


Homecoming Day turned out to be an enthusitic day for the Seniors. They won the spirit jug. Underclassmen-try again next time!

## New Equipment Improves Auto Shop

Classes in auto shop this year should be better courses for the students in Lowrey because of the new equipment and the new two hour class schedule. This new equipment has cost about \$2,000. Here is a list of some of the new equipment and its uses.

1. The new coal condenser tester is used to see if a coil can operate under different temperatures and if it can stand high voltage.

2. An exhaust fan system is used for getting the carbon monoxide gases out of the Auto Shop while the engines are running.

3. An overhead chainfall pulls up and replaces rebuilt engines. 4. A Battery charger is used to recharge the car batteries that

have run down.

5. An automatic transmission model is used to gain a better understanding of the transmissions of newer cars.

6. A T.V. oscilloscope shows a picture of the ignition timing and the points.

This equipment wil make our Auto Shop a better place to work and build our knowledge of the automobile world.

A comment from Mr. Oswalt, the Auto Shop teacher, was: "The new two hour program is working out very well. The boys have the chance to get a lot of work done during this time. The new equipment is helping us a lot. We are equipped to give the studnts many meaningful learning experiences."


Mark Schalte, the Senior Class President said, "One of the reasons the dance was a success was that the Seniors showed great committee spirit."


- Assistant Editor-in-chief: Assists the Editor-in-chief and officiates





## Driver Education To Begin Soon

January 9, 1965, will mark the beginning of driver's education. The winter program will be given in three Dearborn schools (Dearborn, Edsel Ford, and Fordson). Classes will start on January 9 and will end June 12. The times of the classes will be: 8 a.m.—11 a.m.; 11 a.m. -2 p.m.; and 2 p.m.-5 p.m. Classes will be given every Saturday for twenty weeks for three hours each.

Each student was given a choice of which school and time he would like but no guarantee was given that his preferences would be accepted and assigned to him.

The selection of students to par ticipate in driver's education was determined on the basis of age. Lowrey was permitted a quota of 72 students.

Driver's education is given to students every winter and summer. The next program will start in June. Interested students will be given the opportunity to enroll in the program sometime in May.

## Students Vie In Math Contest

Recently, fifty-seven students from Lowrey, both juniors and seniors, took part in the eigth annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition.

The main purpose of this test was to create a wider interest in mathematics and to bring attention to the fact that most professions reeral mathematical background.

To be eligible, the applicant must have been an attendent of a Michigan high school and been able to pay a fifty cent fee, to help with the costs of the printing, mailing, and the grading of the examination. Those who wished to enter registered at their high school and were required to complete the registration form and return it to Professor James H. McKay of Oakland University before October 8.

This examination is given in two parts. The first part was held on November 5, from 9:00 A.M. to 11:00 a.m., or during any two consecutive class periods. It was a multiple choice examination, designed to test the student's gen-

The second part is to be presented on December 10, for the top 4% of the participants of Part I, and is designed entirely to measure the students mathematical ingenuity.

The scores for Part I and Part II will be combined to determine the prize winners. Also, the state colleges will award some scholarships to the numerous students who qualified for Part II. The first place winner will receive a gold medal and about twenty second prize silver medals will be awarded.


Mrs. Kabel also talked about linings and interfacings. This was mostly directed to the Clothing III classes for they will soon be working with them, if not already.
