# North High 9 Batters Rebels, 15-2

Three-hit pitching by Star Bill Thomas and a 14-hit barrage against four South pitchers by Thomas and his teammates led North High to a 15-2 South Yosemite League rout of the visiting Rebels yesterday.

Every game is a "must" for the Star nine now if it hopes to win the SYL title. Coach Sam Barton's squad, now 6-4, is tied for second with East and Foothill. Bakersfield High leads the league with 9-1 and needs only three wins in its last five games to cop the crown outright. South is 3-7, three tilts ahead of winless West.

The Stars open their final round of league play Friday by hosting West, while the Rebels visit East.

Shortstop Tim Mazza led North's offensive play with three hits and four runs-batted-in. Five other Star batters—Thomas, Brian Nelson, Matt Herndon, Bob Crissman and Rick Harvick—each slapped a pair of hits. Four of the hosts' safeties went for extra bases, giving the Stars 23 such raps during their 4-1 second-round campaign.

The Starmen scored a lone run in the bottom of the second when Mazza singled home Steve Homa, then won it in the fourth with a five-run rally.

Homa reached first base on a fielder's choice to start things off and went to second on a one-bagger by Thomas. Mazza ripped one through the box to again score Homa.

A triple to right-centerfield by Harvick scored Thomas and Mazza. Bob Sherrill lined a double down the third base line to knock in Harvick and then came home with the inning's final run on a single by Crissman.

Jack Towery's Rebs did all their damage in the top of the sixth on a walk to Eugene Walker, triple by Barry Phillips and sacrifice fly by Mark Hance.

North added another run to its lead in the seventh when Nelson doubled home Herndon, and then exploded for eight more the following frame to add insult to injury. There were only four hits in the big splurge, but walks and three South errors more than made up for any lack of them.

South won the junior varsity and frosh tilts by margins of 6-3 and 7-6 (extra innings), respectively.

## 400 More Attend Kern High Schools Than During 1967

Average daily attendance in schools of the Kern County Joint Union High School District has reached 17,656, according to figures released today by district trustees.

The statistics, covering the period from March 18 to April 12, show an increase of more than 400 over a similar period last year.

Average daily attendance in the district, by schools, include Arvin, 1,283; Bakersfield, 3,158; Burroughs, 1,468; East Bakersfield, 2,368; Foothill, 2,112; Kern Valley, 263; McFarland, 342; North,

1,788; Shafter, 938; South, 1,901; and West, 2,035.

The figures do not include continuation school classes at Vista High School, Arvin, Burroughs and Shafter nor adult education classes in the district.

Statistics were compiled in the office of research director Harry J. Ward.

Trustees approved a holiday schedule for classified employees during the 1968-69 year. Holidays totaling nine include Independence Day, Labor Day, Admission Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas, New Year's,

Lincoln's Birthday and Memorial Day.

The board adopted a resolution of intent to sell a parcel of property adjacent to the West High School campus. Advertisement for bids will follow.

# BHS Choice for Usual SYL Track Meet Win

Bakersfield High came within half-a-point of losing its first varsity division South Yosemite League track title in the 20-year history of the meet last year, but the Drillers aren't expected to let the other five SYL teams get that close tonight at Memorial Stadium.

While the SYL teams are qualifying the top five in each event for the Yosemite Divisionals May 18 at Tulare,

South Sequoia League teams are staging their meet this afternoon at Arvin with the big attraction being Wasco high jumper Otis Hailey, who set a national record last Saturday at 7-1 $\frac{1}{4}$ .

Meet director Chuck Weinmann of East announces that the SYL meet will begin at 4:30 today with some Class B and C field events. Trials in all dashes and hurdles except the varsity 100 will begin at 5:15. The varsity long jump, pole

vault and shotput starts at 5:45 with the first final on the track at 7 o'clock.

Admission prices are \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. Weinmann has added something new to this year's meet, a scoreboard on the infield which will give the running score in all three classes. In addition, the top five finishers in each event will be listed on another infield scoreboard.

The team which gave BHS the big scare last year was

South. The Rebels, led by sprinter Kenny Jones, figure to equal or surpass the Drillers in first-place finishes, but don't quite appear to have the depth this season.

Jones will try to improve on his state-best time of 9.6 in the 100 with James Allen (9.8) and John Batsch (9.9) of the Drillers the chief competition. Jones is also a 21.7 220 man.

Another outstanding South performer is triple-jumper Doug Smith (47-2 $\frac{1}{4}$ ). This is over two feet beyond the existing league record. Smith will also be dueling Henry Shipes of East in the 120 high hurdles, both having timed 14.6.

Bakersfield's big gun is Allen. The Driller junior has gone 23-10 $\frac{1}{2}$  in the long jump and run the 180 lows in 19.3. Shipes has a best time of 19.4, but has beaten Allen in their only two meetings. Don Hicks of the Drillers and Smith have clocked 19.7.

Batsch is the best bet in the quarter with a 51.0 time while David Boanen of West is the top half-miler. The mile looks like a battle between John Caldwell (4:30) of BHS, Mike Davis (4:32) of West and Fred Contreras (4:32) of South. Ricky Hitchcock (9:24.3) of North is expected to break his own league two-mile mark with competition from West's Mark Andrews (9:36).

Joe Padilla of Foothill could be a double winner in the weight events with a 54-10 in the shotput and 156 in the discus. Wallace Williams of South has put the shot 54-7. The Rebs' Tom Parry is a 13-6 pole vaulter while Steve Clark of North and Donovan Daniels, Rodney Barnes and Dan Hansen of Bakersfield are all between 6-2 and 6-3 in the high jump.

A real barn burner is expected in the 440 relay between South (42.1), anchored by Jones, and Bakersfield (42.3), with Allen running the final leg. The Drillers have the top mile-relay time of 3:26.0.

East figures to be strong in class B with Tommy Garcia, Ed Granillo and Eddie Beadle dropping down from varsity. Garcia, the defending Valley class B 1,320 champion, has a best 880 time of 1:59.6. Granillo, who won the Valley 1,320 in class C, has covered that distance in 3:15.1. Beadle has triple jumped 43-3.

North and East have strong class C teams to challenge Bakersfield. Rodney Warren of West is one of the best 330 men in the Valley at 37.4.

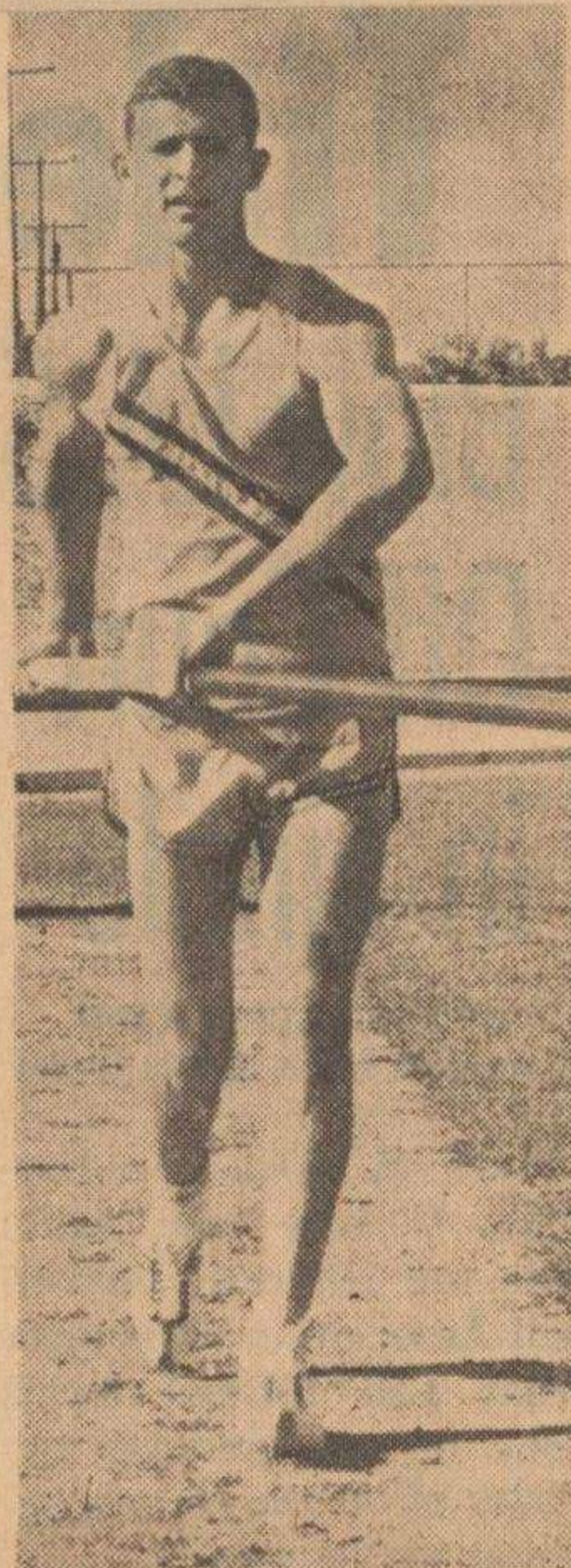
The South Sequoia trackfest, which will be free of charge, won't be a qualifying meet for the Sequoia Divisionals at Dos Palos May 18.

