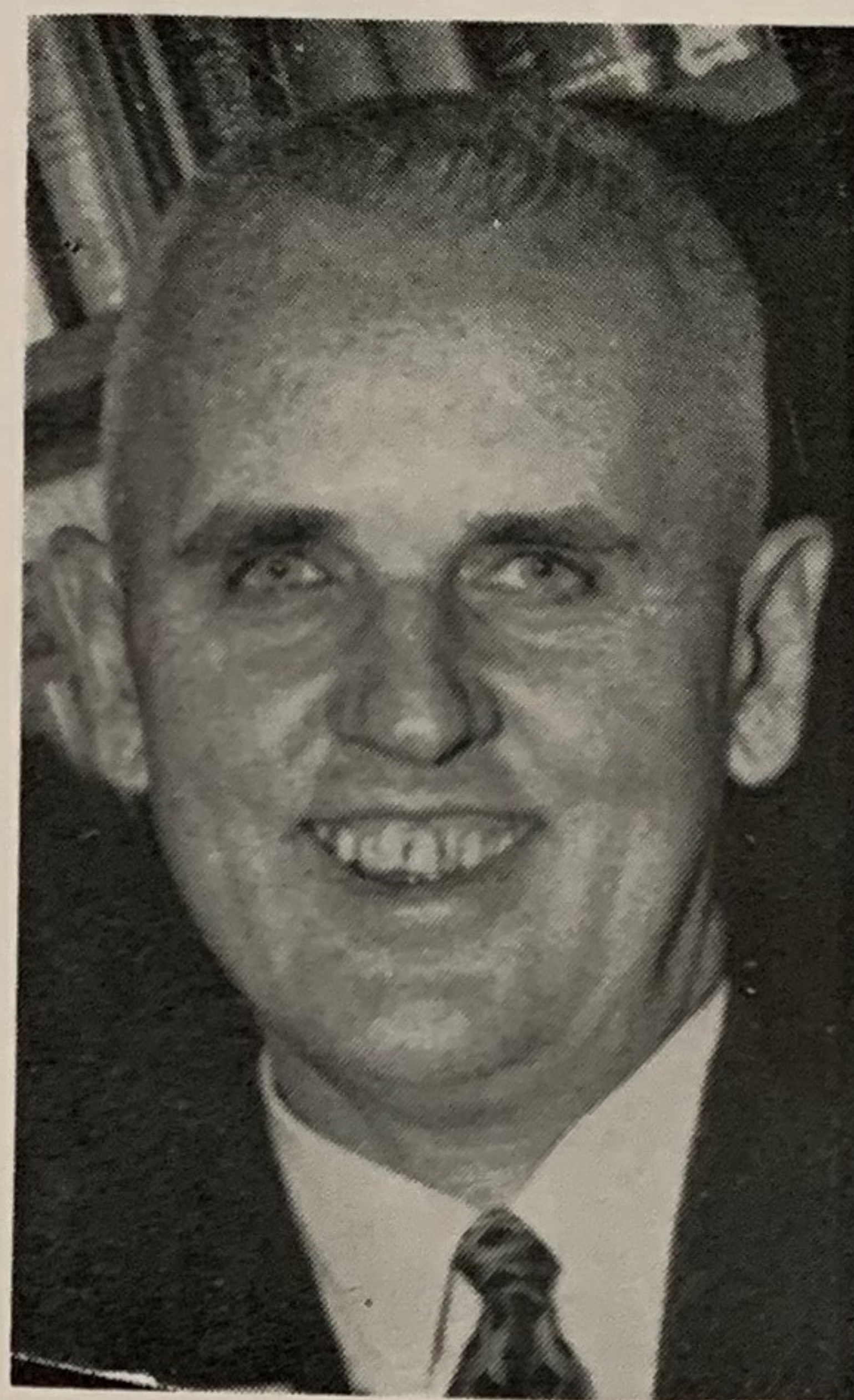
Rules for the contest are:

1. Those enrolled in a Dearborn or Dearborn Heights public or parochial school, boys and girls, are eligible.
2. Entrants must be registered in one of the three classes previously mentioned.
3. Entries must be submitted to one of the eight Bank of Dearborn offices. They may be submitted before deadline if you wish. Models must be accompanied by a three view drawing.
4. Entries must be submitted according to instructions on their individual sheets.
5. Entries must be signed by one parent or guardian. The teacher or school representative must also sign to complete the entry.
6. Entries must be the work of the contestant. Advice and counsel is permitted and encouraged, but only the contestant may work on the entry.
7. All entries become the property of the Bank of Dearborn, and the decision of the judges will be final.
8. Signature of entrant must not appear on the face of his entry sheet.

