Schedule Tribute to Dance

South High School's 84-member girls' drill team, the Rebelettes, will stage an original choreographed dance show tomorrow at 8 p.m. in the campus lecture center.

Called "A Tribute to Dance," the show may be the first of annual spring presentations by the drill team, according to Miss Helen Felton and Mrs. Linda Sargent, Rebelette advisers and girls' physical education instructors.

All 84 girls will be featured. A total of 14 dances representative of both foreign nations and America will be presented, along with a 17-minute presentation of "Billy the Kid," featuring 25 select dancers. Music will be taped, although the Rebel Stage Band under the direction of John Briscoe will play an overture and will also play during the intermission.

Choreography is being done by the students themselves, with adaptations by the advisers. The girls share a common physical education class, and practices are being conducted during that period.

Rebelettes are making their own costumes, the advisers said, sometimes without a pattern, or by piecing patterns together. Seniors in drama classes will assist with make-up. Three other faculty members are assisting with the production: Robert Hudson, with staging and props; Robert Douglas, with flats and other art work and Ronald Steinman, who will narrate the "Billy the Kid" number.

Tickets may be purchased now from Rebelettes. They will also be on sale at the box office.

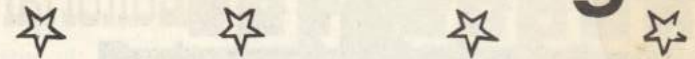

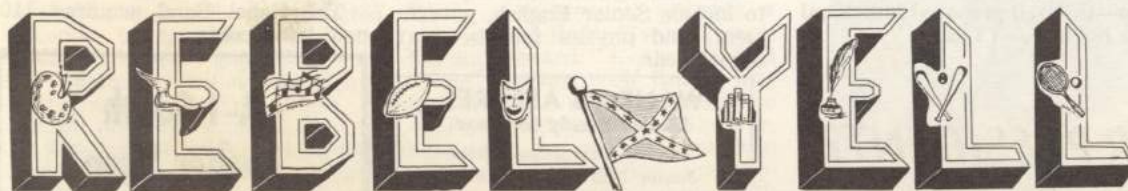

South High freshman Brian Tibbs probably came within one strike of hurling a no-hitter at the West High Viking baseball team at the latter's diamond yesterday afternoon in a 2-0 Rebel win.

With one out in the West half of the sixth inning Tibbs had a no ball and two-strike count on Vike second baseman Don Youngblood, and also a no-hitter going for himself. However, on the next pitch, Youngblood dropped a blooper into rightfield to end the spell. It was the host's lone hit of the day.

Tibbs, who stands 6-0 at 160 pounds, ended the game with 13 strike-outs. The hard-throwing youngster walked but three batters. However, it was not a cinch toward victory for the frosh hurler as he drew a tough and competitive opposition from Vike pitcher Steve Steiber. Steiber went the distance in allowing only six hits and three walks.

The victory vaulted the Rebels out of the SYL cellar at 1-4. West is now in the unenviable position with an 0-5 league mark.

South scored both of its runs in the second inning as the Rebels collected half of their total of six hits. Catcher Bob

Rader led things off with a single and moved to third on Dave Hall's one-out single. With runners on first and third, Brent McClanahan drew a base-on-balls to load the bases.

Steiber then struck out Don Duckworth for out number 2 to bring up pitcher Tibbs. The freshman topped the ball in front of the plate, but the throw to home was too late to nail Rader. An insurance run was added when Eugene Walker got a free pass to force in Hall.

The Vikings came close to reaching the scoreboard twice. With runners on first and third in the fifth and but one out, an attempted suicide squeeze play went for naught with the third-base runner being picked off. Again in the sixth, the hosts threatened but came up empty-handed. After Youngblood's hit, West loaded the bases with two outs, but outfielder Tony Cornett became another whiff victim of Tibbs.

West's junior varsity baseballers remained in first place in the league as they triumphed over the Raiders, 6-3. The visiting Frosh team outlasted the hosts, 9-7.

Bakersfield is now 7-1 and one-half game ahead of Foothill (6-1). The Trojans still have a makeup match slated against South which is now in the cellar at 0-7. Right behind the Trojans with a 6-2 mark is West while East (3-5) holds a two-game advantage over North (1-7).

