Recently the seventh graders have been in a geometry section. students tried to see how many lines they got by three or more points no three of which are collinear. Many of them spent as much as two nights. The record was 1770 lines drawn from 60 points. by Brian Schnabel. Also Jim O!Leary and Pat Gorman each independently found a formula that will give the number of lines determined by three or more points no three of which are collinear.


