## Stuart Salchow Places in Contest

Out of the 27,000 students from Michigan that took the Annual Michigan Mathematics Prize Competition Test, Stuart Salchow, a 12A at Edsel Ford, scored within the top 97 students.

The test was divided into two parts; the first included a multiplechoice exam given October 25, 1966. The top scorers (top 4%) then went on to Part II of the test, which was given December 6, 1966. Nine students out of the 107 from Edsel that took the test, were allowed to go on to this second part.

Out of about 1,000 students who took Part II, the top 97 were invited to attend an award's banquet. This banquet was held March 11, at Michigan State University. The winners were awarded college scholarship awards, and silver and gold medals.

Since any student in Michigan was eligible to take this test, Stuart should be congratulated on his fine work.



These workshops are frequently sponsored throughout the school year by other colleges such as Western Michigan University, Mercy College, and University of Detroit.


## Eric Cummins, 12A, Journeys To U.N.