Other excellent athletes besides Hailey are Laird Parker of Shafter, the defending Valley mile champion; Wasco's Mike Craig in the discus (160-3) and shotput (56-3), and Taft's Larry Strawn (160- $\frac{1}{2}$ ) in the discus and Pat Young (56-6) in the shot. Hailey has also run the 120 highs in 14.7.

Meet director Frank Barle looks for defending champion Shafter to be strong in varsity with Taft favored in class B and Wasco and Taft in class C.

# Kenny Jones Dashes to Record Double

## Rebel Clocks 9.5, 21.3 in League Meet

Kenny Jones, a powerful-striding senior from South High, scored the fastest sprint double in Valley high school track history, and the best in the state this year, last night during the South Yosemite League meet at Memorial Stadium when he blazed to a 9.5 clocking in the 100, followed by a 21.3 time in the 220.

The 100 mark tied the best ever run in the Valley while the 21.3 dash around a turn is the fastest clocking in Central Section history.

Team honors were divided evenly last night as the top five boys in each event of all three classes qualified for the Yosemite Divisionals at Tulare May 18. Bakersfield took varsity with 85½ points to South's 62. The Drillers have never lost an SYL league meet.

**East came through in Class B** with 74½ tallies to 62½ for Bakersfield. Newcomer West made its presence felt in class C with a winning total of 66½ to 38½ for Bakersfield.

Jones joined some illustrious company with his 9.5 time. The Rebel flyer, whose previous best was 9.6, joined Tommie Smith of Lemoore and Jerry White of Corcoran in the all-time Valley record book in the sprint. Smith is the current world 220 recordholder while White is a former national 440 prep champion. The old 9.6 league mark was shared by Charles Manning of BHS and former Olympian Leamon King of Delano.

**Jones coasted to an easy victory** in the 220, winning by more than five yards. Jones' 21.3 time beat the old Valley record of 21.4 by W. C. Parmer of Lemoore and Don Imrie of Madera set last year. The league record of 21.7 was set by another Jones, Roger of East in 1966. The SYL mark for the 220 on a straightaway is 21.2 by Ben Olison of East.

Jones' records weren't the only new SYL marks set on the warm, but sometimes gusty evening. New varsity standards were also garnered by Mike Davis of West in the mile, Ricky Hitchcock of North in the two mile, Doug Smith of South in the triple jump and Bakersfield's 440-yard relay team.

**The sprint relay was expected to be quite a battle** between the Drillers and South, which beat BHS in the Kern Relays last week. But the first three runners, Wilson Mackey, John Batsch and Don Hicks, gave anchorman James Allen plenty of margin to hold off Jones. Bakersfield was timed in a Valley best this year of 42.0 around two turns.

Hitchcock lowered his own former league record by over

10 seconds, timing 9:23.3 with no competition. Second-place Mark Andrews of West was nearly 250 yards behind.

Davis, only a junior, clocked 4:24.9 for the mile, narrowly beating the old 4:25.0 record by Mike Vasquez of East.

**Smith who went 47-2¼ in the triple jump** last week, managed only 46-0 last night, but the Rebel junior still broke the old record by nearly a foot.

The only varsity double winner besides Jones is yet another outstanding junior, Bakersfield's Allen. He had no competition in the long jump with a leap of 23-4¼, but really had to motor to win the 180 low hurdles in his all-time best of 19.0.

Henry Shipes of East, who had beaten Allen in two previous meetings, was right with the Bakersfield speedster all the way before Allen lunged ahead at the tape. Shipes had earlier won the 120-yard high hurdles at 14.6.

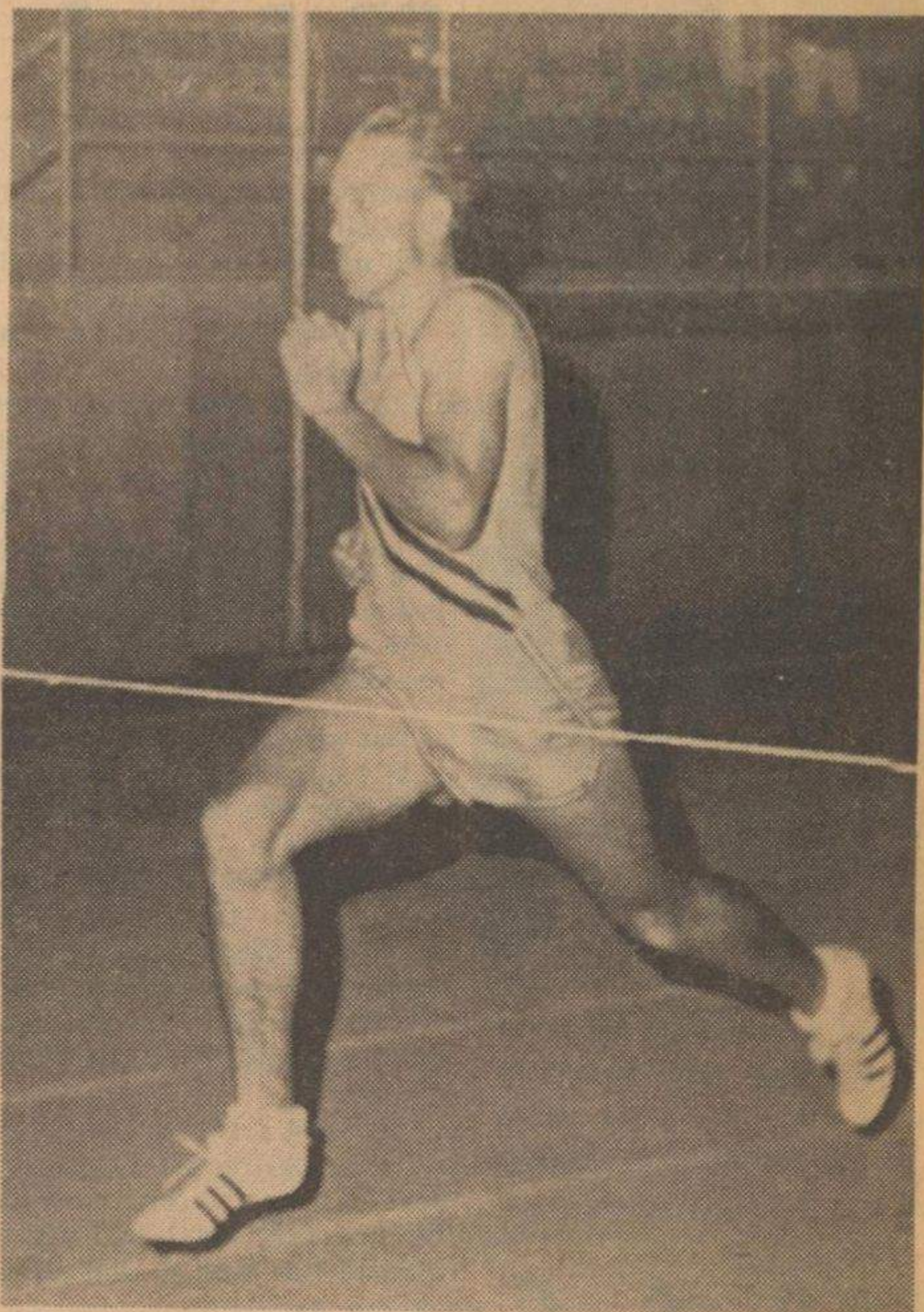
**Other varsity winners were** Batsch in the 440 at 50.4, David Boan of West in the 880 at 1:58.1, Rodney Barnes of Bakersfield in the high jump at 6-4, Joe Padilla of Foothill in the shotput at 53-8, Tom Williams of North in the discus at 145-1, Tom Parry of South in the pole vault at 13-4 and Bakersfield's mile-relay team at 3:30.1.

