of our tremendous teachers who is being transferred at the end of this semester to Dearborn High because of the "phase-out."



John Luchini is one of the seventy two high school seniors in the nation to receive a Ford Scholarship to attend any college in the nation.

John's academic record and personal qualifications indicated to the Scholarship Board that he will benefit from a college education and will develop into a well-rounded adult capable of constructive work and responsible citizenship.

The scholarship award will cover his full tuition and customary fees and a portion of his living costs until he receives his bachelor's degree. A \$\$500 grant is also given to the University of Michigan, the college John has chosen to attend. He plans on going into physics

while attending the U. of M. After he receives his Bachelor of Science Degree in Physics, he would like to teach for a few years then go into industry.

To be eligible to compete for a scholarship, one of John's parents had to be employed by the Ford Motor Companly for at least two years.

John's many extra curricular activities, plus having a 3.6 average and ranking seventh in the class have helped him to receive the scholarship. He is very active in the Folk Club. the Fizz-Kem Club, and he has had leading and supporting roles in many of Lowrey's school plays.





Lowrey Senior In HFCC Play


