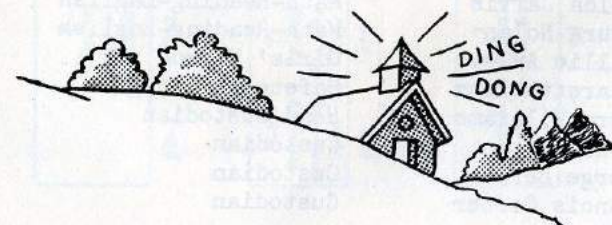


TO ALL STUDENTS NEW TO OUR SCHOOL

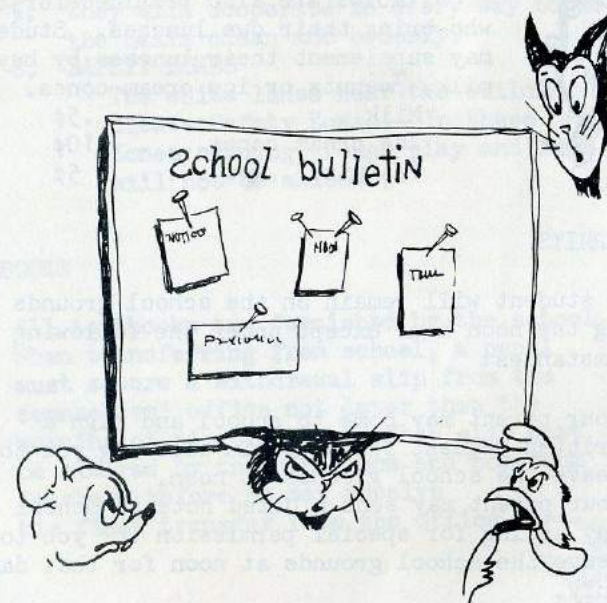

GENERAL INFORMATION

ATTENDANCE RULES

1. When absent, a pupil must bring a written excuse from home, in order to secure an admittance slip. (Exception: Parent or guardian may telephone excuse before pupil returns.)
2. When tardy, a pupil must secure an admittance slip from the attendance office. According to California State Law, repeated tardiness constitutes truancy and will be referred immediately.



CAFETERIA

In the school cafeteria students may buy well-balanced lunches for 30¢.



Tables are also provided for those who bring their own lunches. Students may supplement their lunches by buying milk, peanuts or ice cream cones.

NOON PERMITS

Every student will remain on the school grounds during the noon hour except under the following circumstances:

1. Your parent may come to school and sign a written request for a permit allowing you to leave the school grounds at noon.
2. Your parent may send a dated note to school any day asking for special permission for you to leave the school grounds at noon for that day only.

LOOK!

CORRIDOR RULES

Good citizens at Golden State will cooperate in observing the following rules:

1. They will walk on the right side of each corridor.
2. They will walk singly or in "pairs" rather than in groups.
3. They will not stop to talk to friends in the line of traffic.
4. They will at all times observe the common rules of courtesy to others.
5. They will cooperate in every way to keep the halls clean and orderly.
6. SAFETY ZONES

The white lines near the building indicate Safety Zones. In these Safety Zones running, rough play and loud noise will not be allowed.

TEXTBOOKS

All textbooks are furnished by the school. When transferring from school, a pupil must secure a withdrawal slip from the counselors' office not later than the morning of his transfer. This slip must be cleared by the classroom and homeroom teachers before he may receive his final transfer from the office.



MORE THINGS TO REMEMBER

AFTER-SCHOOL PLAYGROUND



After-school playground is open each day from 3:15 to 4:15. All students should use play equipment properly, keeping the safety of themselves and others in mind at all times. School equipment only may be used on the playground.

BEFORE SCHOOL

Students are requested to not to come to school before 8:00 A.M. During cold winter days the dining room is opened at 8 o'clock, so that students can come in out of the cold.

BICYCLES

Bicycles must not be ridden on the school grounds or sidewalks. All bicycles must be placed in the bike racks.



CHEWING GUM

Chewing gum, sunflower seeds, cinnamon sticks, sugar cane and other chewable "goop" are forbidden at school.

TELEPHONE

Pupils should not be called from classes to answer the telephone. Messages may be delivered to the pupil and he may make a return call at recess.

A series of short bells is the signal for the fire alarm, at which time all classrooms are to be vacated promptly. Students will walk double file with no talking to a safe distance from the building on the west playground.

FIRE DRILLS

PHYSICAL EDUCATION EXCUSES

All students are required by State Law to take physical education. A student may be excused from physical education only under the following conditions:



1. A written excuse from his doctor stating the length of time that he is to be excused.
2. (For a few days only) a written excuse from his parent or guardian.

Note: Every excuse must be approved and signed by your counselor before it is presented to the physical education teacher. This shall be done before school or during recess. (Not at class time.)

LOST AND FOUND

A lost and found department is maintained in the counselors' office. If finders will deliver found articles there, the losers may have the opportunity for recovering them.

If the lost article is not claimed within two weeks, the finder may claim the article.



THINGS TO REMEMBER (CON'D)

HOMEROOMS

Every student is assigned to a homeroom upon entering school. Students report to the homeroom at 8:30 in the morning. Attendance is taken and announcements are made by the homeroom teacher. The sixth period every Wednesday is set aside for a homeroom meeting, conducted by officers elected in the homeroom. This period is used primarily for discussion of classroom and school affairs. The homeroom teacher reads and discusses the weekly Homeroom Bulletin.



Students will stay out of the parking lot at all times.

NURSE

The nurse comes to school one day each week. Students with any health problems should ask their homeroom teachers to make out "Nurse Referral Slips" and put them in the nurse's box.

Students who have had an accident at school should report it immediately to the teacher on duty.



MORE THINGS TO REMEMBER

RECESS

Recess is not a play period. It is intended as a relief period. No play equipment is checked out at this time.

STRANGERS

Pupils should refuse all rides to and from school with unauthorized persons or strangers. They should report to the office any such persons offering rides or loitering near the school.

The student council discusses and submits to the classes suggestions and recommendations pertaining to the interest of the school.

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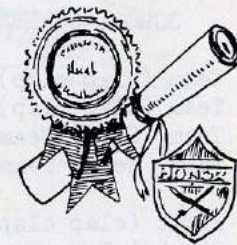
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AWARDS