Pacing East's class B win was Tommy Garcia with an excellent 1:58.3 clocking in the 880 and winning 51.1 time in the 440. Deron Brown of Bakersfield was also a double winner in the two hurdle races.

East's 440-relay team of Gerald Ludd, Garcia, Russell Grimes and John Nichols set a new league record of 43.2 in the 440 relay. EB's Eddie Beadle bettered his old SYL triple jump standard at 44-2 while Bakersfield's Frankie Hammond tied the league record in the 100 at 9.9.

**Sprinter Chris Glover was the big gun** in West's class C triumph, tying the league record in the 100 at 10.2, winning the 180 at 19.1 and anchoring the 440-relay team to victory.

West's David Salcido set a new loop mark in the 1,320 with a time of 3:15.5. Bakersfield's Smith is a new class C recordholder in the triple jump at 40-10¾.

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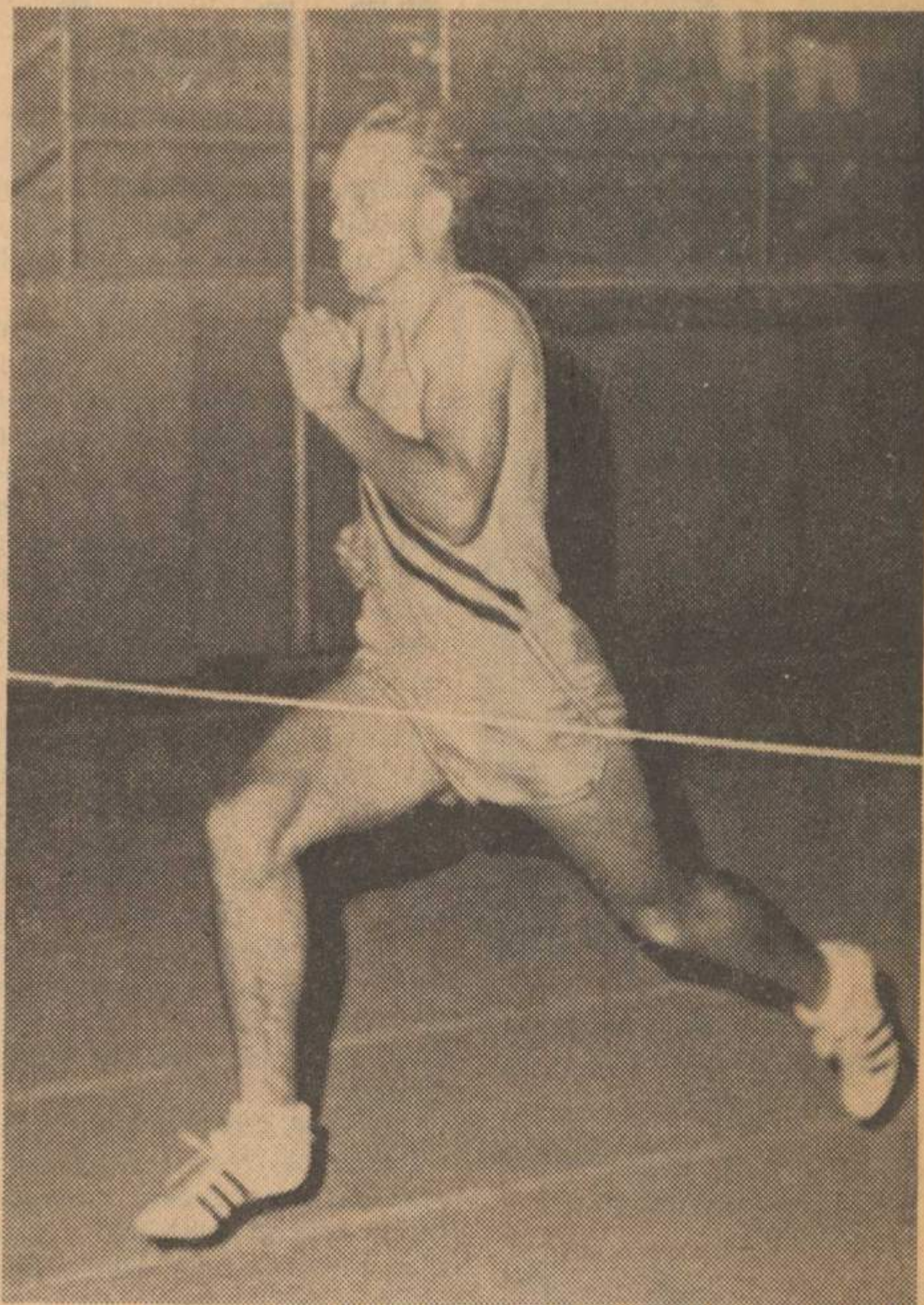

