School Memories To Linger On

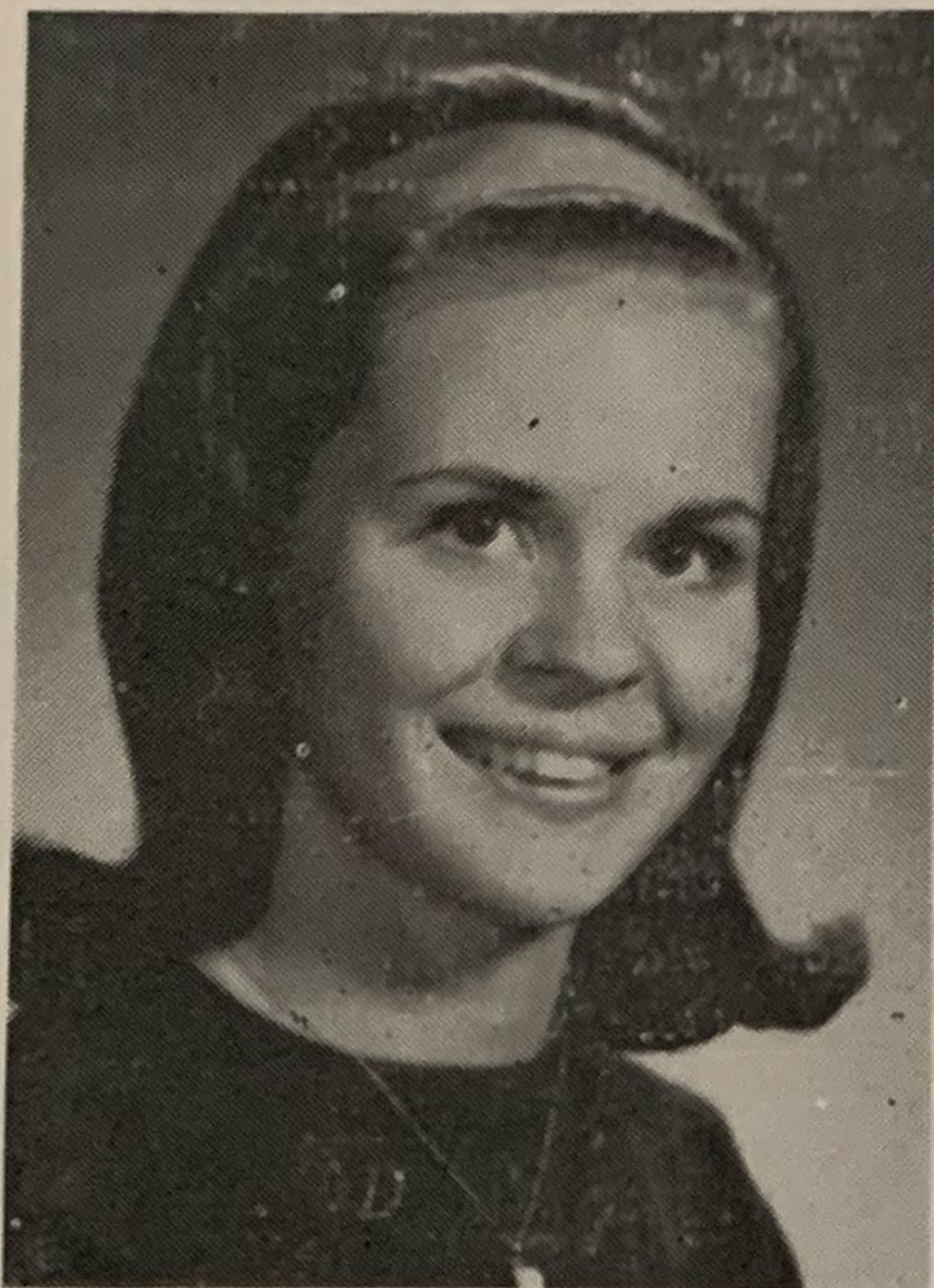

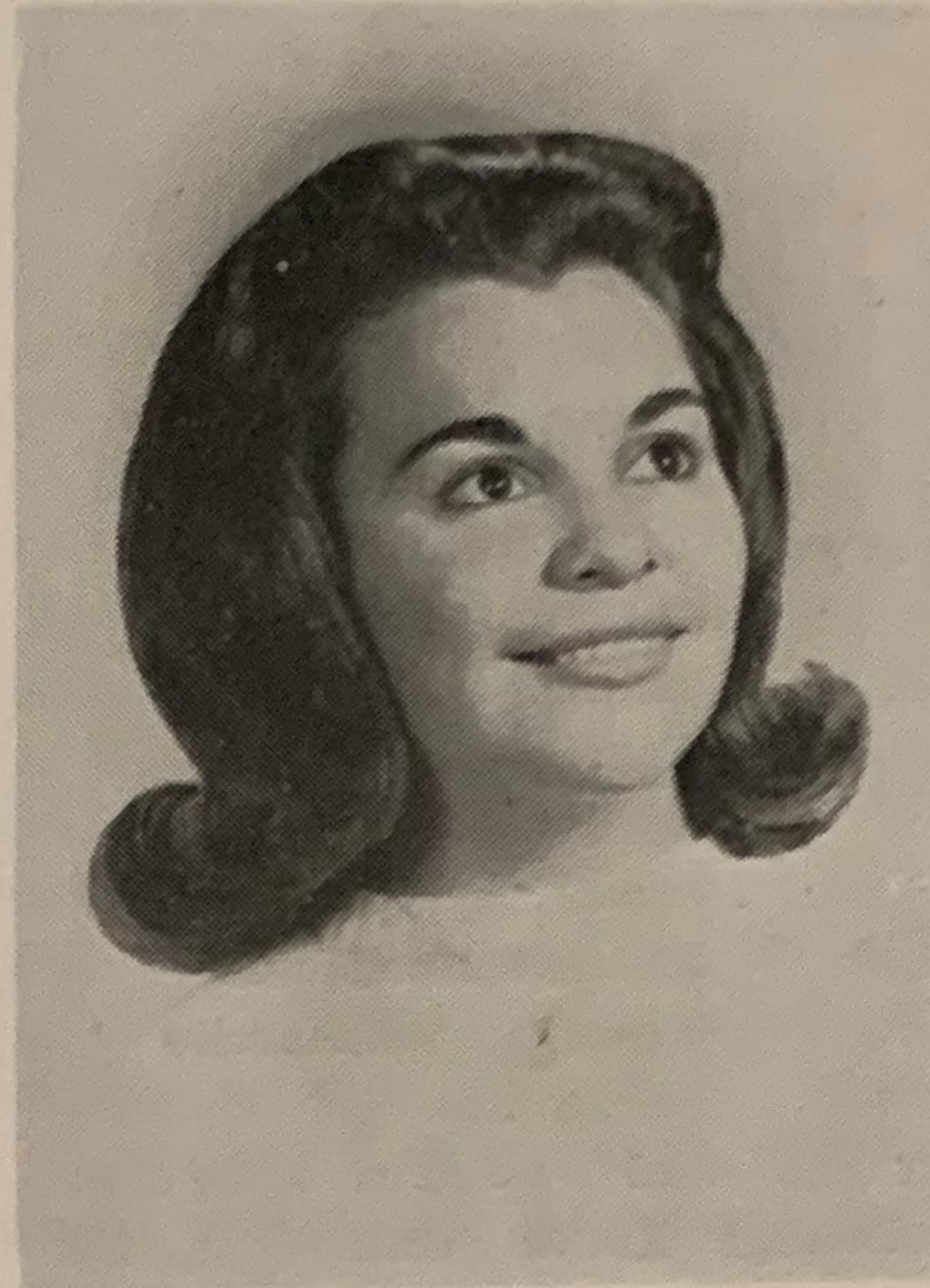
Some of us are off to college, a few to the service, and some to marry or into the business world.

