Bus Rules Revised

In the past issues of this newspaper we have published some comments about student conduct on school busses. Our last paper included a copy of a letter which was sent by the administrators to parents of high school students outlining the school policy on bus conduct. According to Mr. Romanow, revised bus rules will go into effect when we return to school in January. It should be pointed out that the new rules place the responsibility for grown up behavior on the shoulders of the students.

Here are the details of the revised rules.

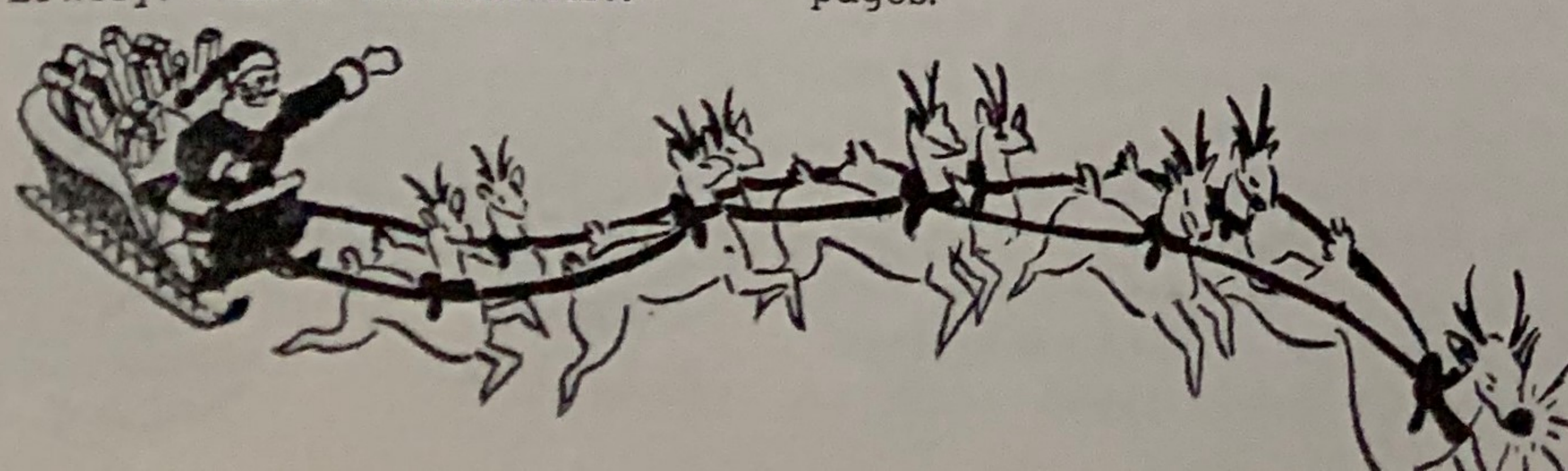
1. All students can pick up their new bus cards at the Board of Education Office, Mayfair School, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. on December 23, 28, 29, 30, 31.
2. As a special privilege, students desiring to ride the same bus home as their friends may appear together at the Board of Education Office and request to be assigned to the same bus.
3. Any student may ride the 4:45 or 6:00 p.m. bus home, regardless of the bus number appearing on his ticket.
4. Bus tickets will be signed by the students and stapled into plastic folders.
5. Bus tickets are not transferable.
6. Any mutilation of the bus ticket will make it void, requiring the purchase of a new ticket at a price of \$1.00.

The following procedure will be followed by bus drivers in case of misbehavior or smoking on the busses:

- a. The driver is to stop the bus and ask the student to stop his misbehavior or smoking.
- b. If the student continues his disturbance, the driver is to get the name and bus ticket number of the student.
- c. If any student refuses to show his bus ticket to the driver, the bus driver is to return to Mayfair or Lowrey School—whichever is the closer.

In the last issue of the Lowrey Light we introduced two of the four new student teachers presently in the building. In this issue of the Lowrey Light we will conclude this introduction.