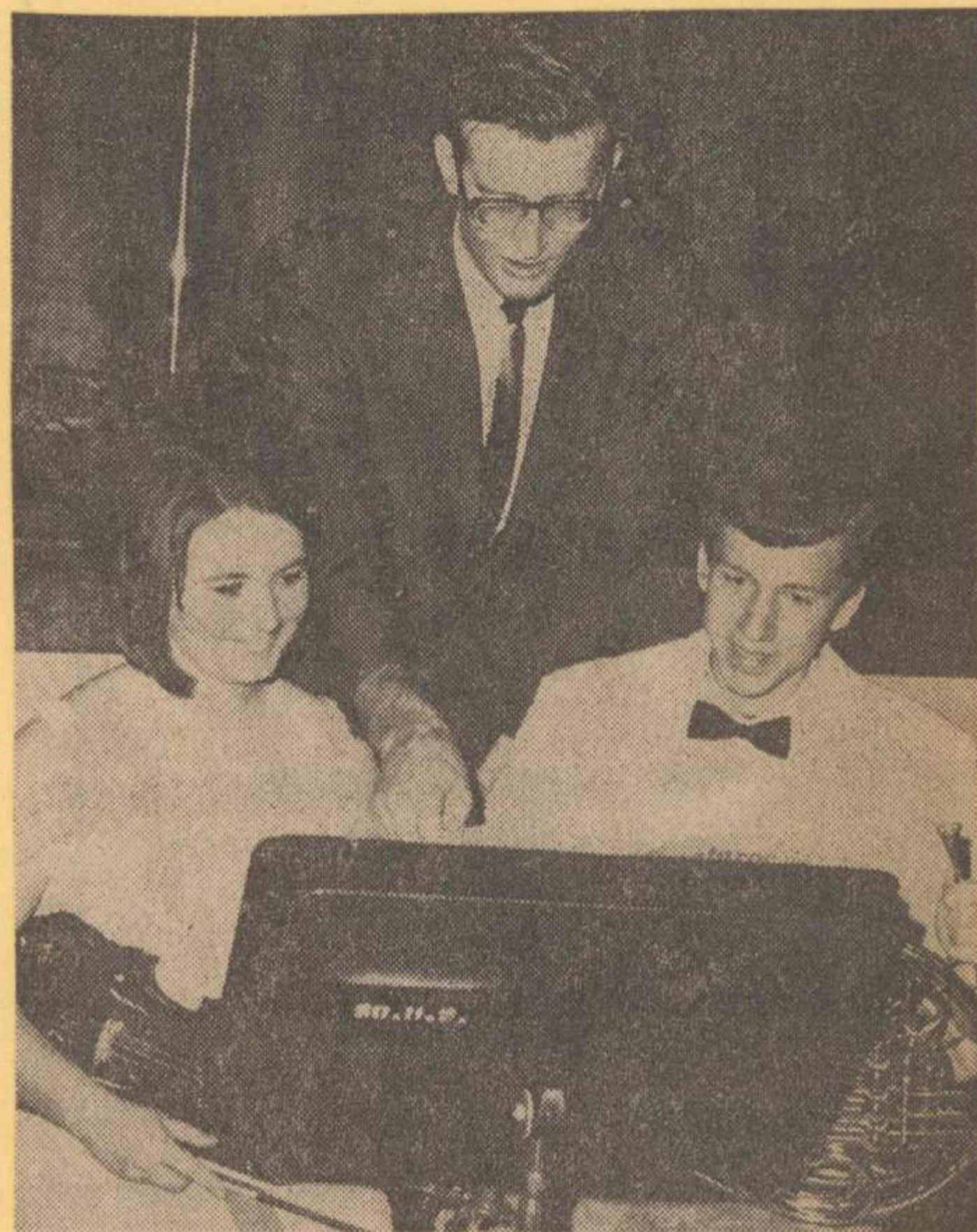

FRESNO — Heulon Hewitt of Merced became the second national inter-scholastic record holder from the Central Section when he long jumped 25-10<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> to highlight the high school division of the West Coast Relays before 9,000 fans at Ratcliffe Stadium last night. Hewitt joined Wasco high jumper Otis Hailey on the all-time best high school list. Hailey, who leaped 7-1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> two weeks ago in the Kern Relays, set a new West Coast Relays record in his specialty last night at

6-9, beating the old mark by an inch. The Tiger senior tried three times at seven feet, just missing on his third attempt.

South dashman Kenny Jones and North two-miler Ricky Hitchcock also beat the cream of Northern California's crop in their events. Jones ran the 100 in 9.6 while Hitchcock clocked 9:26.4 in the eight-lapper. Both boys have gone faster this year, Jones 9.5 and Hitchcock 9:23.3. Hitchcock will go in the West Coast Relays record book since the two-mile was a new event.

Hewitt, who is only a junior, beat the old national prep mark of 25-7 set by Jerry Proctor of Muir last year. Proctor went 26-<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> while in high school, but this mark was accomplished against open competition and can't be counted as a record.

Hewitt, who won the West Coast Relays last year with his previous best, a wind-aided 24-11<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>, had 25-6<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> jump before he set the national record on his final leap. He also had two wind-aided jumps over 25 feet.

Jones, running with an aiding wind of eight miles per hour, was locked in a duel with Warren Edmonson of Oakland, another 9.5 sprinter, for the first 70 yards. But the South senior pulled away to win by two yards with Clyde Lansing of Fresno getting up for second.

Hitchcock and East sophomore Eddie Granillo dueled for the first two laps in the two-mile. Reedley freshman Harry Nicholas became Hitchcock's main competition for the next five laps, but Ricky pulled away on the last quarter for a 15-yard victory. Race favorite Robert Yslas, who has been bothered by a spine injury this year, finished third behind Nicholas.

East and South won their sections of relay races, but went unplaced in the combined standings. East ran the 440 relay in 44.0 while South's mile relay foursome, anchored by Jones, clocked 3:25.2.

Bakersfield and South, which had the best 440 relay times in the Valley, had off nights. The Rebels finished third in 42.3 while Bakersfield, running without ace James Allen, was disqualified. Merced won the race in 41.7 but was also disqualified, giving the win to Edison in 41.9.

The Blades' Henry Shipes ran his alltime best in the 120-yard high hurdles at 14.5, but it was only good enough for third behind the West Coast Relays record-equalling performance of 14.0 by Roosevelt junior Jerry Wilson.

Shafter's Larry Tuck found his 13-9<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> West Coast Relays record fall to Steve Hardison of Roosevelt and Steve Schlosser of Lemoore, both of whom cleared 14-6. Hardison was declared the winner on fewer misses while South's Tom Parry finished in a tie for fourth at 13-6.

## Prom Is Slated

The ninth annual South High School Junior-Senior Prom will be held tomorrow from 8 to 11:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria, with more than 225 couples expected to be in attendance.

Theme of the dance is "Spring Cotillion," and the occasion will also feature the crowning of the first junior-senior prom queen. Upper division advisory classes have nominated and elected the queen, a senior girl, but her name will not be revealed until the night of the dance.

Bill Burton and his orchestra will provide the music.

# HAILEY, JONES EYE HONORS AT WEST COAST RELAYS

FRESNO — Most of the headlines at the West Coast Relays are usually reserved for Saturday when the bulk of the college and open competition takes place, but some of the thunder this year could be stolen tonight in Fresno by the high school performers.

Leading the prep contingent of 845 athletes from 88 schools will be Wasco high jumper Otis Hailey, the national interscholastic recordholder at 7-1¼. This is the third highest jump by any athlete in the United States this year, topped only by a 7-3 mark by Peter Boyce of Stanford and a 7-2 leap by Ed Caruthers of the Pacific Coast Athletic Club.

Boyce, an Australian, jumped 7-3 in the same Ratcliffe Stadium pit which Hailey will be using tonight. The West Coast Relays mark of 6-8 appears sure to go with Hailey being pressed by Don Winrow (6-8) of Fremont and Heulon Hewitt (6-7) of Merced.

The premier event on the fast Ratcliffe Stadium track will be the 100-yard dash with South High's Kenny Jones facing some of his stiffest competition of the year. Jones, with a best of 9.5 this season, will be challenged by another 9.5 sprinter, Warren Edmondson of Oakland. Clyde Lansing of Fresno and Andrew Watkins of Balboa have clocked 9.6 as the four boys threaten Jim Hines' West Coast Relays prep record of 9.4.

Bakersfield and South are two of four schools under the present West Coast Relays record of 42.5 in the 440 relay. The Driller foursome has clocked 42.0 while South has done 42.1, the same as Merced.

An added high school event this year is the two mile with Robert Yslas of Madera having the best time of 9:13.7. But

