## Voting Age Proposal

During the present session of the Michigan legislature, State Representatives Paul Chandler and Harry A. DeMaso will sponsor legislation aimed bringing forth a constitutional amendment which would lower the minimum voting age from 21 to 18 years.

Some comments were obtained from a few senior high social studies teachers.

Mr. Newton's comment was, "I believe that the kids are intelligent enough to vote at 18 have a general and fundamental knowledge of government which has not been tainted by prejudice, and they are more willing to look at the issues for what they are rather than reading possibilities into them. Young men and women are usually considered adults in cases of crime, military responsibilities, or marriage responsibilities at the age of 18. A country, generally, has been run by old men for the past one and a half centuries. They have not done a remarkable job as evidence by the wars in the past century. Most of the world leaders of today are old men. As examples De Gaulle, Khrushchev, Johnson, Adenauer and Erhart. So if the adults can look around with pride, let them."

Mr. De Stigter's comment, "If the young people are to assume the responsibilities let them vote."

Mr. Betting's comment: "lower the voting age to 18? emphatically no . . . i've been polling my classes for years about voting at 18 and i almost always find a majority opposed. frequently those who demand it are the least worthy as students, as citizens, as persons. the thoughtful seem to want more time."

So why not set up a challenge? Lower the voting age to 20 by the year 1970 if teens do their share to bring about a significant drop in juvenile delinquency.

## Polar Bears Top South Lyons

Lowrey's varsity basketball team defeated South Lyons, Tuesday, January 28, by the score of 64-52, at O.W. Best school. This was the Bears second straight nonleague encounter, and their second straight victory.

The Bears got off to a fast start, and were leading 13-3 early in the first quarter, but they cooled off a little and the score at the end of the quarter was 17-8. In the second quarter the Bears kept dominating the play with key baskets and a tight defense. The score ended at halftime in Lowrey's favor, 34-17.

In the second half it was an entirely different story. The Bears played very poorly on defense, and the shooting was terrible. As a result the South Lyons team cut the margin from 17 points to 6 points in the third. The score at the end of the quarter was 41-34, with 8 minutes of playing time still remaining. In the fourth quarter the large crowd came to life to cheer their team on as South Lyons cut the score to 48-42, but this was the closest they could get. The team realized they were letting up and could lose this game after all, so they started to work and led when the final buzzer went off by the score of 64-52.

High scores in the game for the Bears were Doug Cole with 20 points and LeRon Parayaski with 16 points. The Bears now have played 8 games and will play Riverside Friday, February 14, in an away game. Lowrey has two non-league games left, one with Lutheran West away, and a contest with its arch rival, Romulus, in late February. With this victory over South Lyons, the Bears are now 7-1 on the season.

Coach Rice was disappointed in the team and hopes for a better game next week.

## Swimmers Beaten Record Now 9-1

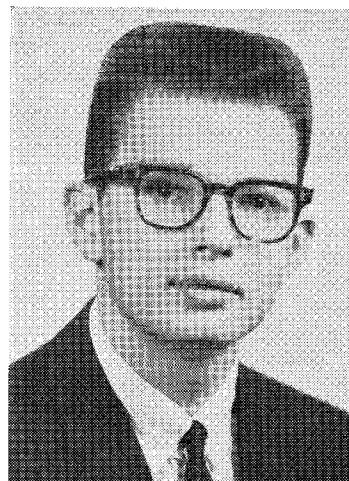