In girls action, which pits the same schools against each other, BHS stayed unbeaten for the year and in first place with a win over North (0-8). Foothill also won to make it 6-1, with two matches yet to be played against the powerful Drillerettes. West (5-3) defeated fifth place South (1-6) to keep well within striking range of Troy.

South Sequoia League teams got through their fourth league matches yesterday with Wasco's boys still leading their race at 4-0. The Tigers won at Taft (2-2) by a slim 3-2. Arvin handed Shafter their fourth consecutive league loss to climb into a second place tie with the Wildcats.

Taft's girls remained unbeaten in the league with a 3-1 win at Wasco. The Tigerettes are now even with Shafter (2-2) which was victorious over Arvin (0-4).

BHS' Roger Almklov and Ted Paulsen continued their winning pace against North with 6-2, 6-0 and 6-3, 6-0 victories, respectively. Bob Smith added a third singles win for the victors with the Stars only point coming from a second doubles win by Steve Nall and Rick Talley.

At South, Nancy Bracke, Marcia Glasser and Shelley Clayton paced the Vikette win with singleton nods. Host East nipped by Troy 3-2. Foothill won the second and third singles behind Kathy Jeffery and Alitha Wiebe and the second doubles with Alice Wong and Cathy Wictorin to escape the East courts without an upset.

At Arvin high, the Bears handed the Generals their second straight setback in matches against the two schools. Pat Arvizu, Mike Brantley and Bob Horton swept through the singles in victory for the hosts while Shafter got its only win from doubles Ron Koop and Richard Walhood. Details of the Taft-Wasco match were unavailable.

Five Records Fall in Delano Kiwanis Relays

DELANO — Five records fell and two more were denied by excess wind in the eighth annual Delano Kiwanis Relays of Champions held Saturday on the Tiger track.

There was no team scores kept in the event. The outstanding athlete award went to Clovis' junior shotputter, Al Dalerio, with a heave of 59-2. But this was far off the meet record of 60-10 $\frac{1}{4}$ set by Mike Garratt of Taft in 1965. Dalerio has a best this year of 60-9.

Shattering meet records were Porterville's four-mile relay team, Edison's 440 and mile-relay squads, Clovis' distance medley foursome and Rick Fletcher of Hoover in the mile steeplechase.

Jerry Wilson of Roosevelt skimmed the 120-yard high hurdles in 14.4, under the old mark of 14.5. But the cool breezes which whipped across the Delano track denied the record. Henry Shipes of East timed a lifetime best of 14.9 for second place.

Kenny Jones of South edged an excellent sprint field in the 100-yard dash, timing an all-time best and school record of 9.7. This would have tied the old meet standard with no wind. Jones nipped Louie Amps and Stan McCloud of Edison, both

timed in 9.8, while James Allen of Bakersfield and Steve Genco of Roosevelt were another stride back at 9.9.

Allen came within a half-inch of equalling his meet record of 23-5 in the long jump. The Drillers had two other winners in the meet. Rodney Barnes won the high jump at 6-2 while the BHS 880-relay team of Jack Williams, Vernell Jackson, Benny Blair and John Caldwell turned in a winning clocking of 8:26.2.

Shipes captured the 330 hurdles in 41.7 and the Blades' sprint-medley relay team was timed in a winning 3:35.9. The foursome was composed of Shipes, Gerald Ludd, John Christensen and Tommy Garcia.

Joe Ortega of Delano turned in a Valley best triple jump this year of 46-4 $\frac{1}{2}$. He is co-holder of the Valley record at 47-2 $\frac{1}{2}$ set in last year's Delano meet.

Porterville's four-mile relay team broke the old record by nearly 10 seconds despite no competition. The foursome consisted of the three Sanchez brothers, Raul, Louis and Gabe, plus Dave Daniel. They were timed in 18:25.0.

With the speedy McCloud and Amps running the last two legs, Edison had it pretty much its own way in the 440 and mile relays. The 440 time of 42.8 broke the old mark of 43.1. Bakersfield, which has a 42.3 clocking this season, was second in 43.1. The Tigers' mile-relay time of 3:23.9 is a Valley best this season. It broke the old Delano record of 3:24.6.

Rebs' Jones in 9.6 100

South High sprinter Kenny Jones put his name in the Kern County prep record book in two events yesterday at Memorial Stadium, but the speedy senior wasn't enough to overcome Bakersfield's superior depth in a South Yosemite League dual meet.