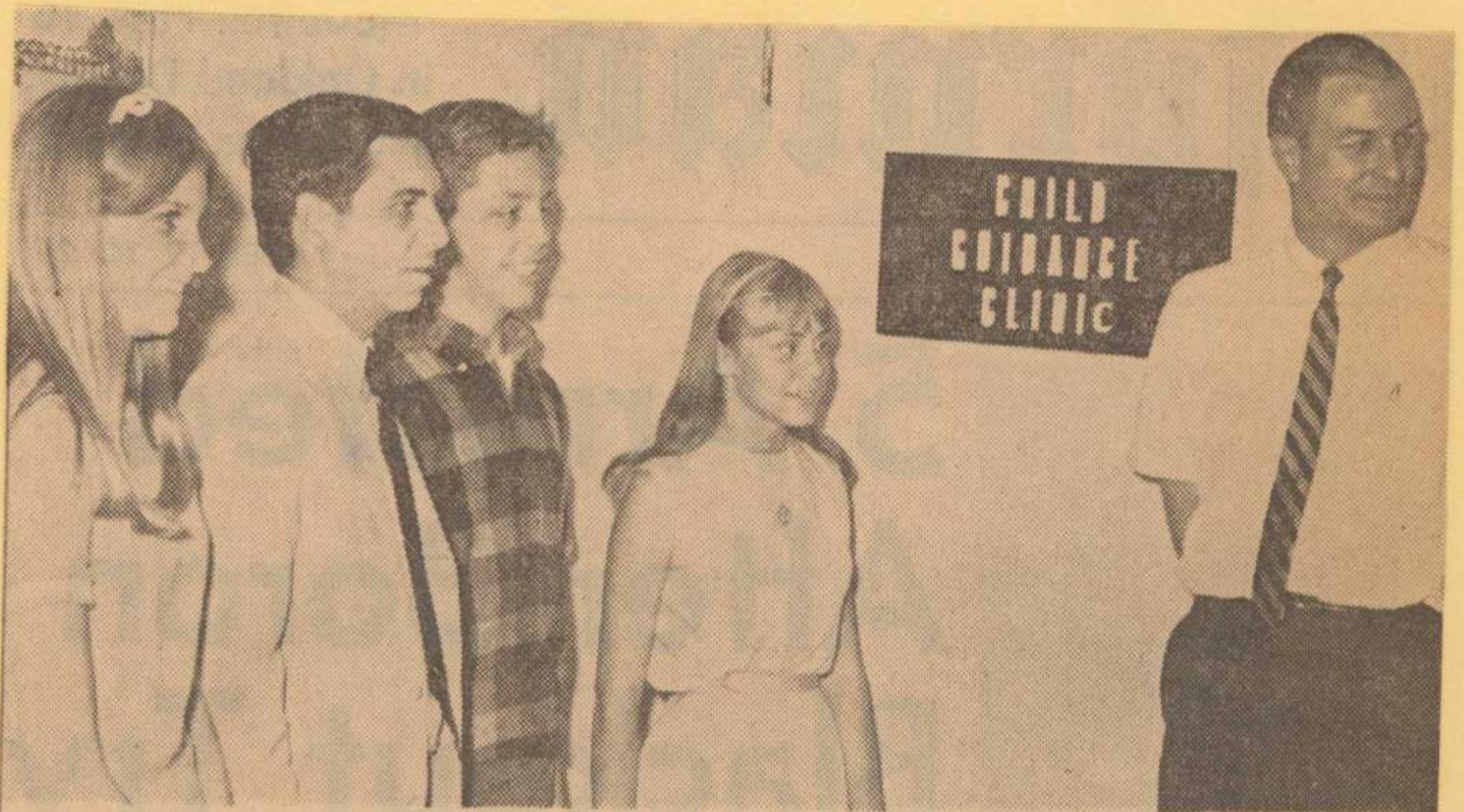
Yslas lost to Ricky Hitchcock of North in the Kern Relays and the Star senior, with a best time of 9:23.3, will be out to do it again. Arvid Cratz from Mills has toured the eight laps in 9:18.

There is a class field in the pole vault with Steve Rutherford (14-11½) of Fresno leading the way. Mike Kelley of McLane and Steve Hardison of Roosevelt are within two inches of Rutherford and there are three other boys over the 14-foot

mark. The current WCR record is only 13-9¼ by Larry Tuck of Shafter in 1966.

James Allen (23-10½) of Bakersfield will try to catch Hewitt in the long jump, the Merced junior having a wind-aided 24-10 this season. Mike Freeman of Delano has gone 23-3.

Teams entered from Kern County are North, Taft, Bakersfield, East, South, Wasco, West, Delano and Shafter.

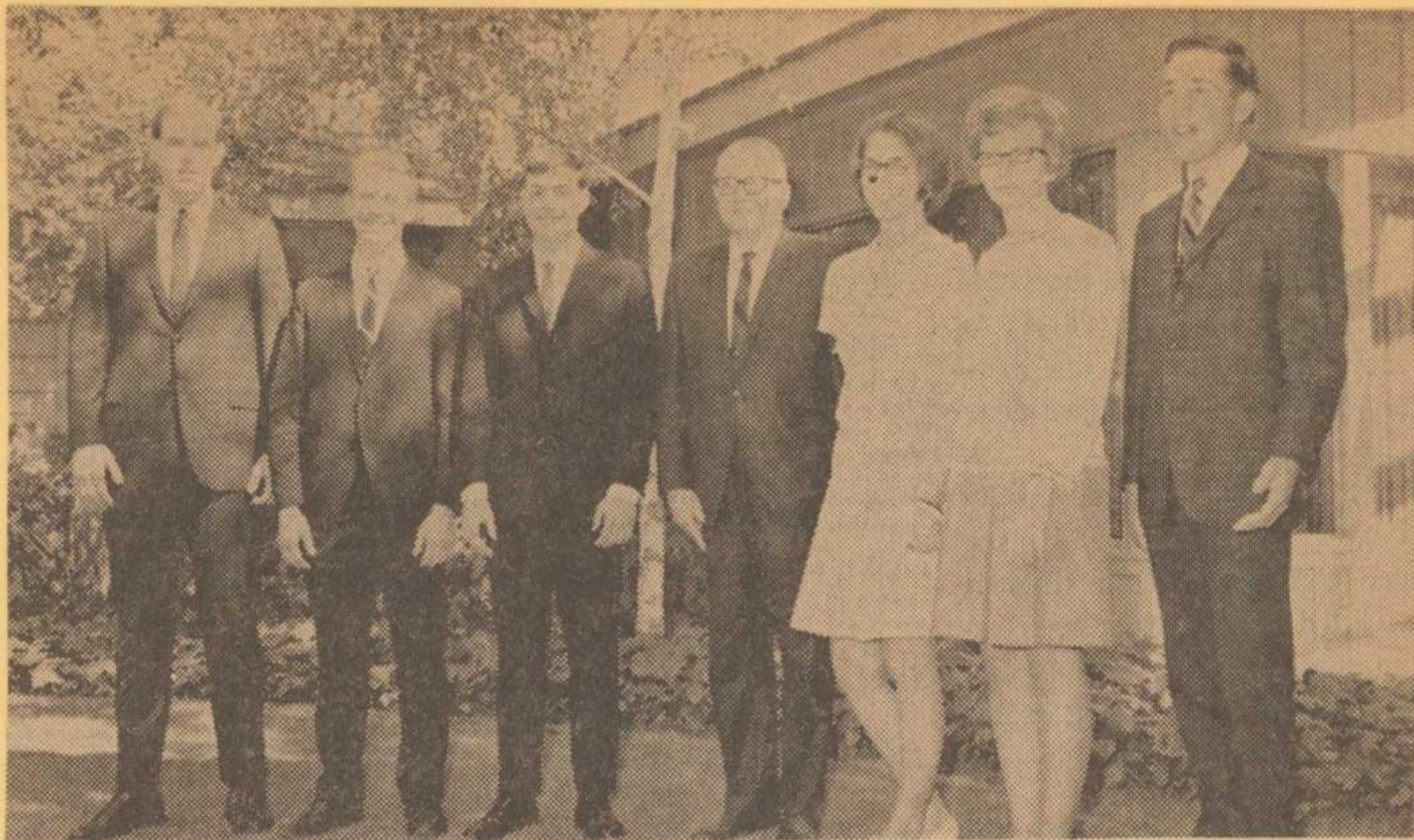

# Teacher Pay Raise Will Boost Taxes

## Board Offers 6-7 Per Cent, Sees 12-Cent Increase to Meet Cost

Kern County Union High School District's tax rate is going to increase, probably 12 cents, to finance salary and other education costs for the 1968-69 school year.

The board of trustees last night offered the district's 1,350 employees salary hikes ranging from 6 to 7 per cent that would add another \$769,000 to the payroll. The trustees meet Tuesday noon to hear replies to their offer from employee representatives.

The salary offer includes a 7 per cent across-the-board increase for about 900 teachers and a 5 per cent hike to 450 other district employees.

The salary offer falls short of what teacher and classified employee representatives have been seeking. James Fillbrandt, teacher representative, asked for an 8 per cent increase which would cost the district \$706,000. Fillbrandt said he must consult with the faculty association's negotiating committee before he can report whether the district offer is acceptable.

**The 7 per cent offer will** cost the district \$619,000. The board's offer to classified personnel will cost about \$150,000. The offer to classified personnel includes a 5 per cent across-the-board salary increase plus other adjustments in the wage scale for some of the 450 employees. Initially, classified employees sought a 10 per cent increase.

The trustees are scheduled to adopt a district budget June 27. They began consideration of tentative proposals for next year's education costs last night. The administrative budget proposal is \$15.6 million, up from the current \$14.8 million.