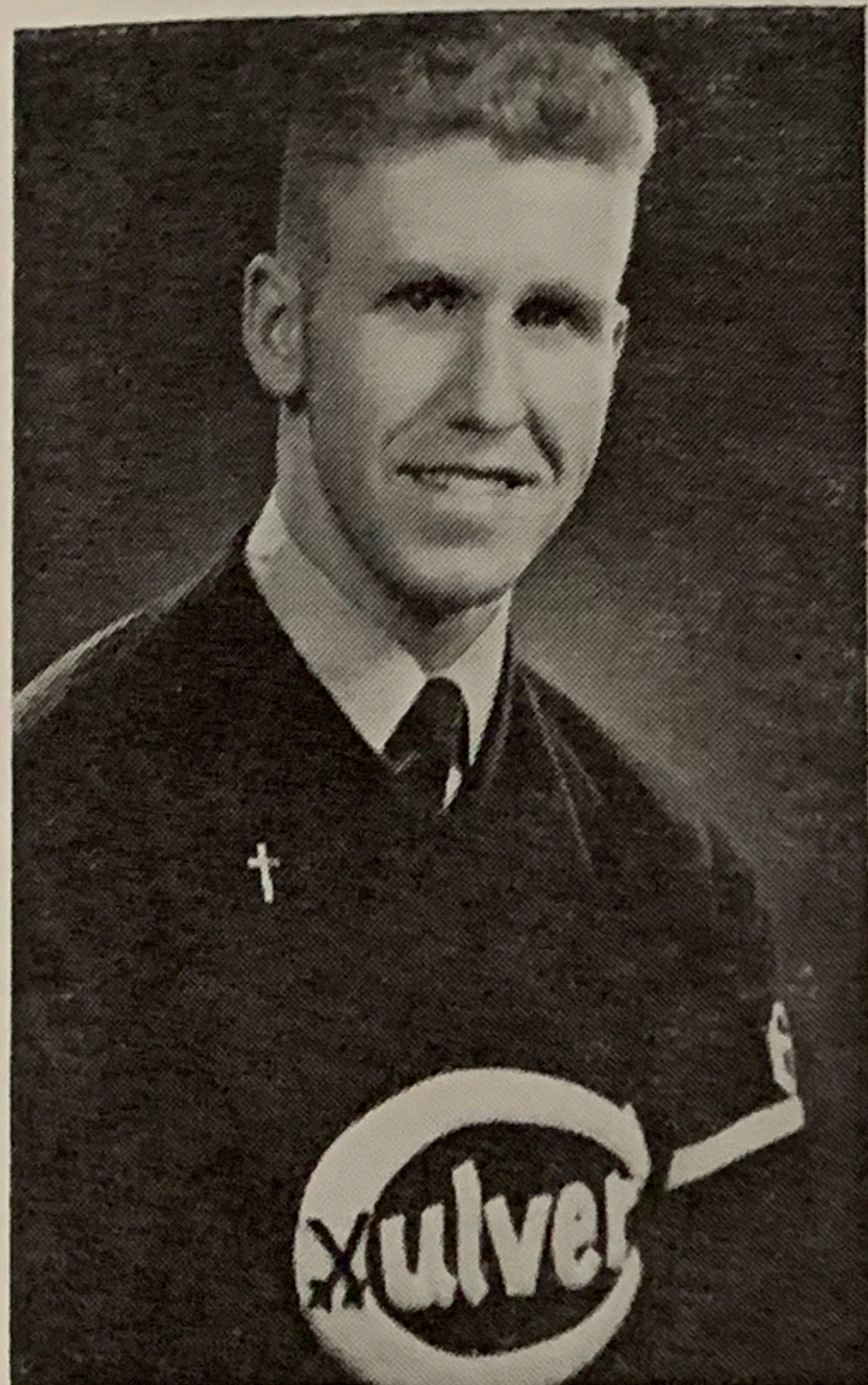
Mrs. Andree Burney is in the French Department.

Mariner IV: Almost three weeks ago the United States launched Mariner IV. The satellite's purpose is to make a picture of a crash landing on Mars, similar to the one Mariner III made on its trip to the moon a few months ago. If everything goes right, Mariner IV's trip will answer many questions about Mars, among them:

1. Do the Martian canals really exist?
2. Is there enough oxygen in Mars' atmosphere to support life other than a few types of mosses?
3. How much water is on Mars?
4. Does intelligent life exist?

By next June, if everything goes good for Mariner IV, we might know the answers to these and other questions about Mars.

