## Editorials

## AN INTRODUCTION TO YOUR PRINCIPAL

"Whatever good there is in other schools in the city we will incorporate into LaSalle, but we will not copy." These are Mr. Nelson's thoughts about organizing school activities. He further advises, "Keep in mind that you are starting tradition, good or bad. Know your goals, and strive for them."

Mr. Nelson speaks from experience; he has been working in high schools for over twenty years. Mr. Nelson is a graduate of Central High School, South Bend; he received his B.S. degree from Ball State University, Muncie, and his M.S. degree from Indiana University. He taught at Washington High School for seven years as a chemistry and physics teacher. He also coached freshman football there. He served in the United States Army as a Combat Intelligence Officer in the thirty-fourth bomb group for three years. Mr. Nelson



then went to John Adams High School to teach mathematics. He taught for ten years, and in 1956, he became Assistant Principal at Adams. He was an assistant track coach and a freshman football coach at Adams too. As assistant principal at Adams, Mr. Nelson worked with the booster club and American Field Service.

Mr. Nelson said that clubs will be organized when the need and interest indicates. Many of the activities that are established in other high schools will be established at LaSalle. Mr. Nelson also said that many things will be organized when the students are better known.

## Meet Your Counselors

In Mrs. Landry's words, "A counselor must serve the faculty, students, and administration in a manner which enables all of us to reach our greatest potential."

Mr. Kosana, the head counselor, was also head counselor last year at Adams. Mrs. Landry taught home economics at Central and Mr. Barack is from Riley.

## Traffic Tips Tendered To Student and Teachers Who Drive the Drag Strip

**ALL JUNIORS MAY REGISTER FOR P.S.A.T. TESTING DAY**

The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test will be given October 16th at 8:30 A.M. in the LaSalle cafeteria. All juniors are eligible to take the test and should register for it starting October 11 in the guidance office. There will be a fee of \$1.25.

The P.S.A.T. is a national yardstick independent of school grading standards and it can be related to standards or academic success at different types of colleges. The P.S.A.T. scores cannot be substituted for Scholastic Aptitude tests on the senior level, however they do predict the probable score on the Saturday Test.

The test measures verbal mathematical abilities in much the same way as the Saturday Test does on the senior level.

According to Mr. Kosana its main purpose is to provide valid, reliable and inexpensive data for use in helping students to evaluate their ability to do college work.

The P.S.A.T. is a very satisfactory test for anyone planning to attend a college or Liberal Arts School, Technical Nurses Training, Junior College and for those who have really not thought of college, because it might reveal some interesting potential.

Finally to the relief of all "lunch packing" mothers, LaSalle's cafeteria was opened for the serving of plate lunches on September 21.

The meals are planned weekly by Mrs. Kodba. With all the help, 500 plate lunches can be served daily.

As of now, there are 15 students working as assistants in the cafeteria.

**JUNIOR ACHIEVEMENT HEAD OUTLINES PROGRAM OF OPPORTUNITY FOR STUDENTS**

Mr. Reede, head of the Junior Achievement program in South Bend, spoke to the junior class about the program recently in the school lunchroom. He gave them three ways they could get better jobs.

- (1) Complete high school.
- (2) Get as much education after you are out of school as you can afford and,
- (3) Join clubs in and out of school that will give you experience and background in the kind of work you want or think you want to do.

Junior Achievement is completely supported by business because it is a way to sell the system that brought up the standard of living, which is not always popular. They know that the more experience the future employee has the better the job he will be able to get. Also they will be able to find out what the upcoming generation wants to do and has the raw ability to do.

There are three things that are expected of you if you become a member. The first is to attend ALL the meetings which will be held once a week for two hours, seven p.m. to nine p.m. The second is to spend some time on whatever it is your company is producing. Get out and really sell this product. The third and last thing that is expected of you is to use your ingenuity. You can help create the product and influence its advertisement. A company in St. Louis sold DO-NOTHING STICKS. It became quite a fad, everyone had one of these sticks, from doctors to lawyers to grade school kids. They all had DO-NOTHING STICKS. A group in Elkhart built a complete mobile home and other groups have built cars and \$50,000 homes. You name it and some Junior Achievement group some place has done it.

In return for the work and energy you put into this you will be given a chance to meet people from other schools. This comes about because each company has someone from each school working in it. It also gives you a chance to learn what the business world is really like, because you will be competing not only with other achievement companies but also with

anyone that has a product on the market that is similar to yours. Having worked in Junior Achievement you can use it as a recommendation when you are applying for a job. It is the best one you can have in South Bend.

