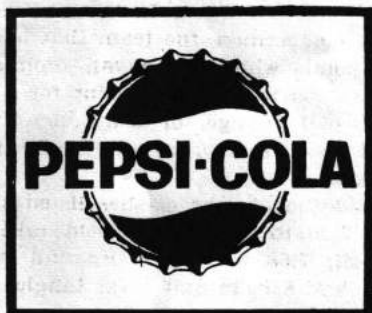
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Four Seniors and One Sophomore Comprise List of Prospective Queens

Memorial Stadium Site for Tonight's Annual Grid Carnival Pageantry

Football gets off to a regal start this evening when all six public high schools in the city meet at 7:30 in Memorial Stadium for the fourth annual Football Carnival.

Beginning with the massed bands and drill teams on the field, the carnival will blend music, pageantry, and sport.

During the halftime the respective queen of each school will be escorted to the field, where a representative of her own school will present her with flowers and a bracelet commemorating the event. Johnny Rebel, sometimes known as Terry Heflin, will do the honors for South High.

A cash prize is offered to the school with the highest per cent of their student body members buying tickets to the carnival. South High traditionally is the recipient of said award, so all students who haven't yet bought their tickets should make a point of doing so during their lunch hour.

According to Miss Jeannine Thompson, South dean of girls, a yell contest between the schools will be held sometime during the evening—so all loud-mouths (or anyone with a voice) are especially urged to be there.

As for the athletic aspect of the carnival, each school will play two 15-minute games, with the school with the highest number of points at the end of the evening being in first place.

Flash! Forthcoming 4th Football Carnival Clash

Soon after the pageantry of the massed bands, the arrival of the queens, and welcome by Superintendent of Schools Theron L. McCuen, will come the kick-off of the 4th annual Football Carnival.

This year the carnival will be split into two divisions, one including the Drillers, the Trojans, and the Vikings. The other includes the South High Rebels, North High Stars and East High Blades.

The first division will play from 7:30 to 8:15, at which time the queens will be presented. At 9:03 South takes on North and at 9:30 Shafter hosts East. At the end of the competition, the team that has the most points wins the carnival. Points are awarded as follows: one point for a first down, ball change, or conversion; three points for a safety, and six points for a touchdown.

In addition to the clashes listed above, from 7:30 to 7:55 Bakersfield takes on Foothill; 7:58 to 8:23 is Foothill versus West; and 8:26 to 8:51 West tangles with Bakersfield.

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Miss Motte Flew South for the Long Hot Summer

The trip included visits to the important cities of most of the countries in South America. In Argentina, at Buenos Aires, a local school holiday had been declared and people from the country had flocked to the capital to see the museums and other points of interest. Consequently, Miss Motte said it was quite hard to tour much of the city.

The highlight of the trip was in Peru, where they inspected the Inca ruins. There was not much to see of Incan implements, since it is believed the Incans fled willfully with their possessions, but the ruins were still exotic enough to be impressive.

Perhaps the greatest adventure of the

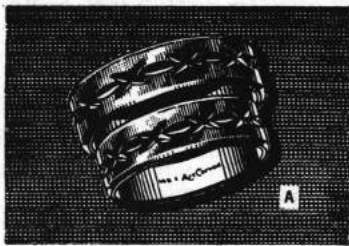

Miss Motte also took a cruise to an island situated in the Bay of Rio de Janeiro, are the main transportation.

The ladies also visited Uruguay, Colombia and Mexico. In Mexico they visited the Aztec and Mayan ruins, which include ancient pyramids from the former civilization.

The trip lasted two months, and during the time the most common adventure became the winter cold. While it is summer here, it is winter there, and few buildings were heated.

Miss Motte became the group's official linguist in speaking Spanish, and was quite fluent, since she taught it at South High for three years before becoming South's librarian.



