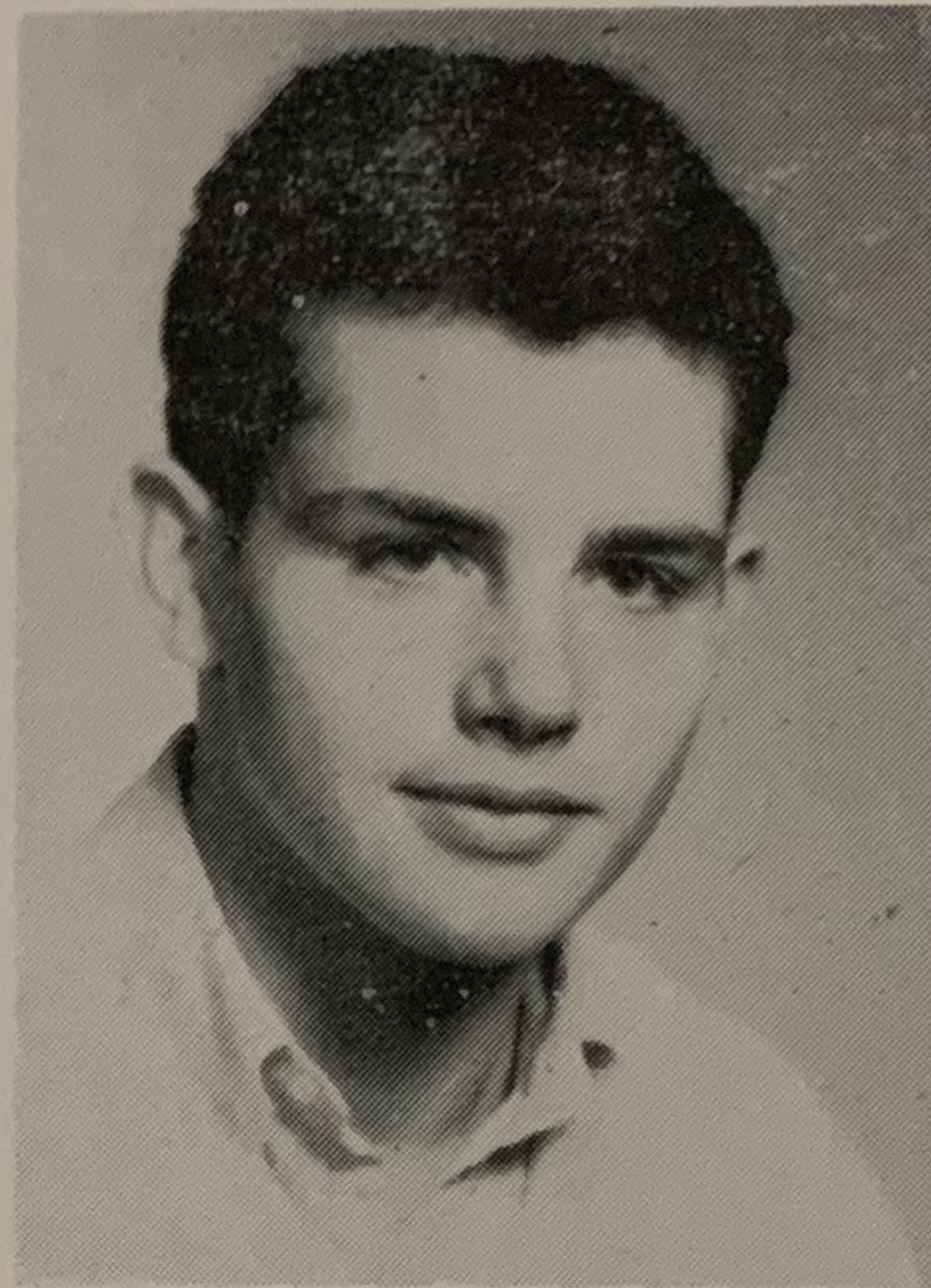
Sports Spotlight

Our varsity football ended its worst season since entering the Tri-River League, by being shut out by Southgate 20-0. The game was played on Friday, November 4th. Few students attended the game although buses were furnished.

Southgate scored the first time they got the ball as they drove 35 yards in 7 plays for the score. The extra point was scored by the Southgate quarterback on an end run.

The Bears drove inside the Sabers 35 yard line before losing the ball on an interception.

Southgate scored again in the second quarter. After recovering a Lowrey fumble on the 50 yard line, the Sabers took 18 plays to get the ball across from the Polar Bear 5 yard line.

The half ended with Southgate in the lead 13-0.

In the third period Southgate drove to the Lowrey 21 yard line. The Southgate quarterback then attempted a short pass over the middle, but Gene Ellefson intercepted it, and ran it back to the Polar Bear 33. The Bears were unable to form a threat though and were forced to punt.

In the fourth period the Bears drove all the way to the Southgate 12 yard line. Quarterback Sam Fite attempted a pass into the Southgate took a 20 to 0 lead.