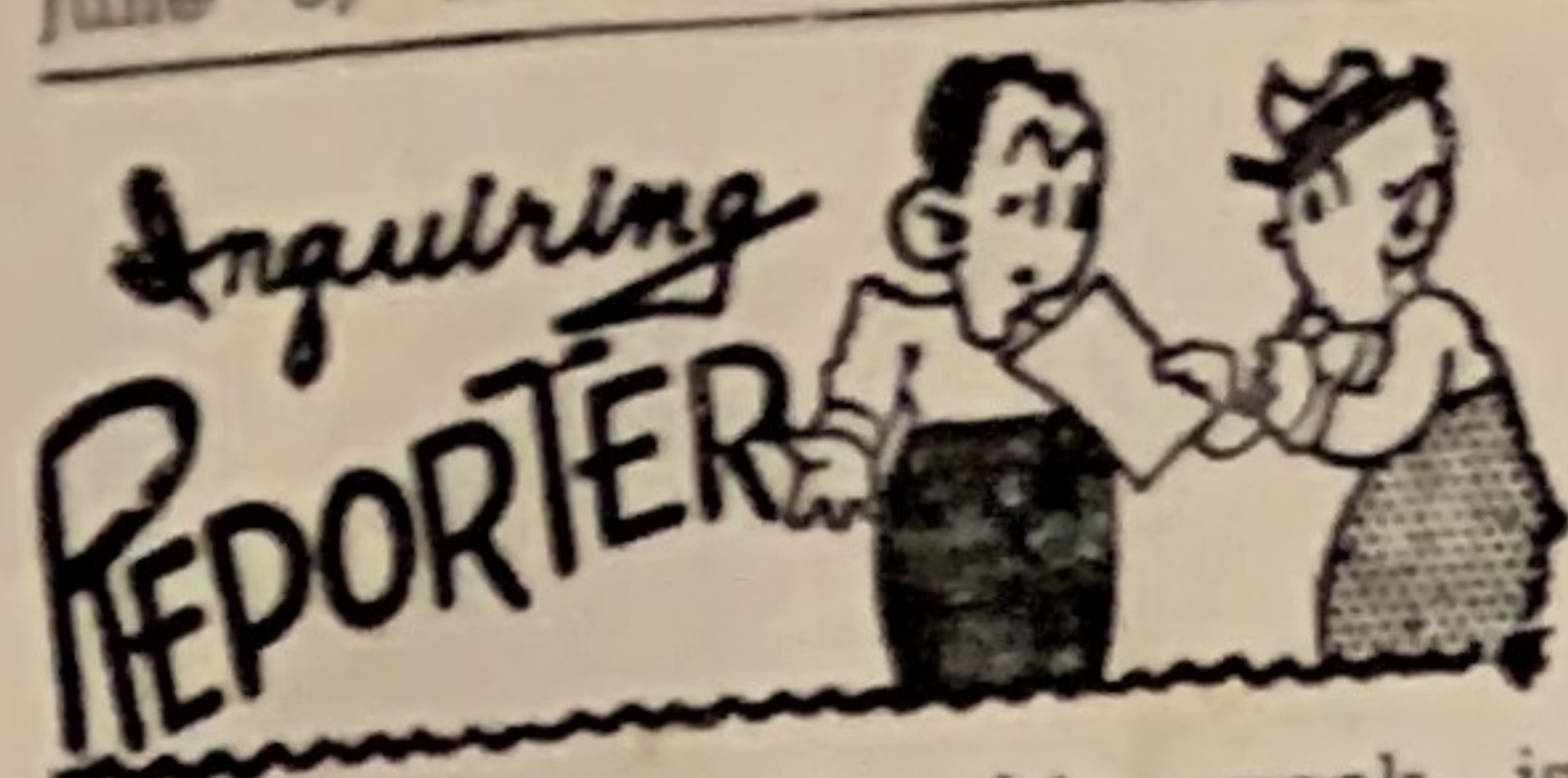

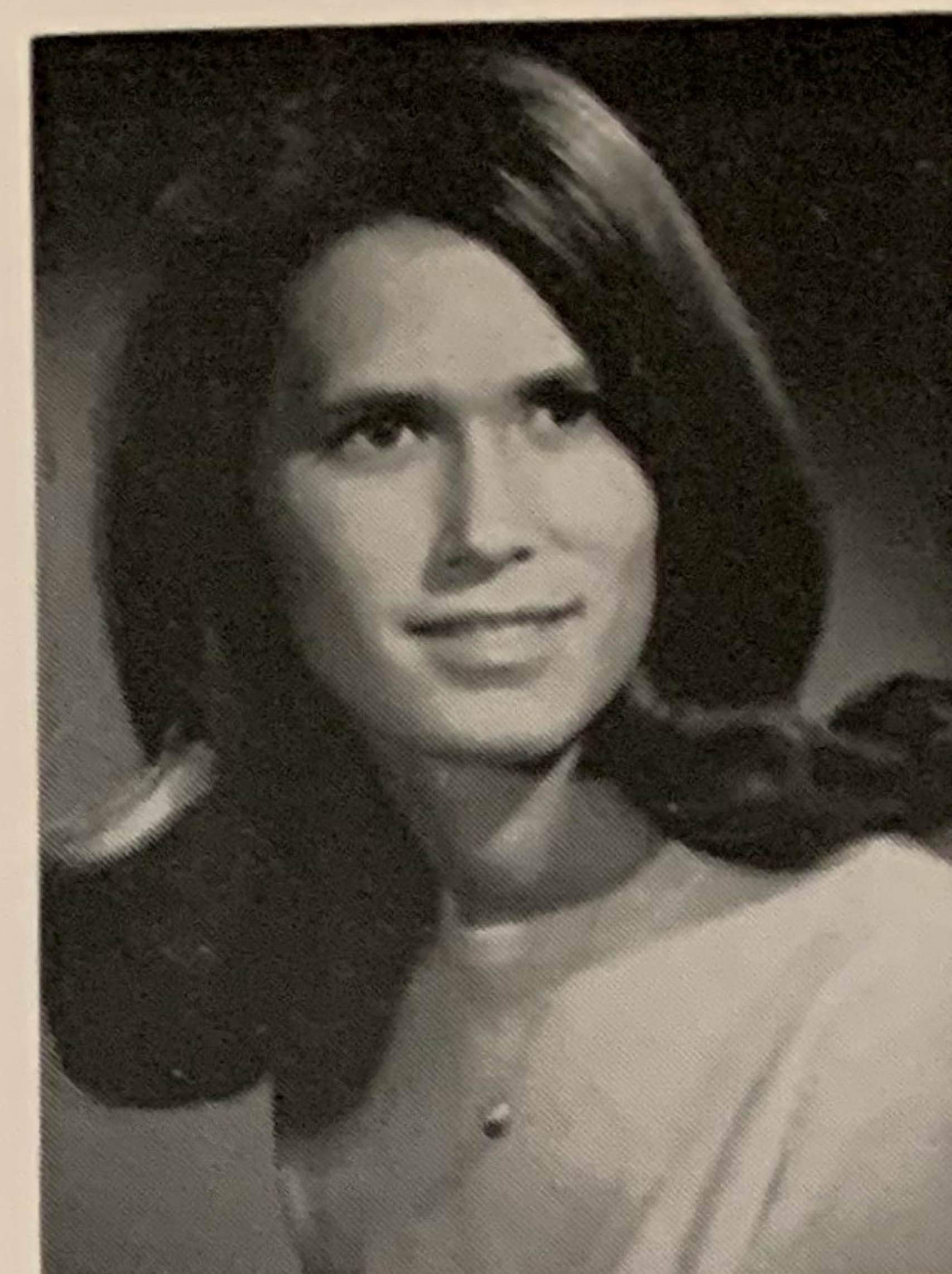

Bears tie 1-1 in Final Game

The ending is just the beginning. It appeared this way when the Lowrey Polar Bears fought the Crestwood Chargers to a 1-1 tie in their final game of the season on May 31. The game was called because of darkness and will not be made up. The Bears started the season by losing to Fordson in extra innings.

Greg Grendel, the lone southpaw of the staff, made his first start of the year. He did a great job. In the first inning he spotted the Chargers a run, but was in little trouble thereafter.

After the first man was out, a single, a walk and another single followed. Greg then struck out Mark Doody. He appeared to be out of trouble when he got the next batter to hit a soft line drive to the Lowrey second baseman, Sam Fite. Sam charged the ball but it hit the ground before he could get to it. The ball spun away from him and the lone run for Crestwood was scored.

After two Chargers had walked in the second inning, Greg settled down and was never in trouble afterwards.

In the last half of the second the Bears came back. Jon Thostenson started it off by working his way on with a walk. After the next batter had struck out, Jon stole second base and went to third on the wild throw. The next batter struck out and this left it up to Greg Grendel. Greg supported his own cause by solidly singling to right field to score Lowrey's only run of the game.

Although Crestwood never threatened again, the same was not true for Lowrey. Three times afterwards they put men on third base. In the fourth inning Moe Miller tripled but was called out for missing second base. In the fifth Mark Stevens tripled but was stranded there. Perhaps the best scoring chance came in the seventh inning. Jon Thostenson started the inning by singling to left field. He pulled for a pinch-runner Ron Collins who stole second base but was stranded. A runner was stranded at third in the ninth inning with one out.

After seven innings of play, Greg Grendel was pulled. He allowed only 5 hits. It was perhaps the finest pitching job of the year but was overshadowed by an even finer relief job by Steve Gerych. Steve pitched the final eighth innings and allowed only three runners, all walks. He was touched for a hit. Two of the runners were thrown out by the fine arm of Bill Brantlin when they attempted to steal and the third was picked off first base. He struck out a total of 10 batters. As dusk set in the game was called.

