Council To Lose 12A Members

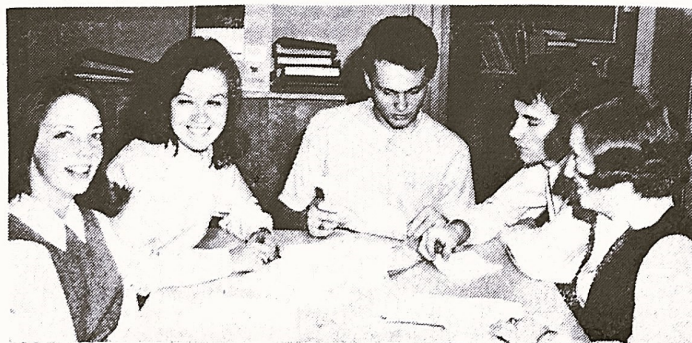
The January Class of 1968 might be small, but they've made sure they were well represented and had a voice in student government.

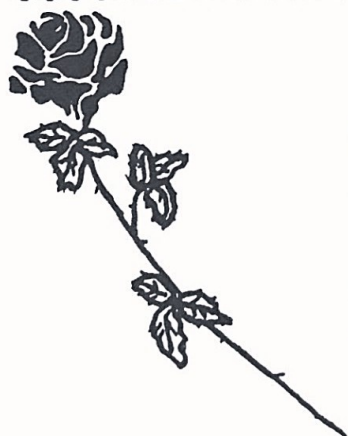

By the following spring, the then 12B's sponsored "Spring Into Summer." After WKNR disc jockey Steve Robbins was paid off, the bill for the refreshments were in, the class funds were up to \$300.00.

It takes more than that to finance a prom and a class gift, so the 12A's set to work. They manned the concession stands at the football and basketball games; sold "Polly Doodles" and "Tyrolean Mints"; sponsored another dance, "Fall Into Winter"; and made a profit on name cards, enough to bring them up to the present balance after all bills were paid.
