

The Sophemore Class elected its new officers on Friday, October 3, during homeroom period.


Over three hundred fifty ballots decided the five winners out of the competing twelve.

Football Terms Flyers Nip Bears

DEFENSE: Attempting to impede the progress of the team possessing the ball.

OFFENSE: The team in possession of the ball.

POINT-AFTER-TOUCHDOWN: An extra point which may be made by a team scoring a touchdown. May be made by running, passing, or kicking.

REFEREE: The chief official; positions himself behind the offensive team.

SIGNALS: Numbers which may designate the play as well as the moment to snap the ball.

TOUCHDOWN: When a team has possession of the ball in the end zone of the defending team. (Scores 6 points.)

END ZONE: Ten-yard area between the goal line and the end of the field.

FIELD GOAL: Drop kicking or place kicking the ball over the crossbar from scrimmage. (Scores 3 points.) FLANKER: An offensive back lined up outside his end.

GOAL LINES: Lines marking the ends of the 100 yard playing field. HALF-TIME: Rest period between the second and third quarter.

OFF SIDE: Crossing the line of scrimmage before the ball is hiked. QUARTER: One of four periods of playing time (12 minutes in high school.)

SAFETY: When a ball is downed by the offensive team behind its own goal line or is forced out of the end zone. (Scores 2 points for the defense.)

Lowrey's varsity football team dropped its second game of the year to Willow Run on Friday, October 2, by a score of 32-24. It left the Bears with a 1-2 record.

It was a hard fought game in which the score was always close, but the Bears couldn't get the lead.

In the first quarter Willow Run got off to a quick 13-0 lead. The Bears scored early in the second quarter and trailed 13-6. Cole hit Perri with a long touchdown pass. Then Jon Hall ran the ball in from the 5 yard line; and the Bears now trailed 13-12. This was the score at halftime.

In the second half it turned into a hard fought game. Willow Run got a quick touchdown and led, 19-12. The Bears came right back with Perri catching a pass from Cole. It left the score at 19-18 at the end of the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter, Willow Run got another touchdown; it looked hopeless for the Bears. But they battled back to score another touchdown on a long run by Tim Malyszek. This made the score 25-24, still in the favor of the Flyers. But with the Bears pressing to get the ball, the Flyers ran a long touchdown with just a few seconds remaining. This ended the game with Lowrey on the short end of a 32-24 score.

It must be noted that the Bears did not score a single point after a touchdown, and this brought about the loss. And it should also be noted that Bradley St. Andrew, a senior at Lowrey, suffered a broken arm in the game and is out for the rest of the season.