Trustee M. Glenn Bultman said the district will have about \$1 million in new funds to meet its expenses next year. The additional funds will come from the 12-cent tax increase and state aid.

**However, Bultman points** out that valid district needs total \$4.1 million more than the current budget and some budget items must be reduced or dropped. The setting of district salaries is the first step in preparing a budget for the board's action June 27.

The district is levying the maximum tax rate approved by voters, \$1.51 per \$100 of assessed valuation on property. It also levies another eight cents permitted by state law. The proposed additional 12 cents on the rate is also permitted by state law.

**Dr. John W. Eckhardt,** district superintendent, estimates the new tax revenue plus state aid will amount to about \$1 million. The board, proposal for next year. Eck-

he said, must decide how to allocate the money in face of district needs amounting to more than \$4 million.

The priority decisions the trustees must make are serious, Eckhardt said. He does not believe the district will fill all of its teaching positions next year.

Eckhardt said the salary problem must be settled soon to give his staff enough time to prepare a detailed budget proposal for next year. Eckhardt reminded the trustees and employees that the next scheduled board meeting is June 13.

Fillbrandt said he would have the faculty negotiating council's reply by Monday, that he could not, unilaterally accept the trustees' salary proposals.

# Jones, Hitchcock Set SYL Divisional Marks

TULARE — South High's Kenny Jones and North's Ricky Hitchcock set new Divisional records on a slow Tulare High School track Saturday as Yosemite athletes qualified for the Valley meet Friday night in Bakersfield's Memorial Stadium.

Roosevelt edged Bakersfield for team honors in the varsity division while East Bakersfield overpowered all opposition in class B behind a double by Tommy Garcia and the breaking of a 35-year-old Divisional record by sprinter Gerald Ludd. Mt. Whitney was the easy victor in class C.

The top four places in each event of all three classes qualified for the Valley, which is scheduled to begin around 6 o'clock Friday night. Yosemite athletes will join the top three from the Sequoia Divisionals and the best two from the Sierra leagues.

Jones continued his domination of the Valley sprint field, but the Tulare track and warm 90-degree weather put him over his best times this year. Yet the South senior tied the Divisional 100 record of 9.7 and broke the 220 mark around a turn with a time of 21.6. The old record was 21.9. Jones' bests this year have been 9.5 and 21.3, both set in the South Yosemite League meet on the same Memorial Stadium track he will be running on Friday night.

Hitchcock also was unable to equal his South Yosemite League mark of 9:23.3 in the two-mile, but his 9:23.5 time with no competition broke the

old Divisional record by over 10 seconds. Hitchcock finished some 100 yards ahead of Gabe Sanchez of Porterville, and Robert Yslas of Madera, who held the old Divisional mark of 9:33.7.

Jones' and Hitchcock's marks were the only new running event records set except for Bakersfield's win in the 440 relay and Edison's mile relay first place, both new events. These two relays replaced the 880 relay this year.

The Bakersfield foursome of Wilson Mackey, John Batsch, Don Hicks and James Allen was clocked in 42.4 to nip Edison and South in 42.5. Merced, which had run 41.7 this year, failed to qualify when one of its top sprinters, Charles Bennett, pulled up lame. Edison's time for the mile relay was 3:23.7.

There were two new Divisional records set in the field events. Heulon Hewitt of Merced, who also captured the high jump at 6-6½, set a new mark in the long jump at 24-5½. But this was far off his new interscholastic record set last week in the West Coast Relays of 25-10¾.

Ray Foreman of Roosevelt, the Valley record-holder in the triple jump at 48-10, managed 46-11¼ Saturday, over the old Divisional mark of 46-5¼ by Joe Ortega of Delano last year. Ortega, the former Valley record-holder at 47-2, failed to qualify with his fifth-place leap of 44-6.

Allen also qualified in three individual events for the Drillers, giving him at least some responsibility for 16 of Bakersfield's 31 points. But it was not enough to overcome the 33 markers by Roosevelt. Merced

was close behind with 29 tallies.

Allen, who performed for Tulare his first two years in high school, took seconds in the long jump and 180 low hurdles and fourth in the 100-yard dash.

Steve Rutherford of Fresno, the Valley record-holder in the pole vault at 14-11½, failed to qualify Saturday, not even placing among the top five although the winning height was only 14-0. Rutherford suffered an injury a month ago and never fully recovered.

East piled up 40 points in class B to run away from second-place Hoover with 29. Ludd, who set the Divisional Class B 220 record last year, timed 9.9 in the hundred to break a 10-flat clocking held by three athletes and first set in 1933 by Ted Fuchs of Visalia. It was the oldest record in the Divisional books.

Garcia, East's junior middle distance ace, once again edged Keith Robertson of Foothill with an excellent 880 time of 1:58.1 and then came back to take the 440 in 51.1. The East 440-relay team of Ludd, Ed Beadle, Russ Grimes and John Nichols also won.

Mike Freeman of Delano scored a double in the long and triple jumps as did Jim Vincent of Bullard in the discus and shotput. Deron Brown of Bakersfield won the 160 low hurdles.

Mt. Whitney had the easiest time of the day in class C, scoring 42 points to only 24 for second-place Roosevelt. West, which won the South Yosemite League class C crown, had a disappointing day, only managing seven points.

The Pioneers' Jim McDonnell set a new 180 record of 18.4, won the 660 and anchored Mt. Whitney's winning 440-relay combo.

Barry Moring of Mt. Whitney tied the Divisional record in the 330 at 36.0, originally set by Jones when he was a freshman at South High in 1965. Joe Molina broke the triple-jump record and also won the long jump. David Salcido of West was victorious in the 1,320 at 3:19.6.

P R O G R A M

- I. FANDANGUILLO - - F. Moreno Torroba, orchestrated by Roy Petschauer  
The Fandanguillo as a prototype is closely associated with the more familiar fandango, and is a form of Spanish folk music for guitar which dates from the 17th and 18th Centuries. It reveals its Gypsy origins by featuring a generally lively tempo in triple time with many climaxes and, often, dramatic changes of mood and tempo. Such is the case with the present work, originally written for guitar, and orchestrated by Mr. Roy Petschauer, a classical guitarist and graduate student at San Francisco State College.
- II. ADAGIO from the "SCOTCH" SYMPHONY - - - Felix Mendelssohn  
This ADAGIO by Mendelssohn forms the slow movement of the composer's "Scotch" Symphony, and remains one of his most beautiful compositions. After a short introduction, a long, lyrical melodic section featuring the strings leads to a martial middle section which rises to a grand climax for full orchestra. The French horns lead the way back to the mood of the lyrical section, and this time the whole orchestra participates in the presentation which reaches the movement's expressive highpoint before the subdued conclusion.
- III. TWO LYRIC PIECES - - - Edvard Grieg  
1. Andante semplice 2. Allegro vivace  
The Two Lyric Pieces are entitled "Peasants' Song" and "Spring Dance. Both convey a strong folk song quality. The slower first number has some of its folk song effect relieved by a chromatic section, introduced by woodwinds and followed by the French horns, but the finale, Spring Dance, retains a folk song sound throughout.
- IV. GYMNOPEDIE #3 - - - Eric Satie  
Gymnopedie is a quiet work which deals in the more subtle orchestral colors. A rather haunting melody, first played by solo flute against a pizzicato string background, forms the melodic material for the work. This melody is given various orchestral settings, and is itself presented by different soloists and sections of the orchestra during the course of the work. The solo flute player for tonight's presentation is Judy Gilbertson, the orchestra's principal flutist.
- V. CHORUS OF THE HUNTSMEN from DER FREISCHUTZ - - - C. M. von Weber  
The music of this selection from von Weber's great opera, Der Freischutz, is taken from a scene set in German's Black Forest. It depicts the exhilarative feelings which accompany the hunt and, as such, has a festive air about it. Worthy of note about midway through the piece is the call of the two unaccompanied French horns, as it is the French horn which is most closely related to the forest and the hunt in 18th and 19th Century European music. It serves that connotative function here.
- \* \* \* \* \* INTERMISSION \* \* \* \* \*
- VI. DIALOGUE FOR PIANO AND ORCHESTRA (Nina Rojas, solo pianist) - - - Daniel Walter  
Dialogue for Piano and Orchestra, though a contemporary work, owes a great deal to the 19th Century Romantic school of music. It is both lyrical and powerful in expression, and the piano solo has the strong contrasts of dynamics and the full sonorities which characterize the piano music of Brahms and Liszt. As the title implies, there is much musical back and forth between the solo instrument and the orchestra in the work.
- VII. MORE - - Riz Ortolani and Nino Oliviero arranged by Philip Gordon (William Talluto, student conductor)  
The beautiful and vaguely sad theme song from the motion picture, Mondo Cane, is here the subject of a concert arrangement. The number is in two sections, in the keys of G Major and C Major respectively, each section with its own brass soloist, Dale Bystrom, trumpet, in the first section and Jim Reynolds, trombone, in the second. It is interesting to notice the interplay in the music between the soloists and various parts of the rest of the orchestral ensemble in the selection.
- VIII. HIGHLIGHTS from HELLO, DOLLY! - - - Jerry Herman arranged by F. Muller  
Tunes from the Broadway musical HELLO, DOLLY! arranged into a concert medley, form the finale piece for the evening. The theme song ends the medley. The orchestra treatment of the song, along with the infusion of jazz rhythms, makes for a rousing conclusion to the arrangement.

