## Each Club Represented






# Hard Work & Dramatics Prove a Very Good Pair

# **Edsel Remains Undefeated**

The victory beat goes on as Edsel extends this year's winning streak to three.

Ypsilanti fell to the T-Birds 33 to 13, with Edsel scoring in all quarters. Ted Grignon, quarter-back, scored Edsel's first touchdown on a run from the nine yard line; Grignon missed the extra point; so the score at the end of the first quarter was 6-0.

Paul Wojewuczki, split end, and Grignon scored on a 45-yard pass play in the second quarter. Ypsi also scored, but they missed the extra point. The score at the half was 13 to 6.

Both Edsel and Ypsi scored in the third quarter. Edsel scored on a 35yard pass combination that went from Grignon to Matt O'Donnell, wing back.

As the game entered the fourth quarter, Edsel had a 20-13 lead. Edsel then added two more touchdowns in the fourth. The first TD came on a 35-yard sprint by Grignon. Wojewuczki intercepted a Ypsi pass five yards back in the end-zone and ran 105 yards for an Edsel touchdown. Wojewuczki set a new Edsel Ford record for the longest interception run-back.

The game totals were five touch-downs, three extra points, 112 yards passing, and 203 yards rushing. Also in the passing department there were five pass completions for ten tries.

Edsel set its highest scoring mark against Wayne, 52-0.

Edsel scored in all quarters; 27 points in the first, 7 points in the second and third quarters, and 14 points in the fourth. The touchdowns in the first quarter were scored by Bob Keyeyian on a 3-yard run. Ted Grignon scored on a 10-yard option play, Paul Wojewuczki on a pass, and Ken Yungkans on a 20-yard run.

Scoring in the second and third quarters came on a 15-yard run by Grignon and a 9-yard run by Matt O'Donnell. Fourth quarter scoring came on a 15-yard pass from Grignon to John Julian, and an 18-yard run by Mike Yuskowatz.
