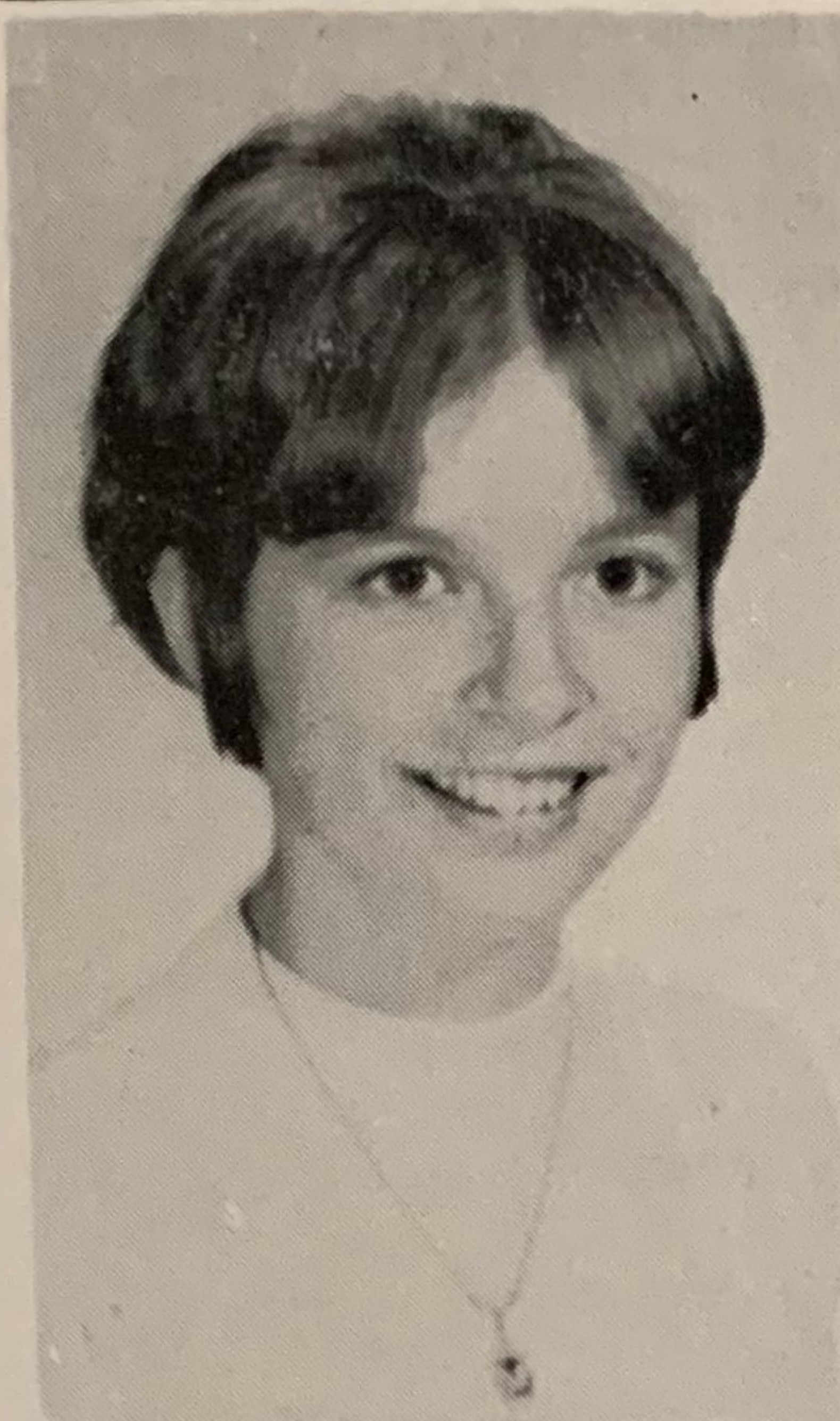

Enrollment Nears 2,000 Students

Have you ever wondered how many people there are here in Lowrey? Well, maybe there are a lot more than you think.

As of October 28, 1966 there was a grand total of 1,912 students enrolled here. This total includes 124 students in kindergarten, 371 in the elementary level, 425 in the junior high level, 912 in the senior high level and 80 in special education which includes the braille, cardiacs, homebound, oral deaf, and orthopedic students.

Besides this grand total of 1,912 students there are 105 teachers and 43 non-instructional people.

Altogether there are approximately 2,060 people here in Lowrey, and that is quite a large number to have anywhere.

