Anxious to return to America, his family, and school, nevertheless, Bill finds it difficult to leave behind his ocean-side home, his South African family, and the wonderful experiences which they shared this past year.

The main purpose of the

workshop was to show and demonstrate newly developed electrical appliances and to give the girls a chance to use them in preparing an actual meal.

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Matmen Win First Three; Are Held at Bay by Rockets

The varsity wrestling team has been fairly successful this season. As of last Thursday, their record stood at three wins and one loss.

In SWC competition they had won two and lost one. Having one of the best teams ever at RRHS, there is still a good chance for the SWC Championship.

The grapplers started off their season with a smashing victory at Westlake, on Dec. 11. The score was 44-5. Westlake's five points were because of a forfeit due to an injury.

Dec. 17, an all senior squad journeyed to Berea. They came home with an impressive 25-14 victory. It was the first time a River wrestling team had ever beaten Berea.

An annual event for the Rocky River wrestling team is the Lakewood Quadrangular Meet. Held each year at Lakewood, it provides competition for Rocky River, Bowling Green, John Marshall, and Lakewood High School varsity wrestlers.

This year it was held Dec. 19 and John Marshall, who took first place, had an exceptionally strong squad. However, River's matmen made a fine showing and came in second.

Seniors, Gary Carlisle in the 138-pound class, Jeff Stark in the 175-pound class, and Dave Kergaard in the

heavyweight class, all won first place trophies. For Jeff and Dave it was the second year in a row to come in first place.

Dec. 22, River met Avon Lake at RRHS for a conference meet. Again, the River grapplers scored a landslide victory. This time the score was 39-8.

However, as the new year came River's luck seemed to leave. On Jan. 8, River's squad, weakened by sickness and injury, met Bay. The outcome of this conference match was quite different than the previous two. Bay won 25-12.

Seniors, Gary Carlisle, Jim Laveglia, Jeff Stark, and Dave Kergaard are undefeated so far this season in dual meets.

Coach Clyde Simpson commented on the season so far, "We've had some very exciting matches this year. We have appreciated the fine support given to us so far."

This Friday at 7:30, the River matmen will be at home for a very important conference match against Medina. At 7:30 on Saturday, the grapplers will meet Strongsville at Strongsville. Jan. 29 at 7:30, North Olmsted will bring its strong team to River for a meet that could very possibly determine the SWC Championship.

Varsity Cagers Fell Medina 63-59, Lose to N. Olmsted, Fairview, Bay

Rocky River played its best game of the season with Bay, according to Mr. Don Nichols, coach of the squad. "In the Bay game the effort was very good," commented the coach. "With a couple of breaks we could have won."

The Pirates led Bay 30-27 just before the half. At the half Bay gained the razor thin edge of 31-30 but soon lengthened its lead with nine points in the first five minutes of the second half of play. The Rockets tallied 65 points to River's 51. Craig Smith had the high total for River with 14 points.

On Dec. 11 Medina fell to the Pirates 63-59. Scott Gilchrist led the scoring with 14. The following night saw an en-

thusiastic River squad dump Midpark 75-57. Smith kept things lively by scoring 24 points.

North Olmsted and Fairview stopped the Pirate drive in the next two games. North Olmsted topped River 57-49 while Fairview managed to find 88 points to River's 65. Gilchrist scored 19 points in both games.

Art Collins contributed to River's victory over Avon Lake with 22 points.

Before the Olmsted Falls game Coach Nichols had said that the Bulldogs would be difficult to handle on their floor. As to the Westlake game, he remarked that the Demons had injury problems and were in a slump but were still dangerous.



SENIOR, DAVE KERGAARD, IS PLAIN DEALER WRESTLER OF THE WEEK. Dave was chosen the Wrestler of the Week on Dec. 31, 1964. His picture plus a writeup describing his matches appeared in the Plain Dealer that day.

Dave's exceptionally fast pinning times were cited in this report. At the River vs. Westlake meet, Dave pinned Tom Lloyd in 30 seconds. He dropped David Calvin of Berea in 40 seconds and at Avon Lake Bill Galler counted the lights after only three minutes 30 seconds.