About the Soloist . . . . The piano soloist for DIALOGUE for PIANO AND ORCHESTRA is Nina Rojas. Miss Rojas is 15 years old, and a freshman at South High School. She is a piano student of Carol Rodgers, and has been studying piano for 6 and a half years. In addition to her proficiency at the piano, she is a talented performer on the violin and is a regular violinist in the Orchestra.

# Six Valley Crowns Garnered by Kern High School Teams

With only the state meet remaining for a handful of trackmen, Kern County schools fared quite well on the Central Section athletic scene this year.

Starting with football, Bakersfield High won the Yosemite Divisional championship as the Drillers went through the season with only a tie against Foothill to mar their record. Arvin was runnerup in the Sequoia Division, losing to Chowchilla by a touchdown in the finals.

In cross-country, Jim Wren's West High squad breezed to the Valley championship while North's Rick Hitchcock was runnerup in the individual race to Robert Yslas of Madera.

A clean sweep was made of the two winter sports as Bakersfield High set a record point total in routing the rest of the valley in wrestling while East Bakersfield won its second straight Valley basketball title with a hard-earned overtime win over Reedley to extend the Blades' undefeated streak to 45 games in a row.

Bakersfield made it three Valley champions this year as the Drillers took all honors on the tennis scene for the third straight season.

North High took its first Valley swimming title while the Stars were runnerup in golf and John Echols was low medalist. Bakersfield finished second in the Yosemite Division baseball race while Taft placed second in the Sequoia Division, giving Kern schools six of the possible 11 varsity championships.

\* \* \*

While it would take a remarkable effort against the stiffest prep track competition in the United States, Kern athletes have a shot at winning five events in the state meet Friday and Saturday in Berkeley.

South High 100 and 220 man Kenny Jones, Wasco high jumper Otis Hailey, North two-miler Hitchcock and either South's or Bakersfield's 440-relay team have good shots at titles.

Jones and Hailey appear to have the best chances. The Rebel senior has run as fast as anybody in the state this year with his 9.5 100, but he looks even stronger in the 220 with his time of 21.3.

Jones hasn't been pressed at all in the furlong this year and appears fully capable of doing 21-flat or even lower with the competition he is surely to receive in the state meet.

If Hailey is having one of his "on" days, he will be awfully hard to top in the high jump where he holds the national record of 7-1¼. But a pair of Compton High jumpers, defending state champion Reynaldo Brown (7½) and Pat Bradford (6-11¼) are consistent at these heights and will make Hailey work for the gold medal.

Hitchcock is another boy who hasn't been running with much competition this year, making his 9:21.0 best deceptive. The competition will be there in Berkeley this weekend as there are five or six boys between 9:00 and 9:10.

Centennial (41.3) and Edison of Fresno (41.5) will be favored in the 440-relay, but this event is one where one mistake can mean the difference between victory and defeat with the baton changing hands three times while runners are going full speed. South (41.8) or Bakersfield (42.0) could slip in front if this should happen.

Central Section athletes have good chances for other first place spots besides the ones just mentioned. The surest bet would be Heulon Hewitt of Merced in the long jump with his national record of 25-10¾. He is consistent in the 24-6 to 25-foot range.

Jerry Wilson of Roosevelt (14.0) in the 120 high hurdles, Steve Hardison of Roosevelt (14-11) in the pole vault and Steve McNaughton of McLane (176-10½) in the discus are other possibilities.

\* \* \*

North athletic director Dusty Rhoads was a busy man last week as his school hosted both the Valley golf and track finals.

Dusty and his gang are to be congratulated for a smooth-running track event with everything coming off as scheduled except for—you guessed it—the pole vault.

Dusty thought he had the pole vault problem solved when he raised the opening height to 12 feet and moved up nine inches on the first two jumps. But no soap. The class B vault in the same pit ran late and the varsity jumping didn't end till nearly an hour after the rest of the events.

So the pole vault's unbeaten record continues.

There has been some talk among the Central Section athletic brass of changing the qualifying format of the Valley finals from Divisionals to sections, the system used for wrestling.

Something should be done. As things now stand, the top four from the Yosemite, three from the Sequoia and two from the Sierra qualify for the Valley finals. The Sierra can't stack up with the other two Divisionals, and as a result there are two individuals in each event who really shouldn't be in the Valley finals.

Taking the 120 high hurdles as an example, the seven Yosemite and Sequoia Division qualifiers were timed in the 14-second bracket while the leading Sierra runner had a time of 16.8 and the second boy was clocked in 17.1.

If the Divisionals were divided into three sections like wrestling, there would be a much better chance of making the times more even. As it is now, a boy can run a 14.9 in the Yosemite Divisionals and not qualify while someone else can run 17 seconds and make the field in the Sierra Division. The system isn't really too democratic.

Two defensive standouts on the Bakersfield Californian's all-city football team have cast their lot with Pacific-8 schools.

Jeff Siemon, the 210-pound linebacker from Bakersfield High who was all-city lineman of the year, is headed for Stanford, the Indians winning out over UCLA. Siemon will play in the North-South Shrine game in Los Angeles this summer.

USC grabbed 200-pound defensive end John Skiles of North High. Both boys are excellent students as well as football players.

