The game, away at Roseville, was an out and out victory.



Coach of the Year, as far as Coach Davis can surmise, is based upon the team won-lost record of past and present seasons.


"Strong unity and respect for one another were two important reasons for success of the coaching staff and football teams at Edsel," states Davis.
