What could you buy for 7,000 shillings? The June Class of '67 bought a primary school in Masonga. Seven thousand shillings enabled the people of Masonga to purchase 2,000 bricks, cement, wood, and corrugated iron to build the school. The Ukerrewe District Council pledged its support of trucks for transportation. The Masonga school is located on the green island of Ukerewe, on the southeastern shore of Lake Victoria in Tanzania, Africa.

Construction on two new classrooms started on July 1, 1967. It should be completed by September 30, 1967. There are only 35 girls in a class of 116 students. By the time the school is finished there will be room for 270 pupils.

The June Class of '67 wasn't the first class to contribute its shillings. The first Peace Corps School was purchased in Brazil by the June Class of '64. The next one, Rungwe, was built by the January Class of '65. The four Dearborn high school Stu-
