Have you ever seen a little girl crushed by a car? She doesn't just take it as a joke and walk away . . . she bleeds, and she cries, and sometimes she even dies.





# Homemaker of Tomorrow

Linda Wilkinson has been named Lowrey's 1965 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She scored highest in a written homemaking examination taken by senior girls on December 1, and is now eligible for state and national honors.

Test papers of all school Homemakers of Tomorrow in the state are currently being judged. The state's highest ranking girl will receive a

\$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. The state runner-up will be awarded a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica from Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc.

Later this spring, The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join first-place winners and advisors from each of the 50 states and District of Columbia in a tour of colonial Williamsburg, Virginia, Washington, D.C., and New York City. Climax of the week-long tour will be the naming of the Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. To be chosen on the basis of original test score and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third, and fourth place winners in the nation will have their grants raised to \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000, respectively.

The Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow was initiated by General Mills in 1954 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Including this year's record enrollment of more than half a million senior girls in more than 14,000 high schools, the total number of participants during the program's eleven year history stands at four millio. Scholarship grants exceed \$1 million.

## Jrs. Take Test

On January 18 the entire junior class took the Otis-Gama Intelligence Test. This test is used in terms of scheduling, and is used for part of training for college entrance and to measure ability in verbal areas.

The Madden-Peak Test, another test taken that day, deals with arithmetic. It is an achievement test, and a skill test. They are marked in a cut-off score to see who takes refresher math. This test is just part of the testing program. The results are in your counselor's office if you are interested in finding out what you received on it.

On March 13 the National Merit Scholastic Qualifying Test will be taken at Oakley W. Best. This test shows the college you wish to attend what your ability in progression is. The questions on this test are, for the most part, grouped according to the major areas of the high school instructional program. The results show the kinds of situations the students will experience later. The test will cover five areas. These are English, mathematics, social studies, natural science, and word usage.

Teen as well as adults refuse to get involved—to think for themselves. They stick with a crowd and think only of themselves.


When people won't become involved and conformity is the only pattern of life, we will stop thinking for ourselves and that is when people become a herd of sheep, ready to be led in any direction.



## Physical Education as a Career

High school students! Do you like to do things to help other people? Are you seriously interested in many different athletic activities? If your answer is yes to both of these questions you should consider a career in teaching Physical Education.

Our bodies need excercies and we need someone to teach us how to excercise properly from an early age.

To be a Physical Education teacher you must go to college and complete the required courses.

The subjects that the student will be taking his first two years in college are generally the same name classes he takes in high school. Some of these are English, Math, Social Studies, and Sciences.

The second two years the student will get down to his major in Physical Education and two minors. The student may choose any minors such as English, Math, or Science to name a few. He learns about the various parts of the body such as the muscles, joints, and tendons and how various excercises will affect them. He also takes classes in coaching many sports such as football, basketball, and baseball.

A Physical Education teacher must be able to work with boys and girls He must be able to understand children and be a friend as well as a teacher.

## Science News - Cigarette Smoking

Reverse smoking: A group of doctors have currently come up with some very amazing results after studying the direct relationship between smoking and lung cancer in the inhabitants of the Caribbean islands.

## Tankers Nip Hamtramck 53-48


The Polar Bears of Lowrey, despite a disqualification in the final event, managed to nose out Hamtramck on Thursday, January 6, by the score of 53-48.