Lowrey had three winners last year in Class A competition. They all placed in interior design and were Ronald Mountenay, 1st; Clifford Nealy, 2nd; and Gloria Hultquist, 3rd.

Cheryl Koroly Is Lowrey's Homemaker

Lowrey's 1966 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow is Cheryl Koroly, who scored highest in a written knowledge and attitude examination that was taken by senior girls on December 7, 1965. This makes Cheryl eligible for state and national scholarship awards. She has already earned a special award pin from the program's sponsor, General Mills.

Test papers of all school winners in the state are being judged, and a State Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner up will be selected. The State Homemaker will receive a \$1,500 scholarship, and her school will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica. The second ranking girl in the state will receive a \$500 educational grant.

Next spring, the State Betty Crocker's Homemakers of Tomorrow from every state, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join in an expense-paid educational tour or Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D.C. Chosen from the state winners on the basis of original test score, interviews, and observations, the 1966 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced at a Washington dinner. Whoever wins this honor will have her scholarship increased to \$5,000.

Cheryl is in Homemaking this semester working with Miss Ward who encouraged her to take the test. She is planning to attend college and to eventually teach elementary school. When told of her good fortune, Cheryl was heard to say "Oh! My mother will never believe this!" With shaking fingers, she admired her pin and commented that it was very pretty.

Students Attend Theater

Approximately 35 Lowrey people took a trip to the Hillberry theater at Wayne State University on Thursday, February 3. This was sponsored by the Literary Club.

Originally the group had planned to see *St. Joan*, but because of an injury to one of the cast, a last-minute scheduling of *The Stoops to Conquer* took place.

The story of *The Stoops to Conquer* springs from a misunderstanding. Young Marlow and Kate Hardcastle, whose match has been proposed by Marlow's father, Sir Charles, have never met. Young Marlow, "one of the most bashful and reserved young fellows in all the world," with his friend Hastings, goes to visit the Hardcastles. Having lost their way at night, they stop at an alehouse to inquire about the way. Here Tony Lumpkin, Hardcastle's step-son (and a spoiled rascal,) hears of their inquiry and directs the two young men to a nearby "inn" for the night which is really the Hardcastle home.

Arriving at their destination, Marlow takes Hardcastle for the landlord and treats him bluffly. He makes bold advances to Kate Hardcastle under the impression that she is a servant. (This contrasts with his bashful behavior when presented to her in real character.) Recognizing his misunderstanding, Kate "stoops" to the role of servant so that Marlow may not be shy.

At this "inn" Hastings discusses his beloved Miss Neville, Mrs. Hardcastle's niece, whom she intends for Tony. Hastings expresses his amazement at meeting Miss Neville at an inn, and she immediately clears up this mistake, explaining that it must be a trick of her cousin's.

They resolve, however, not to tell Marlow, as he would probably run away at once. Hastings and Miss Neville plan an elopement are aided in their plot by Tony, who is no more desirous of Neville than she is of him.

When Sir Charles arrives, everything is cleared up. Marlow is "conquered" as well as promised, and Tony, now of age, rejects Neville and frees her to marry Hastings.

The play was considered most enjoyable and humorous and some of the students who went on the trip made comments. Doug Stamp, 12A-11,

said "It was great! I'd like to go again!" Another comment made by Ron Lamarand, 12A-7, was "It was the funniest play I have ever seen! It was more exciting than a motion picture!" However, Barb Katterman, 12A-6, summed up her thoughts about the play in just a few words: "He, He, He, He, He!" Michelle Goder said, "I thought it was great! It was really different and I agree with Barb!" The students who went agreed with Mrs. Helveston that "The legitimate theater is far more exciting than TV or the movies." The students who went agreed and suggested that we make the theater trips a monthly event.

Attention Juniors: Scholarship Test

The National Merit Scholarship Test is scheduled to be taken by the Lowrey students on February 26 in the O.W. Best Cafeteria. The Clippert entrance to Best will be open at 8:30 A.M. for those who wish to take it. You must be there promptly as the doors will close again at 8:50.

The test is designed to measure your development and knowledge in five basic areas. "English Usage" is related to your ability to recognize effective writing of English as used in the United States. "Mathematics Usage" will tell how well you can reason quantitatively, solve mathematical problems and complete formal exercises in arithmetic, geometry, and algebra. The "Social Studies Reading" test and the "Natural Science Reading" tests are basically the same. You must be able to read, understand, interpret, analyze, and evaluate written material. The "Word Usage" is a test of general vocabulary, measuring your ability to understand the meaning of common college level reading words and your verbal skill.

Lowrey School has 100 test booklets. The first 100 juniors will be able to take the test. In the event that 100 juniors do not want to, what ever is left will go to the sophomores and seniors.
