Election Near — LBJ or Barry?

The presidential election of 1960 was one of the closest in the history of American politics. In many states the direction of the electoral votes was determined by a very small proportion of the popular votes cast. In Hawaii, for example, 115 votes out of almost 185,000 gave three electors to John F. Kennedy. He also carried New Mexico by about 2,000 votes, Nevada by only 2,500, South Carolina and Missouri by approximately 10,000 each. He won Michigan's 20 electoral votes by 66,841. With a margin of only 118,550 votes he became president of the United States.

In just a few days, registered American voters will again be going to the polls. On November 3, they will choose between Barry Goldwater and Lyndon B. Johnson. What they decide will determine the direction our nation takes during the next four years.

We asked 43 senior high students the following questions: "Who do you think will win the presidential election? Why?"

Of the 43 students who replied on the elections, four voted for Goldwater and 39 voted for Johnson.

Marla Neusel, 12B-7: Goldwater, he has new ideas to preserve the American ideal of government.

Janet Bynum, 12B-2: Johnson, because he is a strong leader and a Democrat.

Jean Sawicki, 12B-9: Johnson. He's better than Goldwater.

Bill Miglio, 12B-7: I think Johnson will win because he is a good man.

Richard Shaw, 10B-10: I think Johnson will win because he has better qualifications.

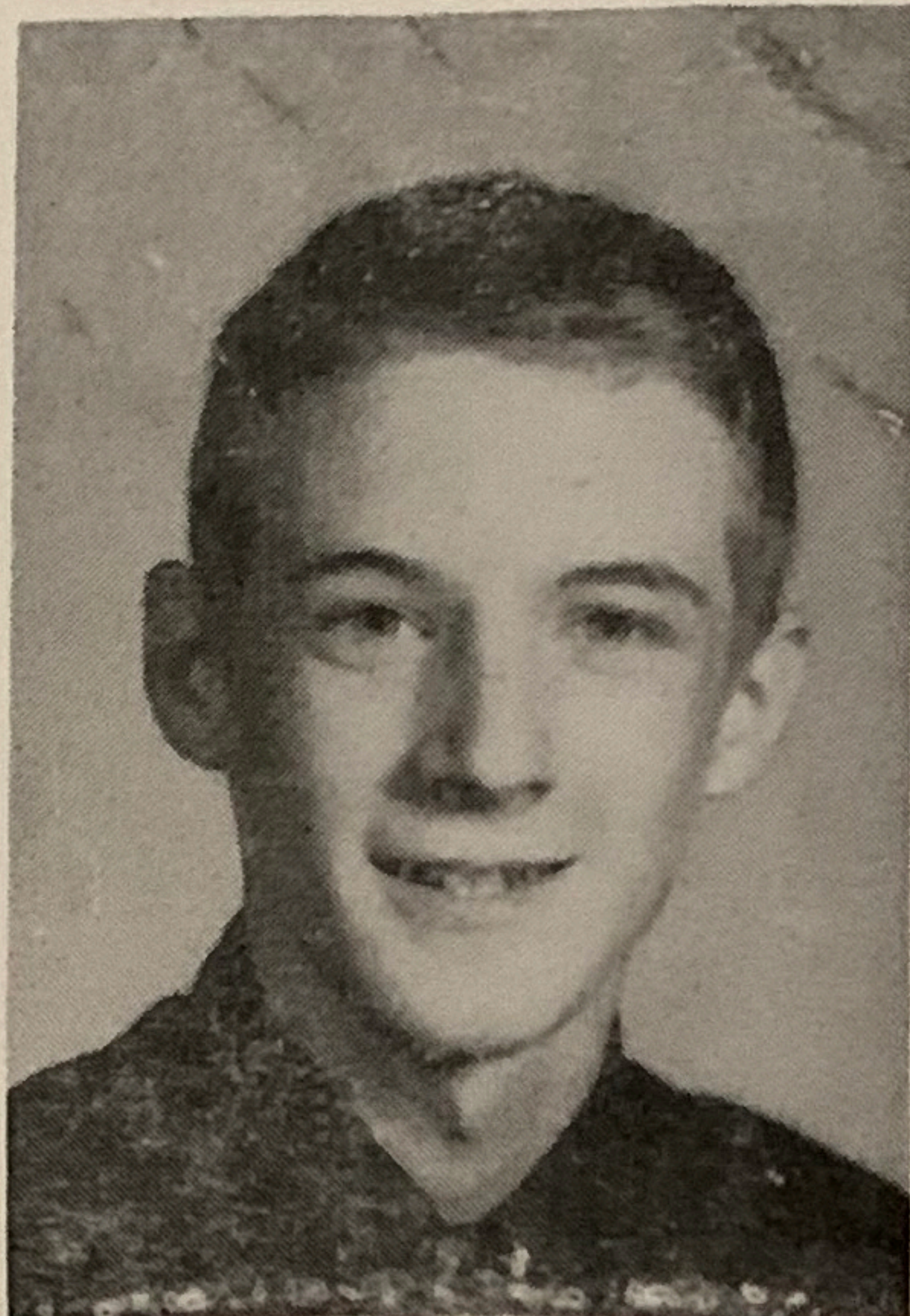