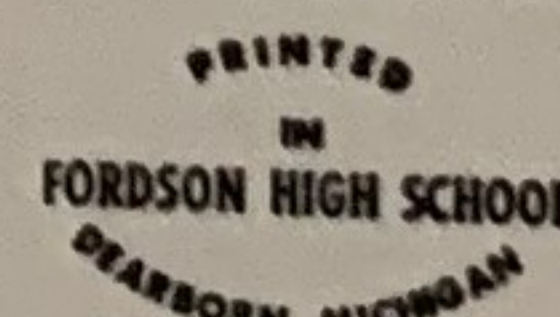

Mr. Falvo Is Promoted

Mr. Falvo, chairman of Lowrey's English department has recently been named as supervisor of State and Federal Projects for the Dearborn School System.

Some of his duties will include acting as a liason between the schools and the legislature. He will also assist in the development of projects which are paid for by the state.

Mr. Falvo taught English at Lowrey for the last six years, and has been in the Dearborn School system since 1954.

Mr. Lowrey, member of Lowrey's English department, and "fearless partment head."

National Merit Scholarship Test To Be Given in February

Lowrey High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship Program, principal Dr. Seavitt announced recently.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMSQT) which will be given in the school at 9:00 a.m., Saturday, February 25 (or Tuesday, February 28), 1967.

Participating students pay \$1.00 fee, which is remitted by the school to Science Research Associates (SRA), the testing agency. Then the test is given on a Saturday. The school may charge an additional fee up to \$1.00 for special administrative costs of testing on a nonschool day. If a student is unable to pay the testing fee, it will be paid by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC) at the request of his school.

In addition to competing for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. With his NMSQT, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores, compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest scoring students in each state will be named semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 13,440 students have won Merit Scholarships in the eleven Merit Programs to date. Some 2,300 Merit Scholarships were awarded in 1966 with stipends ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 per year for four college years. The amount of a winner's award is determined by assessing the financial assistance he will need to attend the college of his choice.