Awards Given at Lowrey Banquet

The 1967 Lowrey Activity Banquet was held on Wednesday, May 24th. The highlight of the banquet was not the food but the announcement of the most valuable player awards to the players in their respective sport.

John Hall, star football player of the Lowrey Polar Bears, was announced as the second player in the history of the Lowrey football team to be elected unanimously as the most valuable player. The other boy, Jim Hribal, who was elected to the Big Ten's All-Conference Team in his senior year at the University of Michigan, was on hand as the guest speaker. Because of his football talent John was not only elected M.V.P. but also received a scholarship from Eastern Michigan University. His tuition, book, room and board will be completely paid for.

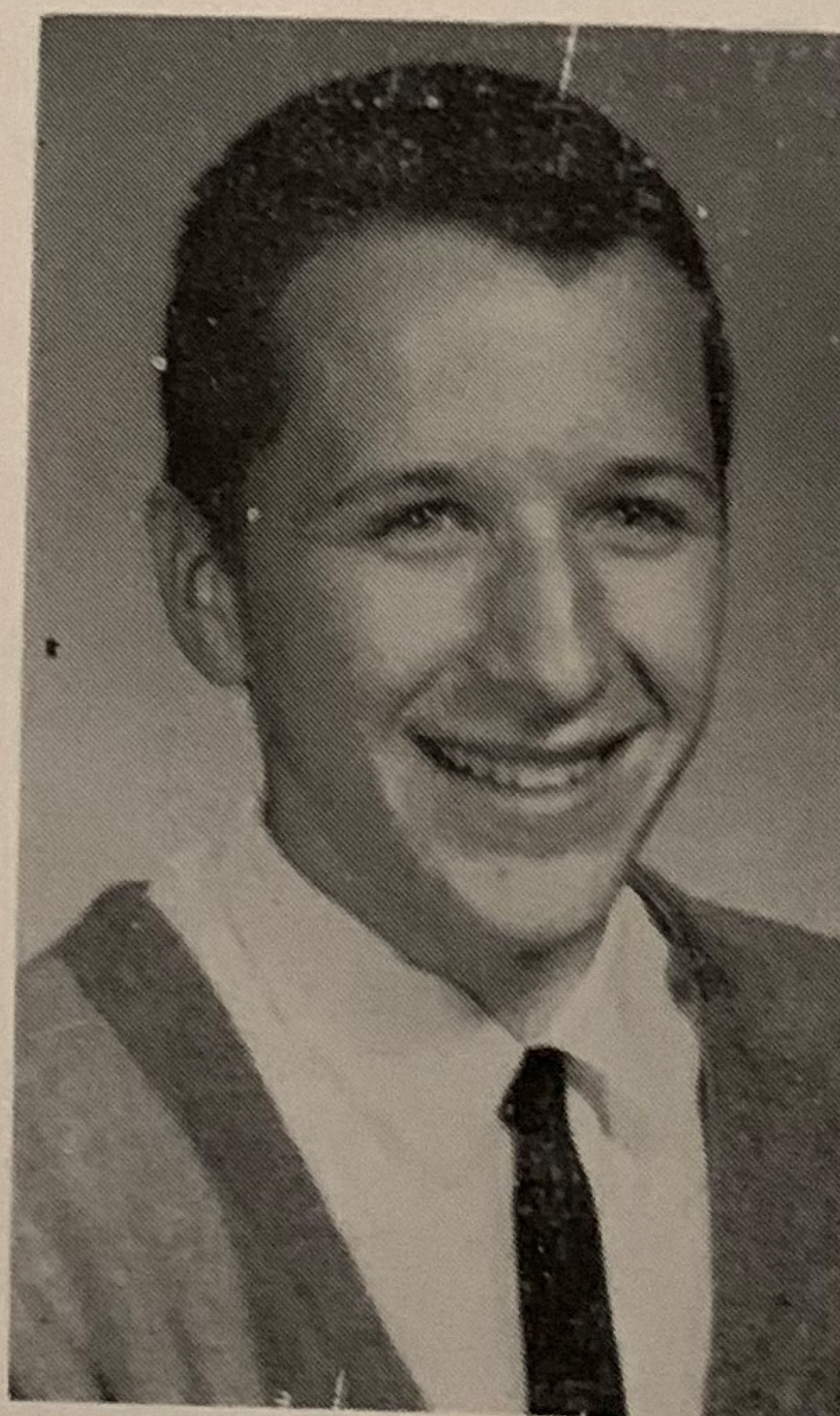