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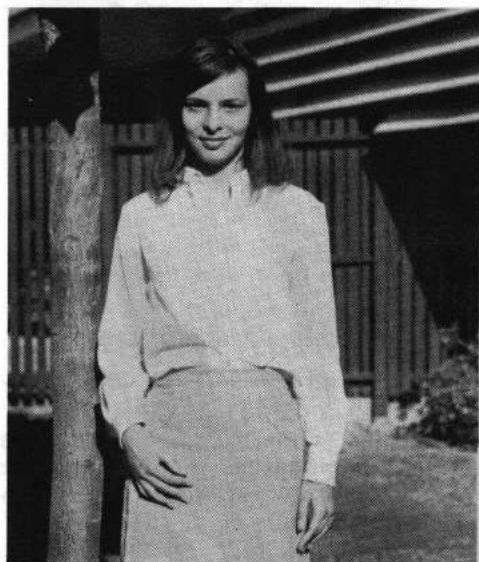
SOUTH WELCOMES VISITORS FROM OTHER LANDS

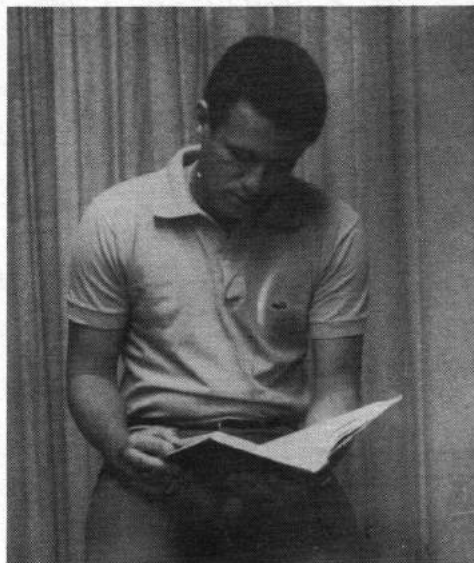


Carola Buddenberg adjusts to American school life.

For fun in Bremen, dancing is popular. Whereas football is our big sport now, soccer is the thing over there. Carola, herself, enjoys horse-back riding.

Carola says her biggest problem, so far, has been the language barrier, although it certainly isn't evident because she speaks perfect English. She's looking forward to talking to someone who speaks German.

Paulo Mesquita de Sousa

Even though South High does not have a foreign exchange program, the student body includes a new Brazilian student, Paulo Mesquita de Sousa. Paulo has been in the United States only a few weeks and is attending South as a junior. He was raised in Fortaleza, a city in northeast Brazil.

His father, a retired pilot of a Brazilian airlines, is engaged in the exporting of cashew nuts and vegetable oils to the United States. His mother is a former Portuguese teacher.

Paulo has two brothers, Joao (John), is a sophomore in high school. Paulo's older brother, Pedro, has studied at Bakersfield College and is now the Brazilian delegate to the Inter-American Center of Tax Administrators in Washington, D.C.

During the summer of 1963 Paulo traveled throughout Europe, and since then he has hoped to have the chance of living in a foreign country. After the completion of high school, he hopes to attend college and major in philosophy and administration.

While attending South, Paulo is living with Senior Scott Johnson and his family. Next September he will return to Brazil.

Paulo's native tongue is Portuguese, though he speaks some French. When he arrived in the United States, he spoke no English. Now he can speak it fairly well. He said he expects to have a hard time understanding his teachers the first two months, but after that he feels it will be easier.

Paulo learned a lot about the United States in magazines. He said that before he arrived here, he thought the U.S. was a good country. Now he knows it is wonderful and more beautiful than he thought it would be. The people are very friendly to foreign students and Paulo enjoys it here.

Paulo was impressed by many things here. He feels that the streets are very clean and well organized. He also thinks that Americans have a very good system of learning. When asked about the style of clothing in Brazil, Paulo commented that miniskirts were much shorter in Brazil, but the girls aren't permitted to wear them to school.

