








#### One Problem

One small problem with this year's Sound-off has been finances. Since the Sound-off has absolutely no connection with the PTA, finances must be completely covered by senior-par-ent donations and ticket sales. As of press time, only 70 of 300 odd seniors' parents had made their contribution, leaving the fund about \$500 short of the needed monies. A word of warning: The Sound-off can only be as good as finances allow. So seniors could encourage their parents to do their share. Contributions may be directed to the finance office, in the name of the Sound-off.

One other word of warning: graduates will not be admitted into the Sound-off after 11 p.m. Likewise, once one leaves the auditorium, he cannot be re-admitted. For those who care to stay till the end, the Sound-off will not be officially over till 4 a.m. Friday morning.


Awarded Reserve State Scholarships to be used at a later date are Patti Keller, Jana Followwill, and Alan Arao.


