Lowrey Loss

At the start of the Lowrey contest, things continued looking good for Edsel Ford as they hit on their first five shots from the floor, opening a quick 11-5 lead. Lowrey spurted back, but the T-Birds held them off for the first quarter 21-18.

About three minutes into the second quarter, Lowrey took the lead and Edsel never got it back; at the half the Polar Bears lead 45-36.

#### Statistics

Well it's time to wrap it all up, but first there are some statistics to recite, and I like statistics. Edsel Ford played 17 games, counting playoffs; they wound up 14-3 over all, a very impressive record.

As a team the Birds scored 1255 points, for an average of 73.8 per game, while allowing 1045. They had a shooting percentage of 43.5%, which is better than average, and they grabbed off 811 rebounds for an average of 48 a game.

The entire season proved to be one team effort after another, and as I said, on the whole it was a good year.