Jones, who has participated in the last two state

meets, equalled the best time in California for the 100-yard dash this year when he clocked 9.6 and then came back in the 220 with no competition for a 21.7 time around a turn. These marks equalled the best times ever run by a Kern County high school athlete.

Despite winning nine of the 16 events, Jim Riley's Rebels bowed to Bakersfield, 77-59, in varsity. BHS made it a sweep by taking class B, 72-50, and class C, 64-49.

But the star of the show on the fast Stadium track was Jones. In the 100, he was running against Bakersfield's outstanding junior dashman, James Allen. Jones exploded out of the blocks, however, and led Allen by three to five yards for most of the sprint distance.

The 9.6 time broke Jones' old school record of 9.7 set two weeks ago in the Delano Relays and equalled all-time Kern County best clockings by Roger Jones, Bill Mackey and Ben Olson of East, Charles Mannings of Bakersfield and Leamon King of Delano.

The marks of the three Blades were all wind-aided while Mannings' time is debatable since the official timers at the meet in Taft a few years back failed to see the smoke of the starting gun, according to East coach Chuck Weinmann, who was at that particular meet. Yesterday's run by Jones appeared to take place when the wind was below the allowable maximum.

Jones equalled Olson's best of 21.7 for the 220 around a turn. He once again got off to a quick start and led by nearly 10 yards as he hit the straight. This broke Jones' old school record of 21.9.

Allen led the Driller victory with a double in the long jump and 180 low hurdles, plus anchoring the 440-relay team to a win by holding off the charging Jones. Allen's long jump was an excellent 23-4, but short of his Northern California test this year of 23-8¾. He clocked 19.7 in the lows and the 440-relay time was 42.8.

South had an excellent chance to upset the Drillers after 14 events, trailing 63-59. But Allen led a BHS sweep of the long jump, and the Rebels had to forfeit the mile relay for the final margin. The Drillers also swept the high jump while South was unable to shutout Bakersfield in any event.

The Rebels broke two other school records. Fred Contreras lowered his old mark in the mile to 4:32.9 while Wallace Williams broke his own shotput standard with a heave of 54.7. South's Tom Parry had a good pole vault leap of 13-0 and the Rebs' Doug Smith was the only

McCuen Steps Out After 39-Year School Career

Theron L. McCuen's 39-year career with the Kern County Joint Union High School and Kern Joann Junior College District will end next week.

The veteran educator, who has headed both the high school and college districts since 1945, will not retire officially until June 30. However, vacation and other accrued time permits him to quit work May 1.

Trustees, who serve both districts, have appointed Dr. John Eckhardt and Dr. Edward Simonsen acting superintendents of the high school and college districts, respectively, effective next Wednesday. They were named last fall to succeed McCuen and will assume full-time responsibilities July 1.

Board president Albert S. Gould expressed the trustees' appreciation of McCuen's long-

time service to education and said the district is fortunate in having men the caliber of Dr. Eckhardt and Dr. Simonsen as successors.

McCuen, a Stanford graduate, came to the district in 1929 as a mathematics and engineering drawing instructor at Bakersfield High School and College. From 1936 to 1945 he was assistant superintendent in charge of business affairs for the district. At Thursday night's board session, McCuen's final as an official participant, he recalled attending his first trustees' meeting in an official capacity in May, 1936, as an assistant superintendent.

Theron S. Taber Jr., deputy superintendent, whose retirement also was announced last fall, will serve until June 30 when his successor, Harry J. Ward, assumes the post.

KEN JONES SHOWS COACH WHY HE SHOULDN'T RUN 440 RACE

South High track mentor Jim Riley thinks Kenny Jones would make an excellent quarter-miler, but Jones would rather be a sprinter and he clocked a couple of eye-popping times last week to use an argument.

"I still think he is a 440 man because he is so big and strong," says Riley. "But he will definitely be in the 100 and 220 the rest of the year." Jones may have convinced Riley last week when he timed 9.6 for the short dash and 21.7 for the 220 around a turn, both school records, in a dual meet against Bakersfield.

Both these times are close to the Valley records of 9.5 and 21.4. Jones will be shooting for the 9.5 this Saturday, on the same Memorial Stadium track where he ran his 9.6 in the Kern Relays. Jones will be

getting plenty of competition from Fresno's Clyde Lansing, also a 9.6 sprinter which ties the best mark in the state this year. "I think he could hit 9.5 this week," says Riley.

