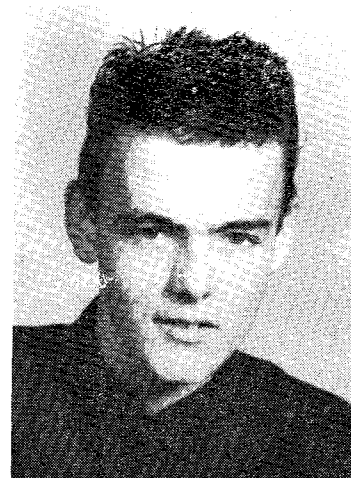

William Wencel, 10A-3, wrote an original poem for the occasion which was enjoyed by Mrs. Koehler's classes.

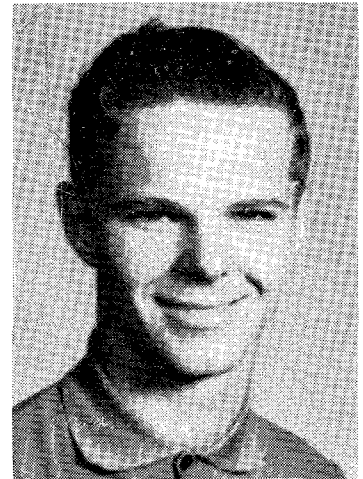
Students "Active" in Local Politics

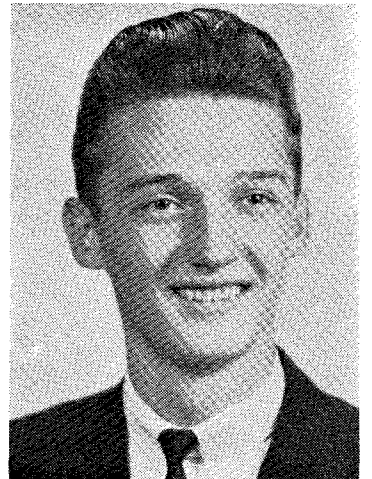
Niemic also pitched a fine game as he gave up only 5 hits and struck out 10 batters.