## Rebel Bowlers Edge Trojans

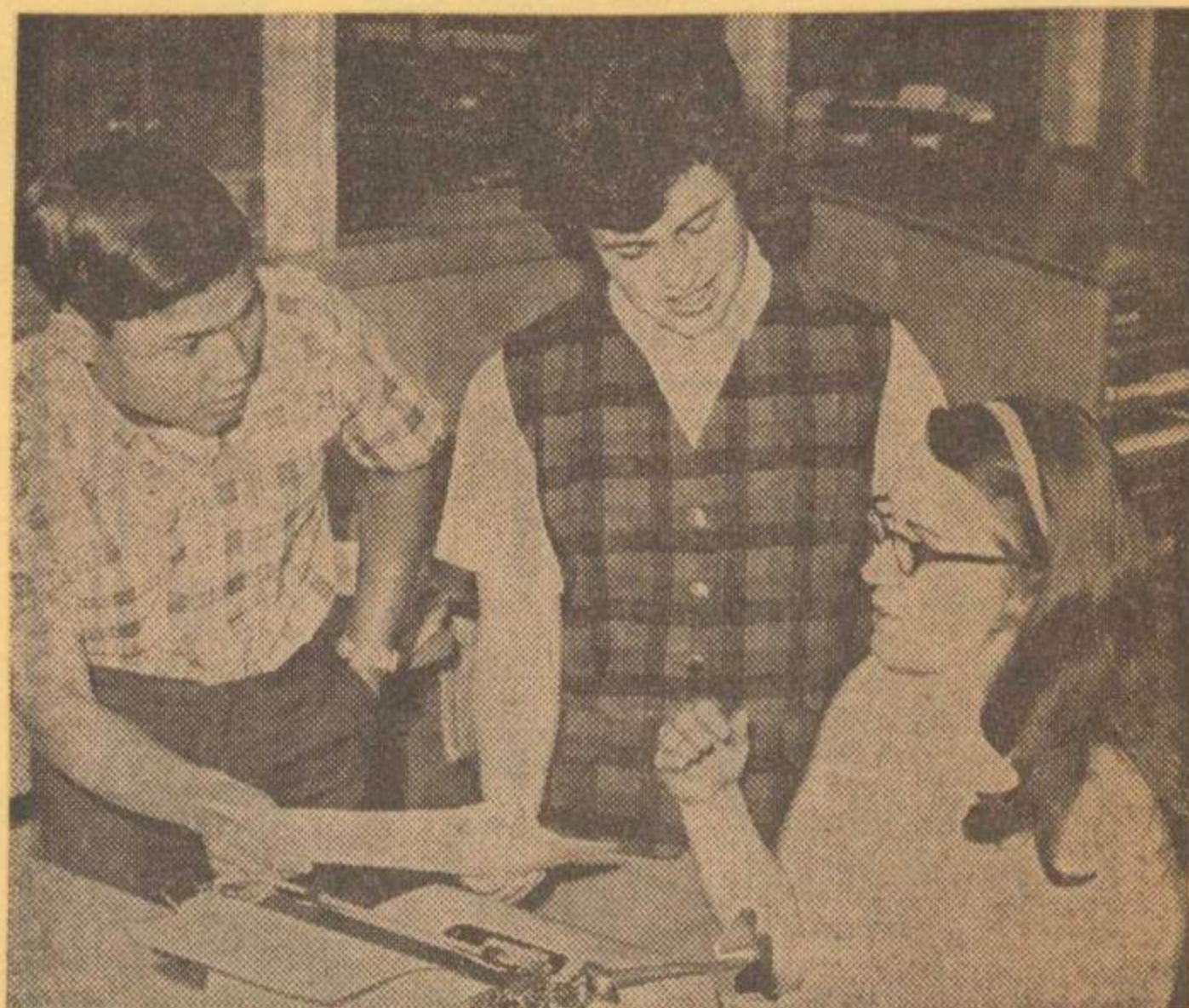

Four familiar faces grace the 1968 all-South Yosemite League baseball team as the coaches voted Ed and Steve Ontiveros of Bakersfield, Dave Ginn of the Drillers and Bob Rader of South to the 11-man squad for the second straight year.

The coaches named two pitchers, a catcher, four infielders, three outfielders and a utilityman to the squad.

The only unanimous choices among the six coaches were pitcher Ed Ontiveros, who was 8-0 in league play with 101 strikeouts in 71 innings, and outfielder Brian Nelson of North, who led the league in hitting with a .434 average.

The other pitcher besides Ontiveros is North righthander Bill Thomas. Ginn is the catcher with Harry Seeger of East and Ted Preston of Bakersfield joining Rader and Steve Ontiveros in the infield.

The outfielders along with Nelson are Steve Steiber of West and Theron Brown of Bakersfield. Bob Crissman of North was selected as the utilityman.

Like last year, league champion Bakersfield led the selections with five while North had three and South, East and West one apiece. Thomas, Steiber and Steve Ontiveros are

the only juniors on the squad.

East High, which was runnerup to Bakersfield in the league, heads the second team with four players. They are pitcher Bob Ponte, infielders Larry Hill and Randy Hamm and outfielder Ron Smith.

They are joined by catcher Bob Sherrill of North, pitcher Harvey Ivey of Foothill, infielders Louie Diaz of Bakersfield, Tim Mazza of North and Eugene Walker of South and outfielders John Duran of Foothill, Matt Herndon of North and Ron Miller of Foothill. Mark Hance of South, the only sophomore on both squads, is the utilityman.

Sherrill was first-team outfielder last year while Duran made the top unit two seasons

ago. Diaz, who is a junior, was a second-team member in 1967. Hamm, Ponte and Mazza are the other juniors on the club.

A rundown on first-team members:

**BOB RADER (SOUTH)** — 5-9, 155 Sr. Joins older brother Dave as two-year all-leaguer. A natural second baseman, but also caught, played third and pitched to earn Rebels' most valuable award. Hit .333 in league play with 17 singles and double. Only struck out four times. Headed for Bakersfield College.

**STEVE STEIBER (WEST)** — 5-9, 165 Jr. Lefthander who finished second in league hitting race at .417 and .407 overall. Didn't strike out in league play and only twice all season in 60 at bats. Also top West pitcher when not playing right field with 1-4 record and 2.42 ERA. "Best fundamental hitter I've had in seven years of coaching," says coach

Fred Lanningham. Second in league doubles with six.

**HARRY SEEGER (EAST)** — 5-9, 150 Sr. Good power for size with three home runs and 18 RBI's. Quick hands and strong forearms give him his power according to coach Walt Napier. Batted .288 in league after leading team last year with .352 average. Worked on defense and made only two errors in SYL. Streak hitter who drove in eight runs in game against South.

**BILL THOMAS (NORTH)** — 6-2, 170 Jr. Led league in ERA at 1.61. 6-1 record with 52 strike outs and 28 walks in 67 innings. Gave up 12 earned runs. Good fastball and control. Took up slack when 1967 all-league pitcher Steve Fahsbender was hurt. Played first, third and outfield when not pitching with a .360 average and five doubles.

**BRIAN NELSON (NORTH)** — 6-3, 190 Sr. Top hitter in league with .434 average. Led or tied for team lead in five categories. On base average was .600, drove in 15 runs, hit two homers, five doubles and 23 total hits good for 41 bases. Good strong arm and covers a lot of ground. On varsity as a sophomore but didn't play last year.

**BOB CRISSMAN (NORTH)** — 5-10, 165 Sr. Ideal utility man as he pitched, caught, played second, third and the outfield. Hit .327 in league with 12 RBI's and led team in stolen bases. Has speed to make excellent outfielder and hands and arm for a third baseman. All the tools to be pro prospect says coach Sam

Barton. Used knuckle ball to compile 2-4 mound record with 40 strikeouts in 42 innings.

**DAVE GINN (BAKERSFIELD)** — 6-2, 205 Sr. Tied for league lead in RBI's with 20. Hit .313 in league. Shares school RBI record with 44. Defensively, strong and accurate-armed catcher which discouraged steals. Excellent speed for size with six stolen bases. "As strong a hitter as we had," according to coach Nick Graham. Would like to be a pro player.

**TED PRESTON (BAKERSFIELD)** — 6-1, 205 Sr. Set school stolen base record of 24. Voted most inspirational player. Real hustler who even ran three-quarter speed on walks. "Probably most aggressive player on team," says Graham. Three home runs in league and only made one error at first base when pulled off base and into runner.

**ED ONTIVEROS (BAKERSFIELD)** — 6-3, 203 Sr. Voted most valuable player on team. 8-0 in league play and 11-3 overall. Compiled 27-4 career record. Struck out 152 this year after setting school record of 173 last year. Hit .333 in league play. School marks set last year include lowest ERA, 1.72; most wins, 13, and best percentage, 13-1. Hopes to play pro ball.

**STEVE ONTIVEROS (BAKERSFIELD)** — 5-11, 165 Jr. Two-time all-leaguer although only a junior. Led league last year with .410 average. Hit .346 this year, coming on strong in last four or five games. Always gets good wood on the ball from both sides of the plate. Top-notch defensive player and real good attitude. Graham rates him Bakersfield's best all-around player.

**TERON BROWN (BAKERSFIELD)** — 5-11, 172 Sr. All-league in three sports this year. Tied for team homer lead with three and second in stolen bases with 13. Good leadoff man with speed, eye at the plate and ability to get on base. Doesn't try to overpower the ball. Covers a lot of ground in centerfield and has strong arm. Hit .279 in league play.
