History of Graduation

The history of graduation goes back to the Middle Ages when European Universities first held commencement exercises. American educational institutions still have many of the European graduation customs. Usually there are two special graduation ceremonies—the baccalaureate service is a religious service, usually held on the Sunday before commencement. The diplomas are given out in the commencement exercises.

It is a custom at many high schools and some colleges for the val- the graduating class to make fare- well speeches to their schools. The edictorian and solutatorian of valedictorian is the graduate with the highest marks, and the sal- utatorian is a graduate with the second highest marks.

It is also customary for the Senior Class Proshency at the commence- Class to read the Class Will and ment exercises as well as present a gift to the school.

Caps and gowns originated in 1530 when the important men of the churches wore them at special ceremonies. The caps and gowns were carried over to the more learned men of various cities; they wore their gowns as a mark of prestige and nobleness. Later, it was adopted by such universities as Oxford and Cambridge as a part of their official graduation ceremonies.

Today, caps and gowns are the official and traditional costumes of students in many countries of the world. In most cases students wear caps and gowns only at graduation exercises and on special occasions.

A student wears a long full-flowing robe and a tight fitting skull cap attached to a stiff square piece dangles from the center of the mor- called a mortarboard. A tassel tarboard. In addition to the cap and gown, a college graduate wears a cape or hood lined with colored silk and trimmed with velvet.

All collegiate caps, gowns and hoods are black. The cut of the robe and its sleeves, as well as its trimming, indicate various academic degrees. Source: *World Book Encyclopedias*.

In September, 1961, three hundred and eleven awestruck 10B's entered Lowrey High School to spend three wonderful, laugh-filled, (and problems-filled) productive years. In June, 1964, two hundred and fifty confident 12A's will graduate from Lowrey to spend the rest of their lives as they see fit.

Students from District 2, (Clara B. Ford, now Fairlane) and District 7, (Annapolis, now O. W. Best) came to Lowrey as two separate groups. However, they did not stay that way for long; they soon became a united group, making friends, working together, and sharing good times. The class officers chosen to represent us in our sophomore year were; Linda Sevensen, President; Sylvia Segal, vice president; Lynn Christie, secretary; and Pat Schmidt, treasurer.

Sophomore year, 1961-1962, saw our class selling concessions of popcorn, candy and coke at football and basketball games, and we also sold Lowrey pins that year. We sponsored a sophomore dance, Spring Fling, on May 25, which was rather successful.

Representing our junior class as officers were; Bob Srednicki, president; Alyse Satoh, vice president; Sandy Zvoch, secretary; and Dennis Sundermeyer, treasure. In 1962-1963 we again found ourselves selling concessions, Lowrey "L" pins, and a new addition, book covers. The last Junior Prom ever to be held at Lowrey was ours. February 23, 1963, marked the conclusion of an old Lowrey tradition, the "J Hop" or junior prom, of which ours was entitled "Wonderland by Night." We sponsored our first and only car wash which was not as successful as we hoped it to be. A Sponge Dance was sponsored by our class in November of our junior year which turned out to be quite a "lemon." It seems that our junior class found itself more "in the swing of things."

Beginning our senior year were the thrilling plans for Homecoming. Our beautiful queen, Carol Smolinski, reigned regally on October 4, 1963. By her side and equally lovely were senior attendants Elaine Macie and Gwen Snow. We brought a little of the old duties into our senior year (concessions selling) along with many new ones such as selling "L.H.S. 1964" mortar board senior pins, graduation announcements and personal graduating cards. And, of course, —as if any senior could forget—the long struggle to get those Futorian Sales up to the 500 mark. We made it though, with the undivided attention of Mr. Falvo and the Futorian staff.

Also, how can we ever forget our senior tobaggan party at Rouge Park during Christmas vacation? The seniors scattered about quite a bit, but fun and freezing limbs were experienced by everyone who attended. Because of lack of publicity, the seniors' bowling party held this past April, was not a howling success to say the least!

Today we will be leaving the hallowed halls of Lowrey to step into the future with our three years here only a memory.

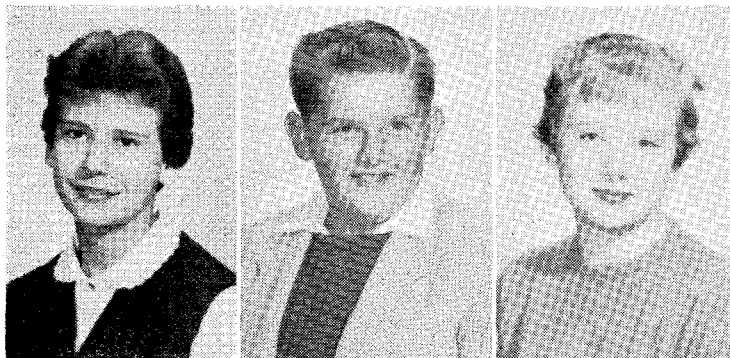
I wish success for all of you. I also hope that I may have been of some help in your gaining success."

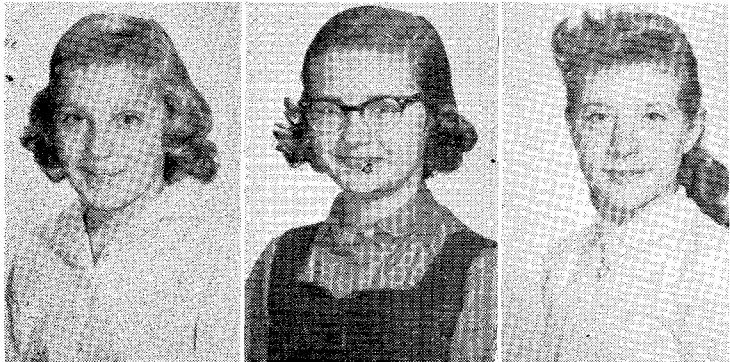