"The weakest part of his race has been his starts, but he got his best one of the year Thursday. This is what we'll be working on the rest of the season. Kenny will never jump the gun, and sometimes he stays in the blocks too long. You can't get a bad start in the state and divisional meets and expect to win."

If Jones qualifies for this year's state meet, it will mean he's participated in the United States' outstanding prep trackfest every year he's been in high school. As a freshman, Jones ran in an exhibition class C 440-relay when the meet was at Bakersfield. He still holds the Valley class C record of

35.4 for the 330 and was also a 10-flat sprinter as a frosh.

As a sophomore, Jones clocked his all-time best of 49.4 in the 440 for another trip to the state, where he went unplaced. Last year, the South senior made it as a 220 man when he set the former school record of 21.9. Jones ran a 9.9 100 as a sophomore and lowered it to 9.8 last year.

Besides his starts, one thing that has troubled Jones at South has been illness. Jones was born with club feet, but his feet don't give him trouble. It just seems he has an illness of one kind or the other which sets him back.

Riley was going to prime him for the 440 this year by running some 880's earlier in the season to build up his endurance. Jones clocked 2:04 in his first half, but then fell sick and was out

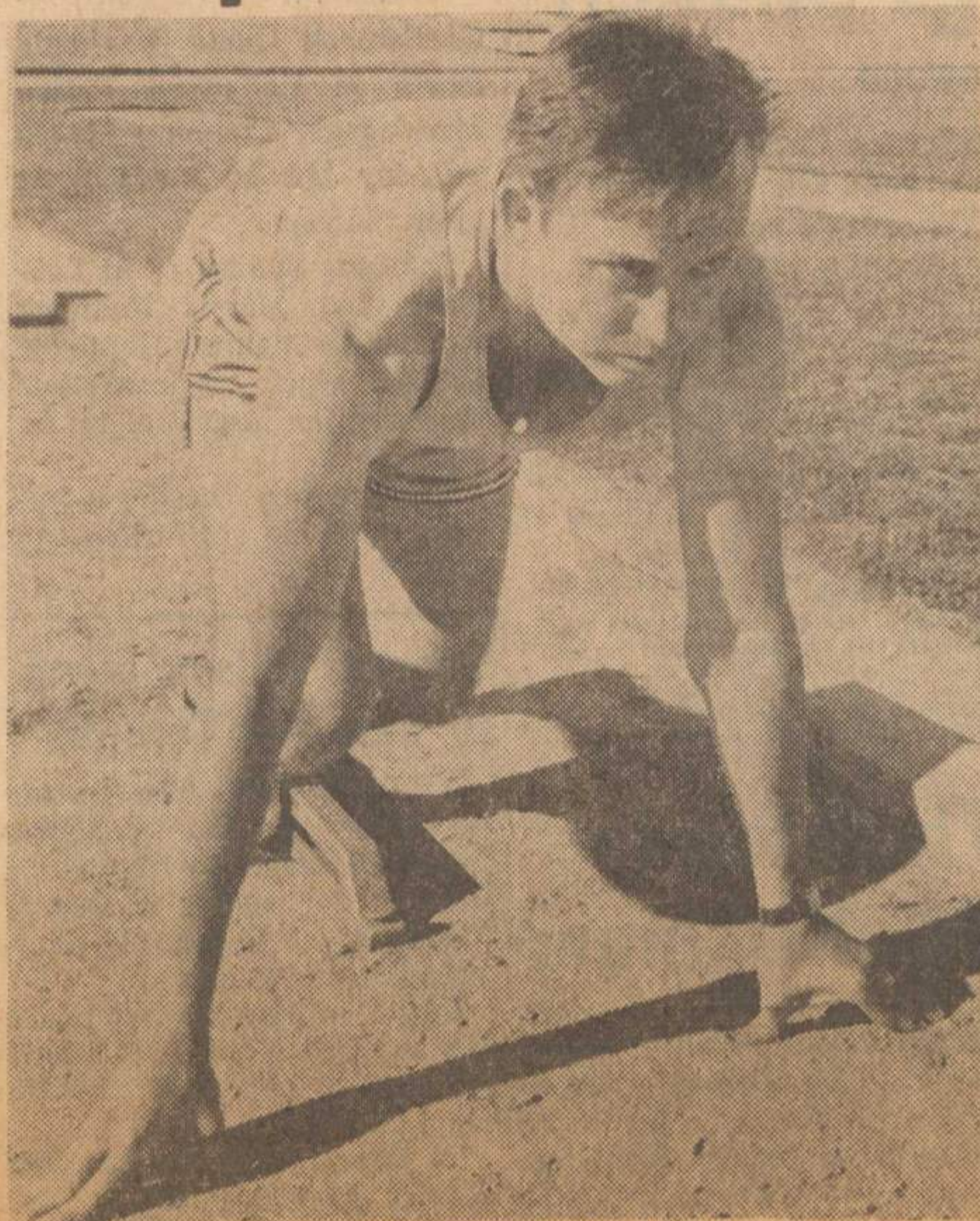
for two weeks. Jones came back strictly as a 100 and 220 man.

