Upperclassmen In State Math Test

Forty-five Lowrey students, including 16 juniors and 29 seniors, took the 1966 Mathematics Prize Competition Test in the cafeteria on October 25. They took the first part of the test which consisted of 40 problems designed to test the general mathematical background of the contestant.

Approximately 25,000 Michigan high school students took the competition test and the top 4 percent will take the second part December 6. The second part will take two hours for six problems.

The scores will be combined to determine the winners. Approximately \$5,000 in scholarships will be granted to the winners. The first place winner will be given a gold medal and about twenty others will receive silver medals.

Representatives At Council Confab

Lowrey High was represented by five students recently at the Twenty-First Annual Student Council Conference of Senior High Schools sponsored by the Michigan Association of Student Councils and the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor.

The Lowrey people who attended were Jerry Harrington, Student Council president, Joanna Miliunas, 12B, Judy Wagner, 11B, Mary Kay Vadnais, Student Council vice-president, and Mr. Beesley, Student Council sponsor.

The students began the morning program of lectures and exhibits at 8:30 a.m. They heard lectures by a number of men from the University of Michigan, and heard an address entitled "It's Time for a Change" by Donald C. Weaver, professor of education from Western Michigan University.

Following lunch, the students attended student seminars conducted by staff members of the Summer Leadership Training Workshop which is sponsored by the Michigan Association of Student Councils.

The purposes of the seminars were to probe basic issues which confront the student council in its operation within the school. Among the speakers were Robert Brazell, principal of Thomas Edison School in Dearborn; William Hauchalter, teaching fellow, Department of Speech, University of Michigan; Dic Leonardelli, assistant director of Field Services, Western Michigan University; Sister Mary Willard, O.P., vice-principal of Catholic Central High in Port Huron.

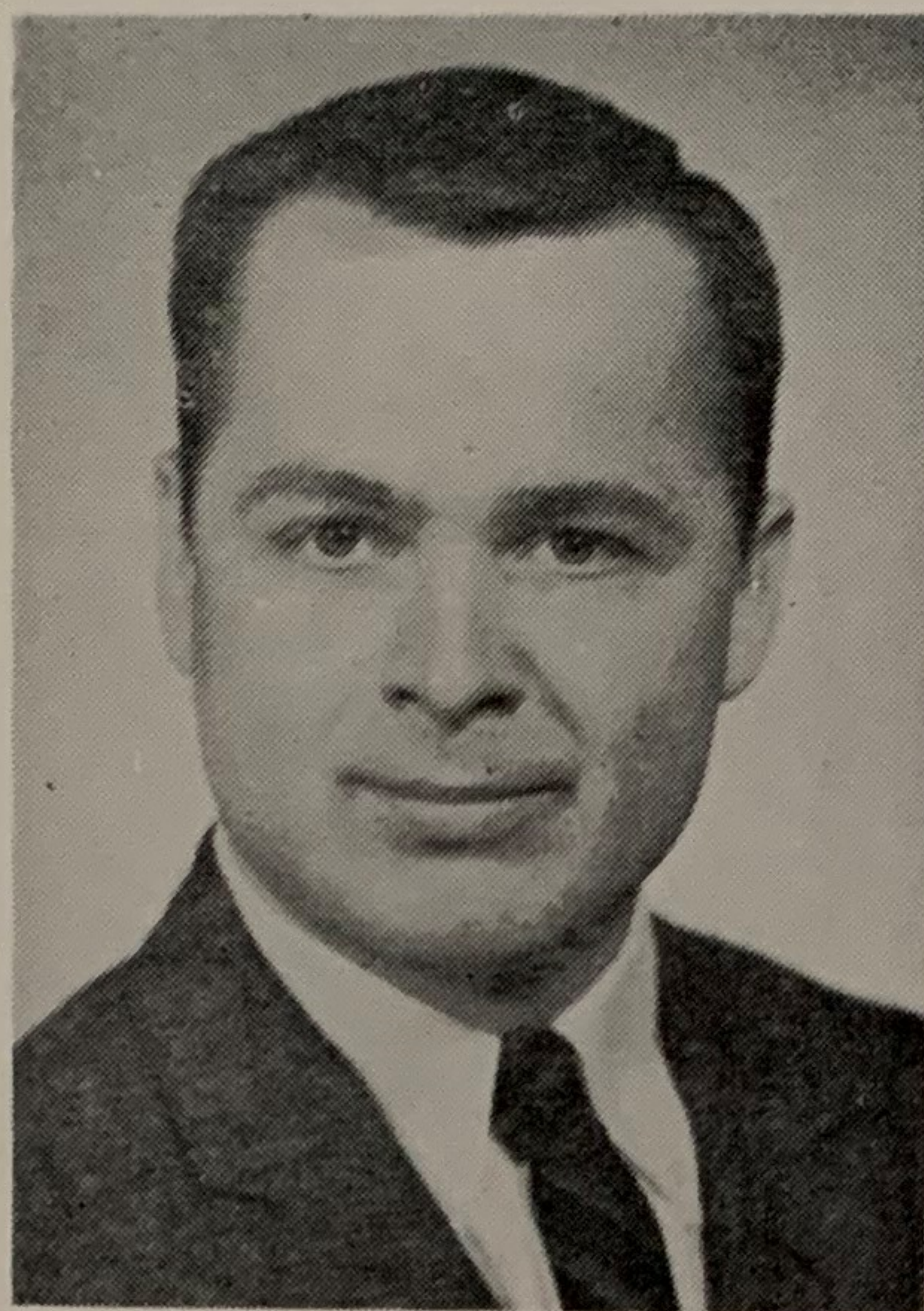
Concerning the trip on the whole, Jerry Harrington, Student Council president, said, "It was helpful, interesting, encouraging, and sufficient."