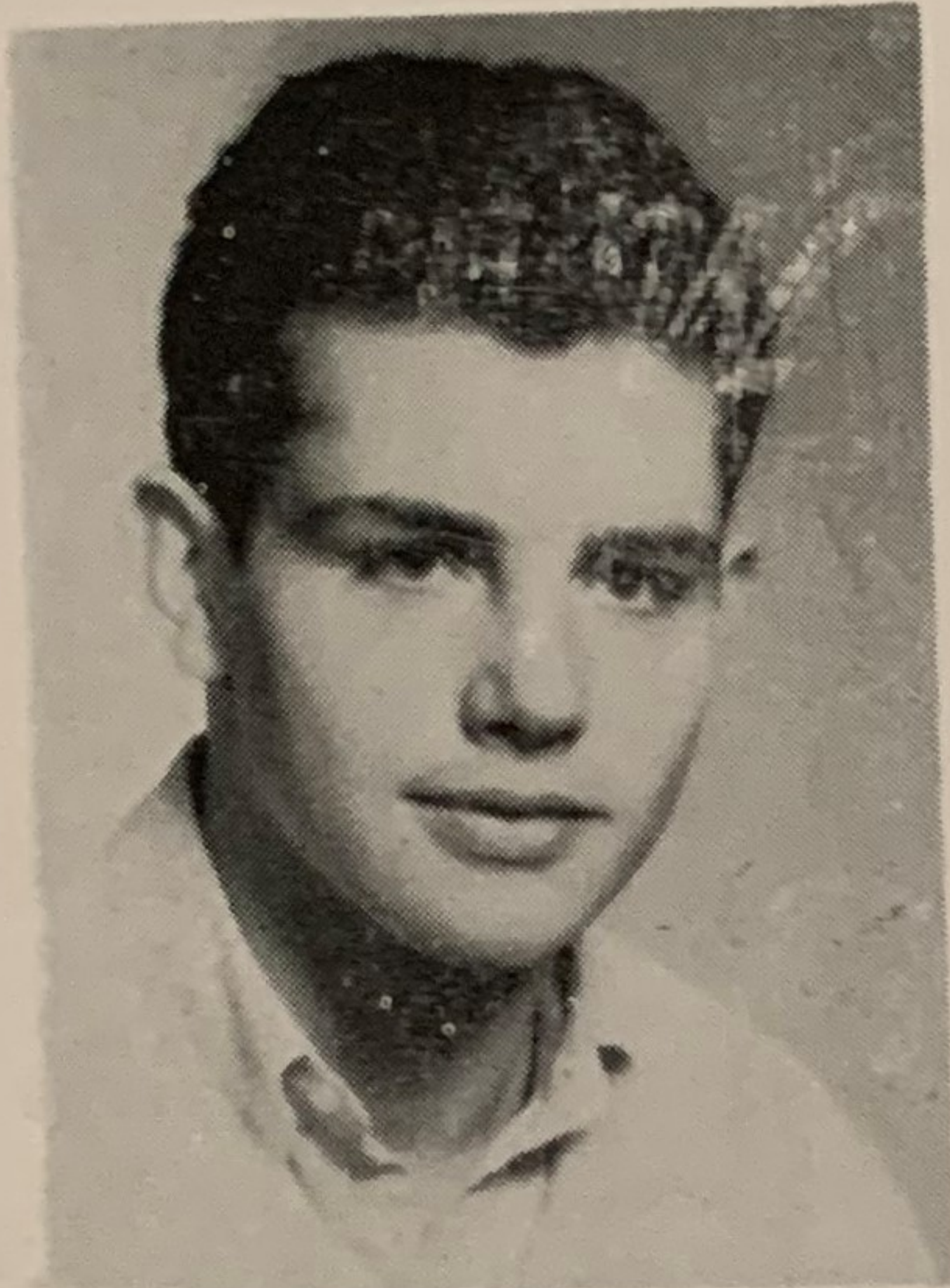
Enrollment Soars

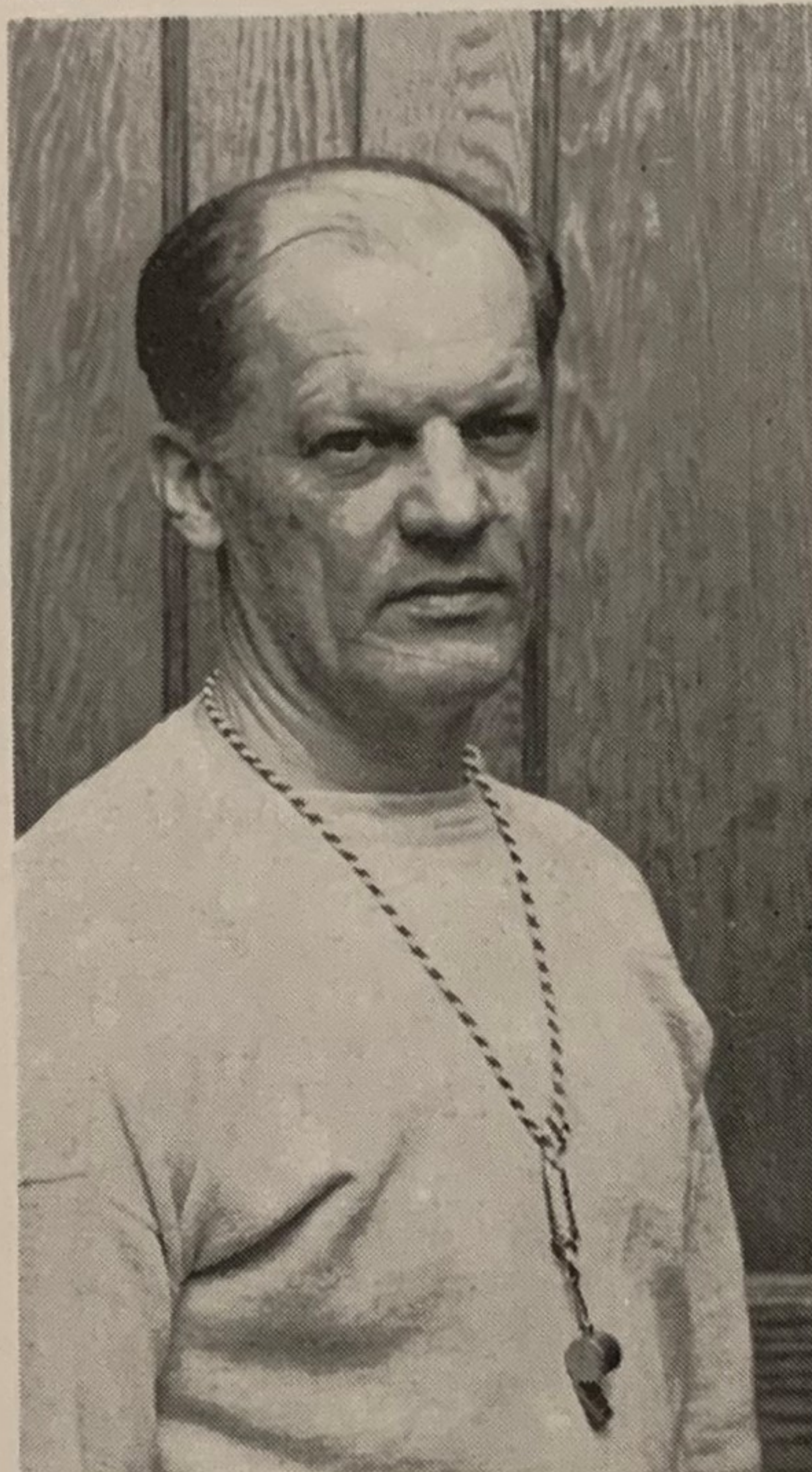
