Last Thursday, May 27, the senior high presented an annual talent show. Students attended during the first three hours. We would like to compliment the students on their fine performances.




Senior Speakers Are Reece Schalte


really feel that this would be a most worthwhile and enjoyable experience for anyone.

The top award to the winning team will be an all-expense trip to Detroit as guests of Chrysler-Plymouth Division of Chrysler Motors Corporation to compete in the 1965 National Finals on June 21, 22, and 23. There, the local winners will compete against the outstanding young auto mechanics in the nation for more prizes, which include \$16,700 in scholarships with which the student can continue their technical training.

Science News Gemini Project

Gemini—The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) said recently that the space craft will land in the Atlantic rather than the Pacific Ocean as planned. One of the astronauts will take a "space stroll".

The space ship is expected to achieve a high orbit of 185 miles and a low orbit of 99 miles, the entire trip will last for four days or laps, 64 orbits.

New Sub—The United States Navy and Air Force in conjunction with Electric Boat Company (builders of our nuclear submarines) are now designing a "flying submarine".

It is called "The Creature" by its ultimate A-weapon. The navy version would weigh in at eight tons and carry two men.

This version would take off from either land or water. Then the craft would submerge to prey on surface ships or other submarines. Then by simply surfacing and taking off again, it could dash home in a matter of a short time.

The navy version would call for \$20,000,000 for two of these such crafts.

On the other hand, the Air Force fly boys want a craft about the size of a B-47 medium jet bomber that could submerge after an attack to hide from enemy aircraft until it is safe to go home.

On Monday, May 24, against Southgate, our netters were stopped by a score of 6-1.


Bruce Borum and Bob Nagy teamed up to give Lowrey their only point of the meet.