Water Shortage: Making pure water from sea water is the newest area of United States and Soviet research. Scientists from the United States and the Soviet are getting together to attack the water shortage problem. Scientists say atomic power may be used to run desalting plants since it will be cheaper to use atomic power in the overall long run.

Garden City East Downs Bears

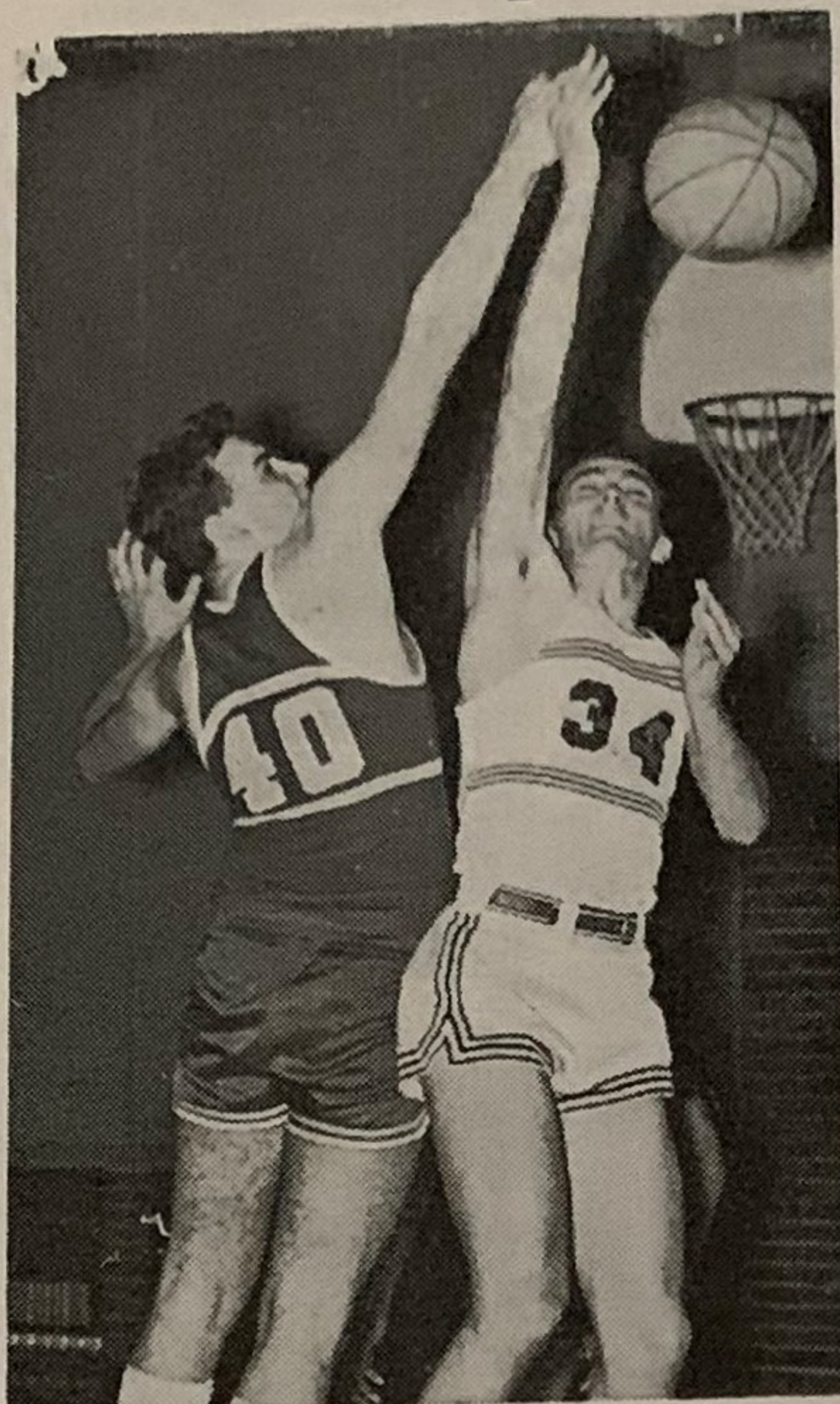
Lowrey lost to Garden City East, in the season's opener, on December 1, by the score of 88-82.
