into the war. Liege and Brussels fell and the Germans drove deep into France. 1915 saw the Germans sinking Allied ships with submarines called U-boats. The Austrians overran Serbia, and, by 1916, the Germans had attacked Verdun, the Allies had won the Battle of Somme, and half of Rumania had been seized by the Germans.

The U.S. entered the war in 1917 after Germany sank several U.S. merchant ships. This was the year the Russians forced the Czar to abdicate and signed an armistice with the Germans. In 1918, after many fierce battles, Bulgaria had surrendered, Austria-Hungary seemed ready to stop and Turkey was wavering. The German socialists demanded an armistice and the German Kaiser fled to The Netherlands. On November 11, 1918 the Armistice was signed.

In the United States and England, Veterans or Armistice Day is observed by a two minute silence at eleven o'clock, the hour when the war ceased in 1918. Ceremonies are held at the tombs of the unknown Soldiers of France, England, and America. The President of the United States lays a wreath on the tomb in Arlington National Cemetery. Thus do nations remember their war heroes.

Veteran's Day Memorial Monday

Lowrey's entire school body will participate in the Veteran's Day Memorial at the flag pole on Monday, November 11, 1963, weather permitting.

Barbara Riach, president of the student council, will introduce the program, and Mr. Openlander superintendent of Dearborn's public schools. He will comment on Veteran's Day and its history.

Then Mr. Romanow, Lowrey principal, will tell of the plaque in our main hallway. This is dedicated to the boys who died in World War II. The plaque says:

"In memory of those who died so that generations to follow may live in peace and happiness."

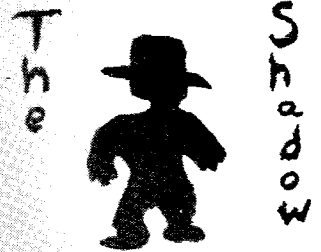

Cast Selected For School Play

Many of our most prominent persons, from presidents down, inform us that for relaxation after the cares and worries of the day they like to turn the pages of a good mystery book. Similarly, among stage plays, no type has proved more steadily popular with audiences since the days of Shakespeare than the mystery. And among present day writers of mystery plays, few have won a larger popular following than James Reach whose newest success, "House of Horrors," a mystery force in three acts, will be the next presentation of the Thespian Players.

According to the Thespian Players, "House of Horrors" is one of the most ingenious, best written and mystifying plays available for production today. They are confident it will surpass in local popularity anything they have ever attempted before. The play will be presented on November 20 and 21.

Teacher's Spotlight

Miss Valentine of our school's language department is a native of New York State. Her parents moved to Michigan, where she finished her education at Eastern Michigan University. She now holds a master's degree in counseling and guidance, and has minors in French and physical education. Classes for credit beyond her degree were taken by her at Wayne State University.

The first school at which she taught was Lowrey and she has been here for twenty-one years.— She worked as a physical education instructor for seventeen years, when four years ago an opportunity came to teach French. Although she speaks Italian fluently and has taken many college hours of French, she attended summer school before starting her classes here. The next year, she began teaching high school classes as well as junior high and is now handling almost all French classes. She says that "It was an opportunity and there was interest on my part, but there was more than that; it was a challenge." The challenge was successfully met for we now have a very good French program.

Miss Valentine feels there is a need to expand French courses to include a third year of study. She says that language is a difficult course which many students avoid because they can't earn high marks, but there is enough interest to make an expanded program feasible.

Her greatest satisfaction in teaching is having students tell her that she has helped them. About teaching here at Lowrey, she says, "I like it very much. I have no desire to go anywhere else."

Math Contest To Be Held

Lowrey students will participate again this year in the annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition. This year, seventh since the contest was started, competitive tests will be given on Thursday, November 14, in most Michigan secondary schools. These examinations consist of forty multiple-choice problems involving high school mathematics but requiring unusual ingenuity and imagination. A second set of several proof problems will be given next spring for those students who score highly on the first examination.

A first prize of one hundred dollars is awarded to the winner, but high scores are also valuable in obtaining scholarships for further study in college. High scorers last year from Lowrey were Mike Press and Steve Kornblum.

Posters such as the one in our front lobby are another contribution made by the club.

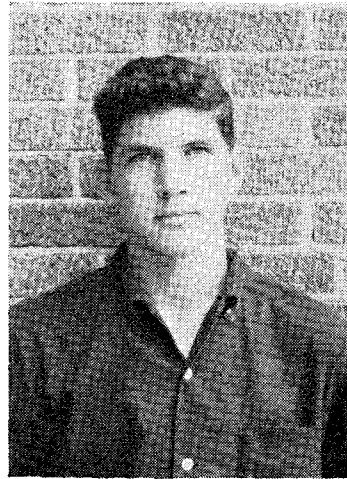
Eligibility for the club picture in the annual will be determined by a picture committee.

Lowrey's Junior High Football Team defeated Edison Junior High 13-0 on Wednesday, October 30 at Edison. Paul Galin was the star of the game. Paul kept the Polar Bears' spirits high by playing a wonderful defensive game. This kept the score tied until the offense was able to roll again.

Polar Bears Set Record

By defeating Cherry Hill 20 to 6 on Friday, October 26, Lowrey tied for first place in the Tri-River League. We share the title with Riverside who defeated Haston 27 to 6.

At the end of the half the score was 14 to 0. The first touchdown was scored on a pass from Doug Cole, 11B-2, to Frank Perri, 11B-8. The second touchdown was a pass from Louie Seymour, 11B-9, to Frank Perri again. The score remained this way until the third quarter. Next Chris Stevens, 12B-10, ran the ball for a 38 yard gain. This helped to set up another touchdown. Chris then carried the ball for another 7 yards. It was on this play that he sprained his ankle. He was immediately removed from the game for fear of seriously injuring him. Don DeMayo, 12B-2, took the ball and ran 2 yards for the third touchdown.

Dave Bogataj, 12B-1, did a splendid job of kicking the extra points. He made two extra points by kicking the ball between the goalposts. He made three attempts.

Lowrey lost its night football game at Willow Run on Friday, November 1, by a score of 34-0. Willow Run is rated as the best class B team in the state, and won the Twin Valley League championship this year.

First quarter, Willow Run scored after a bad pass from center over Ron Kubisiak's head, for six points. In the second quarter a pass from Louis Seymour was intercepted and run for a touchdown. Willow Run ran the ball for an extra point. After half-time, Don Maynard threw a 61 yard pass to Dishman for another touchdown. An extra point was scored by running the ball. Sam Hicks of Willow Run broke open for a fifteen yard run over the line in the fourth quarter, then ran for the extra point to complete the game at 34-0.

It was our last game of the year, but very few Lowrey students turned out; only 20 of our 923 students attended the game. Let's have more school spirit for basketball.
