Spring Means New Changes; Best of All, Summer Is Near!

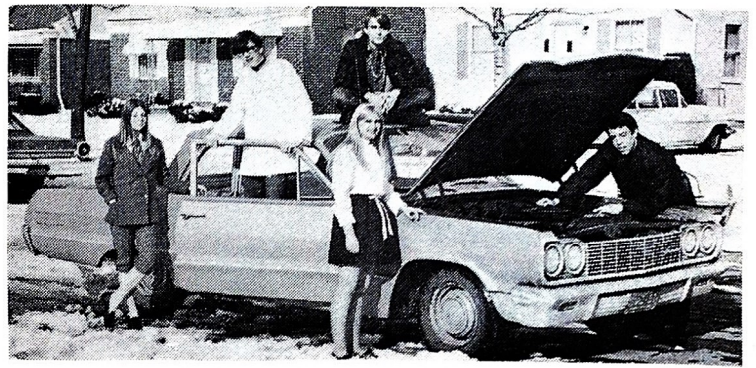

Owner of '64 "Greenbean" Finds His Hubcap Was Stolen March 7

You are sitting in the cockpit of this handsome 1964 Biscayne—The Greenbean. After fastening your seatbelt, you reach for the ignition key, turn it, and a quiet roar ushers from under the hood. By grasping the shift lever and putting the car into drive, you are ready to go. Stomping down onto the accelerator, the car leaps

forward, reaching sixty mph in 14½ seconds (quarter mile times have not been taken).

That zero to sixty time may not break any records, but it has fairly good pickup. Under the hood rests a complex power plant. It is a 230 cubes/140 HP, Turbo Thrift economy special. The engine is an in-line six that comes equipped with a Rochester, two-barrel carburetor.

The transmission is GM's Powerglide automatic with a final drive ratio of 2:56 to 1. This transmission, after four years and almost 50,000 miles, is not too slushy, which is quite amazing.

The inside of the car has quite a clean design, particularly the dashboard. On the dash, there are a few extra gadgets to get in your way. To be exact, about the only things other than standard equipment on the dash are a cigarette lighter and an AM radio.

The car seats six comfortably, although it has been known to carry more.