Students Praised By Administration

A real chance for students to have a voice in school administration and policies! This might finally have been accomplished. On Tuesday, October 11 at 10:00 A. M., a meeting was held at Stout Junior High School in Dearborn. Representatives of the student body from Dearborn High, Edsel Ford, Fordson High, and Lowrey attended as well as the student council sponsor, principal, and assistant principal from each school. After introductions were exchanged, the adults at the meeting proceeded to compliment the student bodies of the four schools on their good behavior and maturity. The student representatives were then presented with Special Commendations bearing the signatures of the four principals. Refreshments were served; discussion began. Methods of establishing better and closer relationships between schools through the school newspapers and Student Council were talked about.

The last event of the meeting was the formation of "The Dearborn Student Advisory Committee" which will meet once a month. The group will consist of the newspaper editor and Student Council president from each school. The first meeting will be held for the purpose of reviewing the schools' code's of dress, and if need be, offering recommendations to the administrations on their alteration or moderation. The Lowrey student body can justly feel proud of the faith that the school administrators obviously have for them. In presenting the student representatives with the commendations and encouraging them in their formation of a committee, they have shown this beyond a doubt. Indeed, Dr. Robert Young, principal of Dearborn High School, said that he thought the youth of today were more mature, capable, and responsible than in any preceding generation.

A Brief Quiz

Here's a brief quiz where you can grade yourself and test your knowledge of history. This is an excerpt from one of the more famous speeches in the history of western civilization. Can you tell where it was given, when it was given, and who delivered it?

"Our constitution does not copy the laws of neighbouring states; we are rather a pattern to others than imitators ourselves. Its administration favours the many instead of the few; this is why it is called a democracy. If we look to the laws, they afford equal justice to all in their private differences; if to social standings, advancement in public life falls to reputation for capacity, class considerations not being allowed to interfere with merit; nor again does poverty bar the way, if a man is able to serve the state, he is not hindered by the obscurity of his condition. The freedom which we enjoy in our government extends also to our ordinary life. There, far from exercising a jealous surveillance over each other, we do not feel called upon to be angry with our neighbor for doing what he likes, or even to indulge in those injurious looks which cannot fail to be offensive, although they inflict no positive penalty. But all this ease in our private relations does not make us lawless as citizens. Against this fear is our chief safeguard, teaching us to obey the magistrates and the laws, particularly such as regard the protection of the injured whether they are actually on the statute book, or belong to that code, although unwritten, yet cannot be broken without acknowledged disgrace.

JV's Remain Unscored Upon Blank Kennedy

With great defensive play, led by Clyde Fisher, Gil Nalepa, and the entire defensive squad, our Reserve Football Team extended its undefeated and unscored upon record by whipping a helpless Kennedy team, 33-0, at Lowrey on Friday, October 7.

In the first quarter, Jim Gnewkowski ran for a nine yard touchdown. Newlin plunged over for the extra point. This was the only scoring in this period.

Early during the second quarter, Gnewkowski scored again on a seven yard run. The extra point failed. Later in the quarter, quarterback Sam Flite plunged four yards on a quarterback sneak for Lowrey's third touchdown of the day. Newlin went across for the extra point, and the halftime score was Lowrey 20, Kennedy 0.