There are three special programs this year. One of them is to have a bank of their own. This came about because they handled about \$40,000 last year and this year they have two more schools to add to a long list and are expecting much more money this year. A second project is a TV show. It will last for thirteen weeks with thirty minute shows. As the bank will require people who have experience in bookkeeping and such, the TV show will require people that can write, act, run cameras and everything else that a regular show has. The last of these special programs is the making of a movie. It will demonstrate the proper way to drive and the different safety devices that have been added to cars in an attempt to make driving safer. ### WALKERTON INDIANS VICTIMS OF SAFETY, TOUCHDOWN BEFORE GAME IS HALF OVER

LaSalle's Lions, beaten in the opening game of their first football season, now own their first victory, an 8-6 victory fashioned on a second-quarter safety against Walkerton's Indians.

Coach Klaybor's club, rolling up 11 first downs on 185 net rushing yards and 26 more passing, took the opening kickoff back 70 yards for a touchdown with Tim Meehan going the final two on a sweep around the right end. Longest gainer in the drive was Meehan's 14 yard run. Dan Wojiechowski's kick for the point was wide.

A bad center snap helped the Lions to a second-period safety. Trying to get from his own four, the Walkerton's punter was trapped by Denny Yost who led the defensive charge.

Meehan was the rushing star for the Lions, chalking up 112 yards in 29 carries.

The LaSalle line, which outcharged the Indians throughout the game also gave a good account of themselves as well as the backfield.

The defense played an exceptionally good game by repeatedly throwing the Indians for losses. The defense slackened in the fourth when Walkerton's Larry Groves snapped a John Stasko pass from the Lions 16 in the end zone. The kick for point failed.

In the first quarter LaSalle moved into the end zone from the two yard line with Tim Meehan carrying the final yardage with 4:44 in the period remaining. The kick failed. The Lions fumbled another scoring opportunity on their own 45 as the quarter ended. Score 6-0.

In the second quarter LaSalle took over on downs as the Indians tried desperately to get their offense going. But the Lions couldn't move their offense and were forced to punt. The ball touched a Walkerton player and the Lions recovered on the Indian 21. This seemed to infuriate the Lions' defense as they threw the Walkerton quarterback for a 10 yard loss. Two other plays failed to gain anything. On fourth down and a punting situation, a bad snap from center proved to be destructive. Denny Yost led the charge and nailed the Indian in his own end zone. Score LaSalle 8, Walkerton 0.

### SATELLITES FALL AS AYERS AND YOST SCORE

#### TD's FOR LASALLE'S SECOND VARSITY VICTORY

Denny Yost and Bill Ayers each scored two touchdowns as the LaSalle Lions overwhelmed the South Central Satellites 27-0. It was the Lions' second victory in three outings.

Ayers and Yost combined to rip the Satellites' defense apart for four touchdowns (plus two that were called back) and 167 of the 224 yards LaSalle gained rushing. Dan Wojiechowski converted perfectly after the first three scores.

Ayers gained 99 yards in 15 carries and Yost 58 in 13 before Coach Klaybor decided the Satellites had had enough and sent in every reserve he had on the bench to play out the last quarter and a half.

Actually, the Satellites would have beaten themselves even if Ayers and Yost hadn't been able to gain a yard.

LaSalle kicked off to start the game, and on the second play from scrimmage, Mike Scholine intercepted a Satellite pass.

The Lions drove to the South Central 2, but an offside penalty set them back to the 7, and they lost the ball on downs. Again on the Satellites' second play, the ball was fumbled in a backfield mixup and Yost recovered it in the end zone. Wojiechowski's kick made it 7-0 with 7:04 to go in the first quarter.

Soon after the kickoff, Scholine stole the ball from South Central's Jack Harshman and the Lions drove 52 yards for the score, with Yost lugging the ball the last 29 yards. It was 14-0 after Wojiechowski's kick with 1:56 left in the first period.

The Satellites failed to move the ball and attempted a punt. They failed to get off after a bad snap from center, and the Lions went over from the 20 with Ayers carrying the final 10. There were 1:54 minutes left before halftime.

A few minutes later South Central lost the ball on downs, and the Lions again capitalized, although Ayers needed to score twice to make it count. He tallied from the 16, but a holding penalty nullified the touchdown, so he dashed in from the 35. The kick failed at 5:18 before the half.

Ayers also had a 61 yard run on the first play from scrimmage after intermission, only to have it called back because of an illegal procedure penalty.

South Central's deepest penetration was to the Lions' 23. The Satellites completed three passes for only two yards, including two in the second half for minus 5.

Although South Central made countless errors, their main mistake was probably showing up.

In 1687 LaSalle was assassinated by his followers.