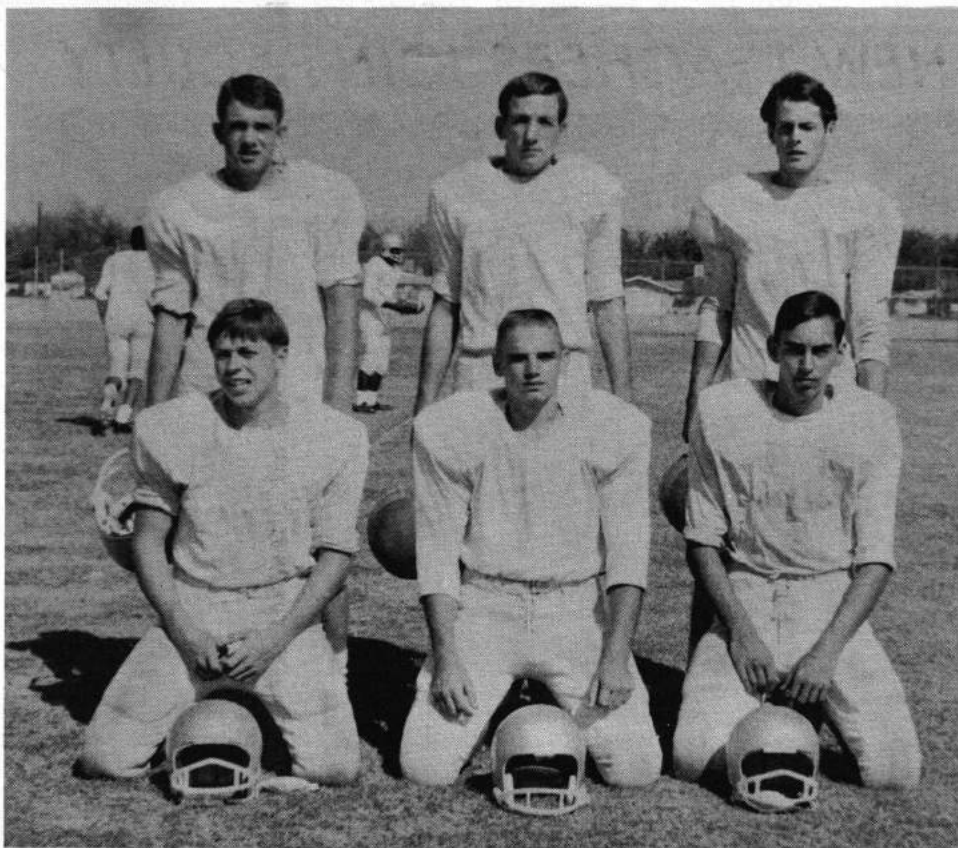

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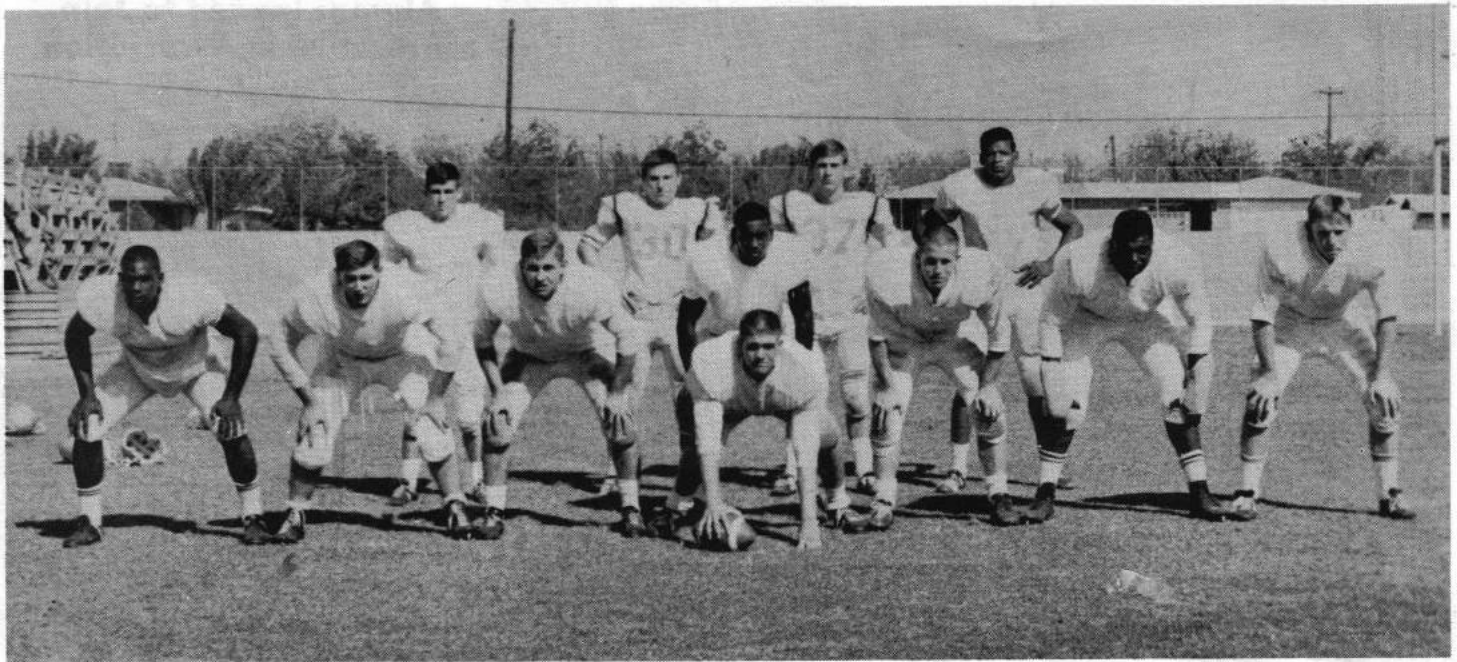