"The 220 is probably his best race," says Riley of his 170-pound senior. "I caught him at 20.7 on his 220 leg of the 880-relay at Tulare Saturday." In that race, Jones came from 15 yards back to nearly pull out a victory over Bakersfield sprinter John Batsch. And he came from behind to beat the Drillers' No. 1 sprinter, James Allen, in the 440 relay.

Riley still hasn't given up the idea of Jones running longer races, although it won't be for South High School. "He could end up being a half-miler in college," says Riley of Jones, who is planning to go to Bakersfield College next year. "He ran some real good 660's in junior high school, so I know he can do it."

Of course, Jones might have something to say about it, like maybe a 9.4 and 21.3.

Finian's Rainbow

We live in troubled times as a war of questionably popularity and support is being fought in remote jungles of the earth, and racial strife threatens to destroy the United States from within. With this all about us, how then can we sit back and enjoy a play which by definition is a fantasy? Some claim that plays are totally unrelated to life, but it is hoped that upon close examination you will discover that "Finian's Rainbow" is talking to you about very real things.

"Finian's Rainbow" begins disarmingly enough as a fairy-tale regarding a leprachaun named Og chasing an old man Finian across the United States pursuing a stolen crock of gold. The confrontation is made in the unlikely community of Missitucky U.S.A. While Finian and the leprechaun are battling for the gold, Sharon (Finian's daughter) finds the gold of her life as she falls in love.

Comedy now abounds in this play except in the heart of Senator Rawkins, a racial bigot. One voice of dissent in a community of happiness is all that is needed to destroy everything that has been so beautifully molded.

The vital question to be posed at this time is "What gives one man the right to be superior to another man?" As the Senator's relationships with the colored people of Missitucky unfolds, we see that he has no right or claim to be superior.

It takes the love of Woody and Sharon, the comedy of Finian and his gold, and the fantasy of Og the Leprechaun becoming mortal to show the Senator how wrong he has been in his beliefs. This may appear to be a lot of effort to be expended on one man, but if it changes just one attitude it's well worth any effort.

"Finian's Rainbow" is thus a story of love, comedy, fantasy and racial bigotry. May the first three themes be talking to you tonight.

Briscoe Named Project Leader for KCJUHSD

Appointment of Cecil D. Briscoe as project supervisor under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act has been announced by trustees of the Kern County Joint Union High School District.

Currently the dean of boys at South High School, Briscoe in his new position with the district will, on July 1, assume duties similar to those now held by Don L. Murfin. The latter leaves the post to become principal at South High School.

The Elementary and Secondary Act, passed by Congress in 1965, provides instruction and services to educationally disadvantaged youth. Five high schools in the district qualify for federal

assistance under the act — Arvin, Bakersfield, East Bakersfield, McFarland and South. A sixth district high school — Shafter — will be included in 1968-69. Target area schools are designated on the basis of the number of students receiving welfare aid.

Briscoe is a graduate of the local schools and served as student body president at Bakersfield College. Following his graduation at BC in 1950, he attended UCLA for a year before transferring to University of California at Berkeley where he received his bachelor's degree in 1952. He completed two years of post graduate work at Berkeley and additional graduate studies at San Diego State and University of Oklahoma. He is currently enrolled in the master's degree program at Fresno State College.

Joining the district in 1957, Briscoe taught for three years at Shafter High School. At South High since 1960, he has served as teacher, attendance supervisor and counselor and, since 1967, dean of boys.

Briscoe served in the U.S. Navy three years and currently is a lieutenant commander and training officer in the local Naval Reserve unit. He and his wife, Eleanor, are the parents of four children — Richard, 10; Lori, 9; Rara, 3; and Jason, 2.