During the third quarter action, Gnewkowski took a handoff on the double reverse and sprinted for a forty yard touchdown.

Late in the final quarter, Gnewkowski swept through the Kennedy line for a five yard touchdown. A Sam Flite pass to Fisher clicked for the extra point. There was no further scoring as the JV's won 33-0.

Although the offense has played well, it should be noted that the defense has been outstanding, shutting out their first four opponents. Some of these players are Mike Hill, Tom Trapp, Ken Cornell, Tom Meggison, Andy McCloud, Big Calhoun, and Little Newlin. They have done an outstanding job this season.

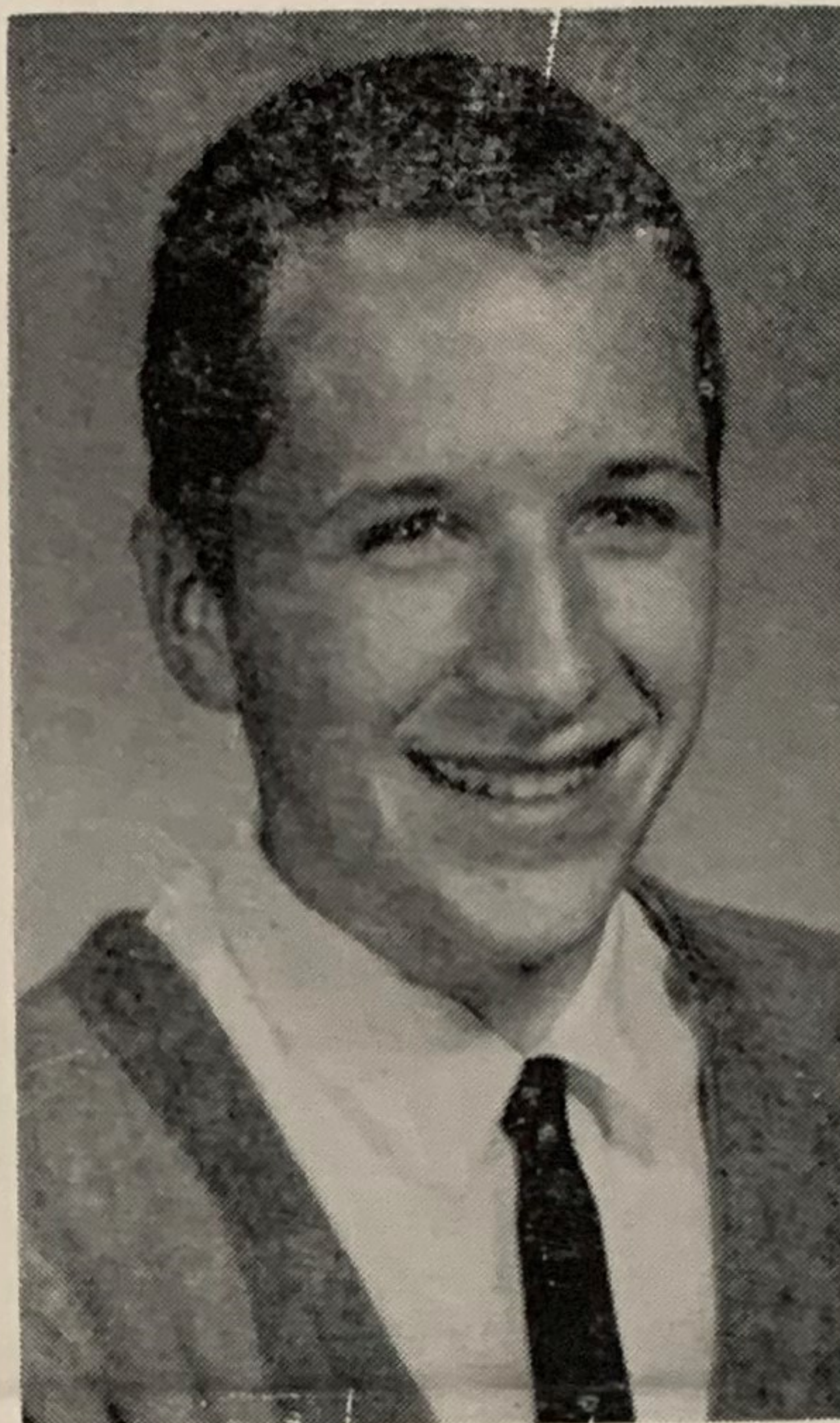