Lafond Not As Gleeful As In Past Football Seasons

South High's football fortunes don't look as rosy as they have in past seasons, says coach Mr. Larry Lafond. The reason Mr. Lafond's not dancing with joy is the loss of many first-string players from last season. He emphasized the result of the loss by saying that this was the least experienced team South has homed in the past few years, despite the fact that 11 lettermen are returning.

Contributing, too, to South's pains is the light, inexperienced line, with only one player being 200 pounds or over.

Candidates for quarterback are Brent McClannahan, defensive letterman last year, and Jim Reynolds, former junior varsity player. Prior to press time Coach Lafond was uncertain as to which of the two would start in carnival action tonight.

How does the defensive line stack up? With the emphasis in training being put on the offense, the defensive lines' capabilities still remain uncertain.

Coach Lafond, in his eleventh year as a football coach here at South, acknowledges that this year's team is not as physically capable of standing up to competition as was last year's team. Excepting considerable competition from all opponents this year, Mr. Lafond recognizes the need for hard work on the part of

the team to put forth a good Rebel effort.

Tonight at the Canival, South will clash with North and East High.

Following is the regular 1967 football schedule: September 22, South at Porterville; September 29, Hanford at South; October 6, South at Delano; October 13, South at Arvin; October 20, North High at Memorial Stadium; October 27, Foothill at South; November 3, West at South; November 10, Bakersfield High at Memorial Stadium; November 17, East at South.

Starting times are 6 p.m. for B games and 8 p.m. for varsity games.

Last year, South ended its season with a 5-4 overall record. Particularly notable was South's victory over the South Yosemite League champions, the North High Stars, 19-6. Another highlight of the season was the smashing of the powerful Manual Arts team from Los Angeles.

However, the coach said that his team was showing a great deal of aggressiveness and spirit, equal to that of any team with which he has previously been associated.

C Class Gridders Numerous, May Show Promise

If the number of candidates for the C-class football team has anything to do with it, the Riders should be off to another great season. According to Coach Clete Harper, a total of 65 C-class gridgers had already acquired their gear as of last week. Nonetheless, there is still plenty of room on the team for late arrivals.

For a C team, there's an unusually large number of returnees this year. They are Anthony Nunis, Eddy Rivera, Don Battowski, Mark Hall, Ernie Lozano, Jess Orozco, Keith Miller, John Van Pelt, Scott Mason, Larry Algra, Randy Bradshaw, Daryl Hunt, and Norman Fair. Coach Harper said there are also several gridgers who shine: specifically, Robert Foster, David Golardo, Bruce Algra, Steve Blado, and Jim Patrick.

What will make or break the team, said Coach Harper, is whether or not each member actually tries hard enough. There is good potential, but it needs working.

Since the team is made up primarily of frosh and sophomores, it is hoped that especially underclassmen will make a real effort to support them at their Friday afternoon and Saturday morning games. Their schedule is as follows:
